# Nahid wants govt to double edn budget

Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid has demanded in parliament that the government double the allocation in education sector. "Countries around the world allocate at least six percent of their Gross Domestic Product for education sector, but in our country it is only 2.3 percent," Nahid said.

Finance Minister AMA Muhith on June 9 proposed Tk 19,837 crore in the sector for the next fiscal year.

Speaking on the budget discussion that began yesterday, Nahid said: "Even all the African countries allocate more than five percent of their GDP in education sector. Countries like Senegal and Kenya allocate 40 and 35 percent of their GDP for the sector."

The education minister said his ministry is working to

make science education attractive to draw more students. Expressing concern over the fall in numbers of science students in schools and colleges, he said building a modern society is impossible without the knowledge of science.

Nahid said his ministry has taken steps to set up multimedia system in 20,500 schools to ensure that the students learn through modern technology.

Foreign Minister Dipu Moni, State Minister for Public Works and Housing Abdul Mannan Khan, Awami League MP Reza Ali Khan and Jatiya Party MP Mujibur Rahman, among others, took part in the discussion.

### Rumana flies to India with hope to get eyesight back

After nine days of anguish and trauma, the barbarously assaulted Dhaka University teacher Rumana Manjur was flown to India yesterday for better treatment.

An assistant professor of international relations (IR) department, Rumana left for India with the hope of regaining her eyesight, said Prof Dr Delwar Hossain, chairman of the department.

She will be treated at Sankara Nethralaya, a medical research foundation in Chennai, India, he said.

Rumana's husband Syeed Hasan Sumon allegedly assaulted her following a quarrel on June 5 at her father's house in the city's Dhanmondi. She was admitted to hospital on the same day. On Monday, she told the media, for the first time, the horrifying tale of torture.

Meanwhile, DU teachers and students demanded immediate arrest and exem plary punishment of the accused.

They placed the demands at two human chains following a silent procession organised separately by IR department and Dhaka University Teachers' Associations (Duta) at Aparajayo Bangla on the campus.

At IR's programme, DU students demanded of the home ministry to arrest Syeed Hasan within 72hour. They also called upon the DU authorities and the government to bear the medical expense of Rumana.

The students threatened to continue their protest unless the accused is arrested in the given time and criticised the university administration for delaying in taking steps in this regard.

At Duta's human chain, Prof Gitiara Nasreen, chairperson of mass communication and journalism department, emphasised security of Rumana's family.

Prof Muhammad Akteruzzaman of Islamic history and culture department also spoke at the

cial assistance of WHO, Bangladesh, says children growing up in rural areas are more prone to mental health problems than their urban counterparts. Lower level of education of parents,

history of mental illness in the family and past head injuries have been identified as the reasons behind the mental health problems. The report (2009) on 'Survey



Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) ATM Shamsul Huda yesterday asserted that the smaller political parties should institutionally strengthen themselves to flourish proper democracy.

The smaller ones are being sandwiched between two major political parties, from where they should come out for the development of democracy, he said.

Dr Huda said this at the dialogue with Bangladesh National Awami Party (NAP) at the EC secretariat in the city as part of its ongoing dialogue with the 38 registered

# 20 sued for damaging Saber's car

Twenty people, including several BNP activists, have been sued for ransacking the jeep of Awami League (AL) lawmaker Saber Hossain Chowdhury in the city's Khilgaon on Monday night.

Md Sahabuddin and Md Zahir, AL president and general secretary of Trimohoni union under Khilgaon Police Station, filed the case with the police station on Tuesday morning.

ASI Mahbubul Alam also investigation officer of the case, told The Daily Star that 20 people, including Alamgir, Musha, Zahirul, Ariful, Tofazzal, were made accused in the case. None was arrested till filling of this report in the evening

Talking to The Daily Star, Saber Hossain said he along with the union leaders went to visit the ailing mother of Zahir at her home in Trimohoni around 8:30pm on Monday after parking his car on the main road in Nasirabad area.

Locals informed him that around 10/12 men including some of identified local BNP activists, vandalised his jeep along with the car of Alamgir Chowdhury, AL president of Khilgaon thana unit.
