Police recovered the body of an unidentified man from the city's Karwan Bazar area yesterday.

Police said the man aged about 38, might have been

killed in a road accident at any time of Friday night. The deceased was sick and his abdomen was heavily bandaged, police added.

The body was sent to DMC morgue for autopsy.

Valuables stolen from two flats

Around 36 tolas of gold ornaments and Tk 4 lakh in cash were stolen from two locked flats of a fivestorey building in front of Sheikh Baharullah Mosque at Panchlaish in the port city yesterday.

Police said the theft took place around 3:00am when the thieves locked up the doors of all the flats from outside and took away the valuables from third and fourth floor.

30 hurt in pre-hartal violence in Rajshahi

At least 30 people including a police man were injured yesterday evening in a clash between law enforcers and BNP activists in Rajshahi city.

Khan Mohammad Shahriar, officer-in-charge (investigation) of Boalia Police Station, sustained a bullet injury to the chest during the clash that lasted for about 40 minutes, reported our staff correspondent, Rajshahi.

The clash began around 6:30pm when police obstructed a pre-hartal procession heading towards Zero Point of Shaheb Bazar after a half-an-hour's rally at Bhubanmahan Park.

The procession of some 100 BNP activists tried to cross the police barricade but police men charged batons and fired 40 tear-shells to disperse the crowd. The BNP activists pelted police men with brickbats and vandalised 15 shops, one car and five motorbikes.

Joint Secretary of the district BNP unit Mizanur Rahman Minu, Mosaddek Hossain Bulbul and Shafiqul Haq Milon were among the injured in the clash.

Nayek Khalilur Rahman with injuries to the head was admitted to Rajshahi Medical College Hospital.

HIGHEST POLICE PRESENCE IN DHAKA The Dhaka Metropolitan Police authorities yesterday noon

started deploying police at key points in the capital to avert any possible pre-hartal violence. At a press briefing yesterday at DMP headquarters, DMP

Commissioner Benazir Ahmed said a huge number of police members will be present on city streets today to resist all kinds of violation in the name of hartal.

The main opposition BNP and its ally Jamaat-e-Islami on Wednesday called a countrywide dawn-to-dusk hartal today in protest at what they claimed was the government's move to cancel the caretaker government system.

The DMP commissioner said law enforcers' duty is to uphold citizens' rights in any situation. The police will do anything for maintaining peace in the capital. The DMP commissioner requested city dwellers to keep them from all kind of destructive activities during the hartal. The police would not harass any political activists or people until they engage themselves in violence, he added.

About traffic movement during the hartal, the DMP commissioner said police will provide highest security for buses and other vehicles.

CALL FOR WITH DRAWING HARTAL

Several socio-political organisations yesterday urged the main opposition BNP to withdraw today's hartal considering the public suffering and economic loss of the state.

Bangladesh Awami Olama League organised an antihartal meeting at Dhaka Reporters' Unity yesterday where speakers said BNP does not have any right to obstruct country's development in the name of hartal.

They urged BNP lawmakers to join parliament to discuss their demands and find a solution.

Bangladesh Christian Association also strongly demanded withdrawal of today's hartal.

Meanwhile, former BNP lawmaker Mohammad

Akhtaruzzaman at a press conference at his city residence said today's hartal will be harmful to BNP.

He said leaders and activists of BNP will mostly remain out of the streets in the capital. Akhtaruzzaman requested BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia to move around the capital herself during the strike.

A press release yesterday says the mini buses of Dhaka Sarak Paribahan Samity will be plying the city routs today during hartal.

World Environment Day Today

Call for collaborative global efforts

World Environment Day 2011 will be observed in the country today as elsewhere across the world highlighting crucial environmental, economic and social roles played by forests.

The theme of the day "Forests: Nature at Your Service" calls for collaborative global efforts for increased investment in forest management and forest resources to increase employment, reduce deforestation and help tackle climate change.

Marking the day, speakers at a seminar yesterday urged the government to enact a new forest act as the old law ceased to be relevant.

"The old act, promulgated for India in 1927, is not applicable anymore," said environmentalist Barrister Abu Raihan Khalid at the seminar organised by Bangladesh Paribesh Andolan at Dhaka Reporters' Unity in the

"An entirely new act is needed keeping in mind the needs and challenges of urbanisation and global warming," he said. The speakers said many forest

officers have to cut down trees and sell the timber to pay for boats hired for official duties and cellphone bills, as there are no government allowances for these expenses.

Neglect raises adolescent health risk

Speakers tell seminar

Lack of attention to adolescents' healthcare in general and their reproductive health in particular increases the vulnerability of around 33 million adolescents (aged between 10 and 19) in the country, speakers at a seminar said yesterday.

As the adolescents pass through a transition period of physical and mental change, they encounter an array of health and social vulnerabilities that often lead them to engage in risky sexual behaviour even.

So it is important to address their vulnerabilities through increasing their knowledge on reproductive health and

creating a supporting environment so increased among the adolescents at that they can share their problems with Plan's Intervention area in Dhaka City their parents and seek medical services if necessary, said the speakers. Speakers at the dissemination semi-

nar of mid-term review of Strengthening Adolescent Reproductive Health Project also said that increased knowledge on reproductive health and support from the parents and community people can play an important role.

Plan Bangladesh organised the seminar on mid-term review conducted by Nielsen at the city's Spectra convention centre where the achievement of the project was highlighted.

The mid-term review revealed that knowledge on risky behaviours has

BNP has no respect for law: Sajeda

Deputy Leader of the House Syeda Sajeda Chowdhury here yesterday said BNP's hartal is anti-people and against the Supreme Court verdict that declared caretaker government system

illegal and unconstitutional. "The government is respectful to the law and the apex court and it is executing the decision. But in the name of democracy, BNP and its leaders are showing disre-

spect to the law," she said. Terming hartal illegal the AL leader urged BNP and its chairperson to come the parliament to discuss the verdict and highlight the importance of caretaker government if it is necessary.

Sajeda was addressing the inauguration ceremony of **Chittagong City Corporation** Kaiser- Nilufer College as the chief guest with CCC Mayor Mohammad Manjur Alam in the chair at Korbaniganj in the port city.

Sajeda at another discussion said the Supreme Court gave the verdict against the caretaker government and now change of the decision depends on public opinion and the parliament.

"Majority of the parliamentarians, who are directly elected by people, want the constitution of 1972 that does not contain any concept of caretaker government. So we have no alternative to change the constitution."

She was addressing as the chief guest the discussion at Chittagong Circuit House arranged by National Human Rights Commission, Chittagong Metropolitan City.
