Another mangrove forest destroyed

Over 5,000 trees felled in remote char of Patuakhali

While the government vows to increase our forest areas, hundreds of locals yesterday started chopping down an entire mangrove forest and a wildlife sanctuary over an area of 2,000 acres in the remote island of Char Bestin under Galachipa upazila of Patuakhali.

The plundering of the mangrove forest was prompted by the Patuakhali district administration which in 2006 allocated

two-thirds of the Char Besting mangrove forest to 900 landless families. The forest department strongly opposed the move. On August 10, 2008, the Patuakhali and Bhola district administration in a meeting decided to cancel the allocation. But none of the two districts started any official procedure to declare the allocation null and void.

LNG import not before a year

Slow-paced tender process for a terminal seen as reason

The government's bid to import Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) by December 2012 to boost declining gas supply is set to miss the deadline by a year to 18 months as the authorities could not complete the tender process for setting up necessary infrastructures.

The government aims to import LNG from Qatar at the rate of 500 million cubic feet per day, equivalent to the country's current supply deficit.

The gas will be unloaded at an LNG terminal in Moheshkhali from which it will be transmitted to the national grid in Chittagong through an 80-kilometre pipeline. If implemented, it would give the energy sector an alternative solution.

The government has floated a tender for setting up the LNG terminal but the process has been unusually slow with the project despite attributing high importance to it. For the pipeline, the government is also preparing a restricted tender limited to a few companies.

Petrobangla on February 9 floated the tender to pick competent bidders for the LNG terminal project with

response from 10 companies.

Insiders say based on submitted documents on experience, technical and financial strength, the authorities have selected seven companies: Gas de France, Golar LNG Energy Management of Singapore, Teekay Shipping Canada, Vitol Singapore, Samsung South Korea, joint venture of Astra Oil (the Netherlands) and Excelerate
