# Brikkho Mela

RIKKHO Mela, the annual tree hijol, for example, works well - rather fair, takes place in Agargaon than foreign ones. through June. It is a haven for where many nurseries and arboreal lychee flower honey. Herbal remedies, as institutions offer up a surprising well as medicinal plants, are also diversity of treats.

The main attraction is trees, from tiny plant food. seedlings to grown ones with fruits. Many are suitable for rooftop fruit demonstration: how to grow several gardens. Bewildered by the variety, I try to simplify. "If I could start with three fruits trees on the roof, what should they be?" I ask at the Bangladesh Green Roof Movement. "Guava, lemon and kamranga (starfruit) are the easiest," I am informed.

One also needs large containers (drums) and good soil for growing the trees.

Exotic varieties are plentiful. Several nurseries display Egyptian sweet fig, longan, dragonfruit, passionfruit (also called Tang) and avocado trees. Thai varieties of local favourites including jambura, tetul, sofeda and mango are endangered trees in Bangladesh popular. Prices can vary from several thousand taka for a ready-made fruitbearing longan tree to three hundred for vera is grown throughout the country the fig.

In an Agricultural Extension stall I find a woman selling dried oyster mushrooms. Behind her, large ganoderma mushrooms - useful for to mind. medicinal purposes - grow on chunks of wood. With advice and materiel from here, she says, one can also grow shiitake, reishi, milky white, and button mushrooms. However, mushrooms are finicky and need precise humidity and temperature.

At a bonsai stand are banyan and ashwath bonsais. With the right technique, a bonsai can be "grown" in two to five years. Local bonsai artists

Several stalls are selling honey. Some tree and nature enthusiasts bottles contain kalijeera, mustard or available, as are organic and inorganic

At another stall I watch a varieties of boroi on the same tree. Branches of the different varieties are grafted into the common root using a technique called cleft grafting. This technique can also be used to grow multiple citrus varieties on the same

Timber saplings are also sold. While the usual suspects mahogany, acacia, teak and eucalyptus are present, a relatively new variety called lombu is popular. It is fast-growing, takes up little lateral space, and yields strong wood.

Some information confuses me. A large poster listing vulnerable and includes aloe vera (Ghrito Kanchon), chikrashi and agar. I am baffled. Aloe and consumed year round, while agar and chikrashi are also planted widely for commercial purposes.

# Another rail link with India gets nod

India has given the go-ahead for the construction of an 18-km-long railway line connecting Agartala with Akhaura in Bangladesh, said a top railway official yesterday.

The Indian railway is also conducting a survey to extend the railway line up to Sabroom, the southern border town of Tripura, for connectivity with the Chittagong Port.

B N Rajsekhar, additional member of the Indian Railway Board, said in Agartala yesterday that the project, second after the Kolkata-Dhaka rail line, would be completed at a cost of Rs 267 crore in two and a half years.

A six-member delegation led by Rajsekhar yesterday inspected the alignment of the railway line and gave the final nod on it.

Rajsekhar said the project was held up for a long time and got a fresh lease of life after Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina visited New Delhi last year.

Two months ago, the Planning Commission asked the railway board to finalise the alignment of the rail track, he said.

The Ministry of Development of North Eastern Region would bear the cost of constructing the Indian part of the rail link while the foreign ministry of Bangladesh would finance the construction on its side, Rajsekhar said.

A separate station would be built at Nischintapur, a border village, about 10km from Agartala, where all facilities like custom clearance of goods and visa clearance of passengers would be put in place.

## JU teachers, students stand by Limon

Songkhubdho Nagorik Samaj, a joint platform of teachers and students of Jahangirnagar University (JU), staged a protest programme against government repression on Limon Hossain yesterday afternoon in front of the city's National Museum.

A Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) team shot college student Limon in the left leg while he was on his way to bring his cattle home at Chhaturia village on March 23. The leg had to be amputated.

Teachers, writers, cultural activists and journalists at the programme demanded the

government to withdraw cases against Limon and give him compensation and a chance to get back to normal life.

Jahangirnagar Theatre staged a street drama "Chakrabuha" protesting Rab's shootout and government statements about Limon and his family members' alleged involvement with a criminal group.

The samaj held similar programmes on June 3 at the venue and will continue doing so every Friday till the government realises their demands, said the samaj convener Masud Imran, assistant professor of JU.

They called upon people from all walks of life to join them.



The representatives even check patients' prescriptions to see whether doctors prescribe the drugs manufactured by their companies, in violation of what some experts said medical ethics and marketing code.

Besides talking to doctors about their new drugs, their efficacy and use, the promoters offer gifts, including foreign trips, to the doctors. There are many takers of

such gifts. "It is an unhealthy competition," said Prof Rashid E Mahbub, former President of Bangladesh Medical Association, adding that it

encourages doctors to prescribe unnecessary drugs just to satisfy the gift-giving pharmaceutical companies.

He said no one other than a doctor is allowed to see patients' prescriptions, as it violates medical ethics and patients' right to privacy. Such practice exposes patients' diseases to medicine promoters, which is not ethical.

"This is complete hooliganism," said Vicechancellor of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University Prof Pran Gopal

Datta. He said when hospital authorities restrict entry of medical representatives during working hours, they
