Jamaica finished the first round of the Gold Cup on top of Group B after a 1-0 victory over Honduras on Monday, with both teams advancing to the quarter-finals along with Guatemala.

Guatemala booked their berth with a 4-0 victory over Grenada, which was enough to put them through as one of the best two thirdplaced teams in group play.

Ryan Johnson got the goal for Jamaica -- with some help from Honduran keeper Noel Valladares.

Aston Villa have reportedly approached city rivals Birmingham to ask about the precise status of Alex McLeish.

The Scot resigned as manager of Birmingham, relegated from the Premier League last season, on Sunday and was immediately linked with a move to Villa, still in the top flight but without a boss after Gerard Houllier stepped down on health grounds.

Monday that Villa had sent an e-mail to Birmingham seeking clarification of McLeish's position.

Birmingham, is furious over McLeish's move and said: "He is still on our contracted staff and Birmingham City FC does not grant him any right to speak to any outsiders until the matter is resolved.

"It's about time discipline is instilled into this game and I am not a person who gets pushed about."

Ash threatens Copa America

The governing body of South American soccer says the arrival of teams playing in the Copa America could be delayed because of the ash spewing from Chile's erupting volcano that's disrupting flights across the southern hemisphere.

Flights were grounded Monday in Argentina, which is host to the continental championship. The tournament opens July 1 when Argentina faces Bolivia in La Plata and ends July 24.

Francisco Figueredo, the executive secretary of the South American governing body CONMEBOL, said if the ash did not disperse soon the body would consider having teams fly to Paraguay's capital Asuncion and then travel by land to venues in Argentina.

David Beckham insisted Monday he was content to be a spectator at next year's London Olympics if there was no role for him in the controversial Great Britain football team at the Games.

"Football will be a massive part of the Olympics and it will be really exciting to see that," said the former Manchester United star, who now plays for the Los Angeles Galaxy.

"This is the first time I will have been to an Olympics and I'll probably be there with my children.

"Football has been a part of my life for

many years and to be a part of that would be incredible. "We'll see what role I'll play in the

build-up or at the Olympics, but I'll be there as a fan.

"I want to watch athletes like (British heptathlete) Jessica Ennis and (British diver) Tom Daley, young athletes who are going to inspire so many young children around the world.

"For myself to be able to take my sons to an Olympics in our country makes me proud. Hopefully my daughter will be there

as well," he added. Victoria Beckham is due to give birth to

the couple's first daughter next month. Beckham was speaking at a sponsor's event to announce that Gabriella Roseje, an 18-year-old from Bermondsey in London, is the first successful nominee for the Olympic torch relay.

The former England captain, one of the world's best known sporting celebrities, helped secure the Games for London at a meeting of the International Olympic Committee in Singapore in 2007. "When I was asked to be part of the Olym-

pic bid, I was very sceptical at first because I'd never competed in the Olympics, I'm a football player," the 36-year-old midfielder explained. "To be part of a team that was trying to

bring the Olympics to my country, let alone somewhere where I grew up, was a great honour and very flattering. "The moment when we got the Olympics

was one of the most rewarding things of my career. It was so special. "The Olympics means the world to

everyone. It's such a great event to be part of," he added. "I remember the rivalries between people like Sebastian Coe and Steve Ovett (the Brit-

ish middle-distance greats who won gold at the 1980 Moscow Games in the 800 and 1,500 metres respectively). "There will be some exciting athletes

coming to our country, coming to London which is where I grew up. It's a very exciting prospect."

The prospect of fielding a British football team at the Olympics has provoked strong reactions in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.

Busy time for Gunners

Arsenal Chief Executive Ivan Gazidis has promised a busy few months in the transfer market with the club keen to bolster their squad after what he said had been a profoundly disappointing season.

Gazidis said short-comings of the team, which finished fourth in the Premier League and a sixth successive season without a trophy, had to be acknowledged and rectified.

"It is going to be an active summer. I expect to be busy and Arsene expects to be busy," Gazidis told a meeting of the Arsenal Supporters Trust at the Emirates Stadium on Monday. "We are working hard during this close season - very hard."

Asked if the club had spoken to anybody so far in the transfer market, Gazidis replied: "Yes, many people."

However, he declined to elaborate on who and also refused to answer questions on the future's of midfielders Cesc Fabregas and Samir Nasri who have been linked with moves to other clubs.

Arsenal had some successes last season, beating Barcelona, Manchester United and Chelsea at home, and spoke of winning a quadruple of trophies in February.

But then, in quick succession, Arsenal lost the League Cup final to Birmingham City, were knocked out of the Champions League by Barcelona and ended the season with a string of losses and draws to finish 12 points behind champions Manchester United.

Gazidis stressed that new signings had to be made within the club's resources, a policy that has angered some supporters who have looked enviously at rivals Chelsea and Manchester City that have relied on rich benefactors to bank-roll player transfers.
