R'ganj, F'ganj make draw

Promising striker Sohel Rana came off the bench to strike a brace as Farashganj SC cut back two-goal deficit to draw 2-2 against Rahmatganj MFS in the Grameenphone Bangladesh League at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

Ugandan striker Idris Kasirye gave Rahmatganj a 27th-minute lead before Jamal Hossain doubled the margin seven minutes into the second half.

But, Farashganj hit back in the 77th minute through Sohel before he levelled the margin in the 84th minute, converting a penalty kick.

Rahmatganj, on the back of 3-1 drubbing of Chittagong Abahani and 1-0 win over Dhaka Abahani, seemed to lack the bite in the initial moments against the Independence Cup winners Farashganj, before they took the lead on the half-hour mark.

"After a five-day break, we have practised for only two days before coming to this match as there were a lot of problems at the club. I cannot

Maria, Li in last four

Maria Sharapova returned to the semifinals of a Grand Slam tournament for the first time in more than three years, defeating Andrea Petkovic 6-0, 6-3 Wednesday at the French Open.

The three-time major champion, who can complete a career Grand Slam with a title at Roland Garros, last reached this stage when she won the 2008 Australian Open.

Sharapova had little trouble against Petkovic, a German who lost in the Australian Open quarterfinals. Sharapova won the opening eight games and overcame two breaks to take the second set.

Sharapova will face Li Na of China. The Australian Open finalist defeated fourth-seeded Victoria Azarenka 7-5, 6-2.

Sharapova improved her Grand Slam quarterfinal record to 11-3 by beating Petkovic. All three of her losses came at Roland Garros.

The other time she reached the semifinals in Paris, she lost to runner-up Ana Ivanovic in 2007.

Besides the Australian Open title, the seventh-seeded Russian also won Wimbledon in 2004 and the US Open in 2006. With a title at Roland Garros, Sharapova will become the 10th woman to complete a career Grand Slam.

Defending champion Francesca Schiavone and No. 11 Marion Bartoli also

reached the semifinals Tuesday.

The 11th-seeded Frenchwoman Bartoli is known for her eccentricities while playing tennis, but they all seem to be paying off at this year's French Open right into the semifinals, where Bartoli finds herself after beating Svetlana Kuznetsova 7-6 (4), 6-4 Tuesday.

She is only the fourth Frenchwoman to reach the semifinals at Roland Garros in the Open era, which began in 1968.

Bartoli, who next faces defending champion Francesca Schiavone, is known as a maverick in France. With her father as coach, she has clashed with the French Tennis Federation and Fed Cup captain Nicolas Escudé.

But she has also already reached one Grand Slam final, at Wimbledon in 2007, when she lost to Venus Williams. Now Bartoli finds herself in a major semifinal for the second time.

"Even if I played the final of Wimbledon, I never felt that excited," Bartoli said, describing her emotions as victory neared against Kuznetsova. "When she missed that forehand, then I was just like, 'My God, I'm in the semifinal of my home Grand Slam.'"

Bartoli said she has often crumbled under the pressure of playing at Roland Garros, advancing past the second round only twice in 10 previous attempts. To reach the final, she will have to beat Schiavone, who rallied to defeat Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova 1-6, 7-5, 7-5.

Nadal-Murray semifinal

World number one Rafa Nadal cranked up his bid for a record-equalling sixth French Open title by routing his nemesis Robin Soderling 6-4, 6-1, 7-6 (7/3) on Wednesday to power into the semifinals.

Nadal will now take on fourth seed Andy Murray of Britain who reached the last four with a 7-6 (7/2), 7-5, 6-2 win over Juan Ignacio Chela of Argentina.

The world number one has bemoaned his lacklustre form on clay over the last two weeks but was back to his dominant self in all areas.

Fifth seed Soderling, who inflicted Nadal's only men's singles defeat at the French Open in 2009 before losing to the Spaniard in last year's final, barely got a look-in despite breaking twice.

Nadal was playing shots he would not have attempted just a few days ago when his confidence was brittle while Soderling, staying glued to the baseline too often, also played into the champion's hands.

It has emerged yesterday that the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) has been positively considering Vincent Barnes as the new head coach for the Tigers.

BCB president AHM Mustafa Kamal disclosed the name of Barnes, the assistant coach of the South Africa, while talking to reporters at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur.

"We want a coach who will work exclusively for the Bangladesh team. Vincent Barnes is in our consideration and the discussion is going on and hopefully we will take a decision in the board meeting on Saturday," said Kamal, who evidently asked if the reporters "heard of the coach" during the briefing.

Kamal later informed that they had talked with Sri Lanka's interim coach Stuart Law too and that the former Australian batsman is still in deliberation with the BCB.

"We are still in negotiations with Stuart Law. We are interested about him but we have given him some conditions. If he accepts those, we'll go for him," Kamal told The Daily Star. "It obviously means our talks

Virtual title decider

Abahani take on Muktis today

Holders Abahani and challenge Muktijoddha Sangsads lock horns today at the Bangabandhu National Stadium in what could be the title-deciding match of the fourth edition of Bangladesh League.

Three-time champions Abahani are currently in fourth position with 35 points from 16 matches, six off leaders Sheikh Jamal having played two matches less while the early pace-setters Muktijoddha have 39 points from 17 matches.

Both sides consider that a loss in today's encounter will set them off the pace as star-studded Sheikh Jamal and new-powerhouse Sheikh Russel KC, with 38 points from 18 matches, will hunt for the prestigious title.

Interestingly enough, the title race seemed to be a two-horse race between Muktijoddha and Abahani in the first phase of the league, but thanks to a few slip-ups from them and a winning streak from Sheikh Jamal and Sheikh Russel who has turned the league into a four-horse race and certainly more entertaining

than the previous editions. In fact, Sheikh Jamal's victory over Abahani in the first match of the second leg and Sheikh Russel's similar feat over Muktijoddha were the turning points of the league.

However, according to many, the four-way race was made possible due to the fact that this time the league has not been marred by match-fixing, which was allegedly a common phenomenon in the two-way battles in the previous editions.

Added to that was the formation of strong teams by Muktijoddha and Sheikh Jamal that challenged the establishment powerhouse Abahani and Mohammedan to make the league more interesting and a closer competition.

However, considering the current standings and the remaining matches, Muktijoddha are in a relatively better position since four of their five remaining matches are against mid-table sides. But their coach Maruf Haque believes this is the make or break match for the title race.

"We would have gone far ahead if the others had we not dropped some valuable
