BCB waits for green signal

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) is awaiting confirmation from the impending head coach of the national cricket team.

BCB CEO Manzur Ahmed, who confirmed last week that they will confirm the deal within their target timeline of June 15, told the Daily Star Sport yesterday that the confirmation can come any time.

"We are waiting everyday for the confirmation because it is now a matter of time. We get it and it can come any time," said Manzur, without elaborating on anything when inquired about the timeline.

BCB has finalised the whole thing regarding appointment of the new coach for the Tigers but they were not ready to disclose the name until receiving confirmation from their desired man.

It is all but confirmed that Australian Stuart Law, who is now accompanying the Sri Lanka team in England as an interim head coach, is going to take the helm of the Tigers if everything goes smoothly but it may take few more

The third and final Test between England and Sri Lanka is from June 16 to 20.

Windies pull one back

West Indies, inspired by a career-best spell from leg-spinner Anthony Martin, completed a 103-run victory to secure a consolation victory in the fourth one-day international against world champions India on Monday.

Rohit Sharma led the way with 39, and was one of a handful of Indian batsmen that got starts without carrying on, as Martin captured four for 36 from 10 overs, and West Indies successfully defended a target of 250.

Martin, later named man-of-the-match, rounded off the victory, when he had Ishant Sharma stumped for a duck with his final delivery of the match at the Vivian Richards Cricket Ground.

The victory was a consolation for West Indies, after India took an unbeatable 3-0 lead in the five-match series with a victory two days ago at the same venue.

"We didn't bat very well, but all credit must go to the West Indies because they

played really well in this game," said India captain Suresh Raina.

India's bowlers had done their best to maintain the status quo, but Kieron Pollard top scored with 70 and Lendl Simmons supported with 67, helping West Indies reach 249 for eight.

Praveen Kumar was the most successful Indian bowler with three for 37 from 10 overs, and leg-spinner Amit Mishra captured two for 56 from 10 overs.

The World champions however, were left to chase their highest target of the series, and started brightly.

But they kept losing wickets at inopportune times, allowing the West Indies bowlers to dictate terms.

Andre Russell ended with three for 16 from seven overs, and Sammy took two for 43, breathing a huge sigh of relief following the game.

Tri-series back down under

Cricket Australia (CA) has reinstated the triseries ODI concept and extended their regular Test dates to host India in a four-match series, which breaks with recent convention.

Australia unveiled a southern summer schedule on Tuesday that features two Tests against New Zealand in Brisbane and Hobart at the start of December followed by a four-Test series against India starting December 26 -- the traditional Boxing Day slot at the Melbourne Cricket Ground. The subsequent Tests will be played in Sydney and Perth and the series concludes in Adelaide from January 24 to 28.

A two-match Twenty20 International series will follow, leading into the February 5 to March 8 blockbuster limited-overs triseries involving former world champions Australia against World Cup holders India and 2011 World Cup runners-up Sri Lanka.

Australia abandoned the tri-series format in favour of bilateral series for three seasons amid diminishing popularity for the 50-over game and increasing interest in T20Is, but have reinstated the three-way contest in what will be a hectic season for the hosts.

"ICC Cricket World Cup winners India are also the number one-ranked Test team in the world at the moment. Sri Lanka have also been in great form as we saw in the World Cup, while we know New Zealand are always a formidable opponent that thrive when playing Australia," Cricket Australia chief executive James Sutherland said in a statement.

"With the commencement of the ICC World Test Championship we know that every Test win is vital and the Australian team will be keen to start the home season positively against New Zealand."

The Test series will clash with the Australian Open, the annual Grand Slam tennis fixture in Melbourne in late January, meaning the domestic broadcast audiences for both sports will be split.

Macedonia and Turkey, saw him deliver three Macedonian league titles and one cup title apart from guiding clubs to group stages of the UEFA Champions League.

Jovanovski's latest employment was at Bulgarian side ZSC Sofia where he was terminated after two months following his side's 2-0 defeat to Rapid Vienna in Europa League in 2010.

Jovanovski's playing carrier began in 1970 as a member of Vardar's youth team before joining the famous Yugoslav club Red Star seven years later. After a brief return to Macedonia, he went to Turkey where he played for Samsunspor before calling time on his playing career with Ankargucu in 1988-89.

He was also picked for the national youth team of former Yugoslavia in 1973. Jovanovski is going to be Bangladesh's 15th

foreign coach and fourth in three years under the Kazi Salahuddin-led committee after unpleasant departures of Brazilian Edson Silva Dido, Serbian Zoran Djordjevic and the

From Denmark to Dhaka

Jamal Bhuiyan is confident of securing a place in the final squad of Bangladesh's World Cup pre-qualifier squad as the Denmark-born Bangladeshi booter will start his training with local clubs from today.

"I have no idea about the standard of Bangladeshi footballers or the Bangladesh national team but I am confident that I will be able to secure a place in the final squad," said Jamal who yesterday visited Bangladesh Football Federation to be introduced to local coaches as well as members of the national team management committee.

The 27-member preliminary squad will be reduced to a 20-member squad on June 20

The 21-year old booter believes it is easier to represent Bangladesh than Denmark, whose booters play in top-level leagues like France, Spain and England.

The midfielder, who is now playing for HIK, a second division team of Denmark, said that was inspired to play for Bangladesh as it is the home of his parents.

Jamal was given a contract by the youth team of FC Copenhagen at the age of 15 in 2005 but his career with the club came to an end after being shot four times in a gang fight at his father's departmental store in 2007.

Then he struggled for one and half years to regain full fitness, but he failed to reclaim his place in FC Copenhagen and joined second division HIK in 2009.

Pakistan ready to host Bangladesh

Pakistani football said Tuesday it was confident next month's home World Cup qualifier against Bangladesh will go ahead, promising tight security for the match.

After the first leg of their Asian zone qualifier for the 2014 World Cup in Dhaka on June 29, the two sides were scheduled to meet in Lahore on July 3.

But arrangements ran into trouble after Bangladesh asked FIFA, the game's ruling body, to relocate the match due to security fears.

FIFA has apparently rejected the request in a move welcomed by Pakistan Football Federation (PFF) secretary Ahmed Yar Khan Lodhi. "We hosted Palestine and Malaysia earlier this year and

both the teams returned happy, so we have proper security

arrangements in place and we are confident that the match will go ahead," Lodhi told AFP. Pakistan has not hosted any major sporting event since militants attacked the Sri Lankan cricket team in Lahore in March 2009, killing eight people and wounding seven visit-

ing players and their assistant coach. "FIFA knows of our security arrangements made for the Palestine and Malaysian teams so they have no problems and we assure Bangladesh that they will be well looked

after," said Lodhi. Bangladesh Football Federation chief Kazi Salahuddin told AFP Tuesday that FIFA turned down its request to host both games against Pakistan.

"FIFA rejected our request. So our national team will go to Pakistan play the match on July 3," he said, adding that he

had not been told where the game will be played. Team coach Robert Rubcic did not want to travel to the troubled country, Salahuddin said, but the team's appeal to

FIFA fell on deaf ears.

The Don of cricket

What do Tiger Woods, Pele, Roger Federer and Babe Ruth have in common? In their respective fields, in their prime, they left the competition far behind. They also have another common thread: none can hold a candle to Sir Don Bradman when it comes to dominating their field of play.

The Don's career batting average was 99.94. He needed four runs in his last innings to make it an even 100, but was out second ball for a duck. Jack Hobbs, a contemporary, who by any standard was a great batsman averaged 56.94 but he's the second

Bradman, through his sheer weight of runs, rose to folk-hero status in Australia.

There is a story told by Michael Parkinson of his father walking thirty miles to see Bradman bat. Upon his return he faced a family who thought he was not rowing with both oars. But, Parkinson writes, "My father went to his grave unrepentant. Retelling the story - as he did many times - he'd say, 'But I saw HIM bat and they didn't'."

It was his presence and his brilliance that started a change in attitude towards the mother country, England. The two major powers of cricket at the time, Australia and England, had been battling for the Ashes for close to fifty years when he made his Test debut in 1928.

From his debut till his retirement, Australia lost the urn only twice out of seven series. One of those two defeats came in 1932-33, when England devised a tactic, Bodyline, specifically designed to neutralise Bradman. His career started Australian dominance over their old colonial masters that prevails till today, barring the odd isolated period of English prevalence.

The boy from country New South Wales made his own luck. As a youngster, he honed his reflexes by throwing a golf ball at the curved surface of a water tank behind his house and hitting the unpredictable rebounds with a cricket stump. Most observers of his batting agree that this was the secret behind his lightning reflexes and fast footwork. More than these two attributes, however, what really made him so consistent was his concentration, which was doubtless fostered during this unconventional routine.

That is not to say that he was a dour batsman. He almost always scored his runs quickly, and is still the only one to score 300 runs in a day (309 against England at Headingley in 1930).

After retirement, Bradman continued to occupy a high position in Australian cricket as selector and administrator. He was a strong-willed person and ruffled quite a few feathers in his time. He may have been disliked by some, but respect was his to command universally and eternally, and even in his twilight years his advice was highly sought. Sachin Tendulkar, Steve Waugh and Shane Warne were some of the few modern cricketers to enjoy an audience with The Don and they speak of the encounter with an almost religious awe.

Bradman died eight years short of a final century in February 2001, safe in the knowledge that his place at the top of cricket's pantheon will never be challenged.
