## Forests dip to 10pc 52 MILLS sawing reserve forests

Ruling-party men always lead The country's forest cover the forest-gobbling

: As many as 52 illegal sawmills have been set up inside the reserve forests in Sakhipur upazila in the last two and a half years thanks to alleged corruption by foresters and intervention by ruling party men.

This lucrative sawmill business within the reserve forests is a telltale · sign of how it contributes to shrinking of the waning greens in the Madhupur Garh region.

According to the government rules, no sawmill can be set up within 10 kilometres of the reserved forests. Surprisingly, most of these illegal sawmills have been set up within only 100-200 metres of the offices of the bit · officers of the Department of Forest.

A huge number of trees like shal, gajari, segun and akashmoni worth : crores of taka are felled and sliced in these sawmills every day before being trafficked to different places.

## Radical reform Estimate raises eyebrows

CPD sees GDP growth at 6.2-6.3pc, not at 6.7pc; fears weak projection may lead to weak policy

Centre for Policy Dialogue yesterday questioned the provisional gross domestic product (GDP) growth estimate, which could misguide the policy makers, affect the credibility of the government and make people dub it as a political score.

Analysing the level of investment, the independent think-tank said the economy is likely to grow by 6.2-6.3 percent, not 6.7 percent as estimated by the Bureau of Bangladesh Statistics (BBS) for the outgoing fiscal year.

The World Bank and the Asian Development Bank have projected 6.2 percent and 6.3 percent growth rate, much lower than the SEE PAGE 19 COL 5

"Stagnating gross investment level producing a spectacular 6.7 percent GDP growth may prompt us to term the phenomenon as

investment-less growth," the CPD said in its report on the state of the Bangladesh economy at its office.

Bangladesh's gross investment rate remains stagnant at less than 25 percent for the past several years. Two to four percent more investment is required to raise the GDP growth by one percent.

The CPD found higher GDP projection was made by showing an improved Incremental Capital Output Ratio, known as ICOR, which is used mainly in determining a country's level of production efficiency. The ICOR is a tool that assesses the marginal amount of investment-capital required for an

## Commuters caught in chaos

10 buses burnt, several others damaged; 50 held in capital; 30 hurt in Rajshahi as BNP men clash with cops

Hundreds of commuters remained stranded for hours in parts of the capital yesterday, as pickets attacked buses driving them out of streets on the eve of the opposition-called hartal.

Pro-hartal pickets set fire to 10 buses and a taxi cab in the city. They also damaged five more buses leaving several commuters injured.

Police detained 50 people in connection with the incidents.

The ongoing chaos over fares added to the plight of commuters, as fewer buses ply the city roads following government drives to prevent transport operators from charging additional fares.

Several hundred people were seen

waiting for buses for hours in Farmgate, Bangla Motor, Malibagh, Mouchak, Nilkhet and Mirpur areas.

Meantime, 30 people were injured in Rajshahi in a clash between law enforcers and BNP activists, who brought out a procession in support of today's hartal.
