# Bangladesh, a safer place for mothers

Above is the headline of a news item published in the USAID's health newsletter 'FRONTLINES' special edition (April/May 2011) which reported that maternal deaths in Bangladesh fell from 322 per 100,000 in 2001 to 194 per 100,000 in 2010. This is indeed a tremendous accomplishment and the credit goes to the USAID's family planning programs in Bangladesh as well as the Government of Bangladesh. It may be mentioned here that each year, more than 150,000 women die in the first 48 hours after birth throughout the world; 1.6 million newborns die in that same time frame. Ninety-nine percent of these pregnancy-related deaths occur in the developing world. Under this critical situation, maternal deaths decreased by 40 percent during the last nine years in Bangladesh which is a significant achieve-

It is sincerely expected that Bangladesh would hold the trend of decreasing maternal deaths and it would be successful to meeting the 2015 deadline for the United Nations' fifth Millennium Development Goal: to reduce the maternal mortality rate by three-fourths.

all be overjoyed and the country would surely be benefited.



# Lightning strikes



Lightning strikes can produce severe injuries, and have a mortality rate of between 10 and 30%, with up to 80% of survivors sustaining long-term injuries. An estimated 24,000 people are killed by lightning around the world each year and about 240,000 are injured.

Generally the specialists advise everyone to have a plan for their safety when a thunderstorm occurs. This is important, since lightning can strike without rain actually falling. If thunder can be heard at all, then there is a risk of light-

ning. The safest place is inside a building or a vehicle. Risk remains for up to 30 minutes after the last observed lightning or thunder. Lightning can affect the brainstem which controls breathing. If a victim appears lifeless, it is important to begin artificial resuscitation immediately to prevent death by suffocation.
