

Rainy welcome at Cox's Bazar

The national cricketers took part in their first session in a rainy Cox's Bazar yesterday after arriving earlier in the afternoon.

After a recovery run in the beach, trainer Grant Luden informed that the cricketers will have a busy day today.

"There will be an explosive team building session where they will help each other in time trials. They have to carry sandbags and each other," he said.

Vettel's sixth in eight

Defending Formula One world champion Sebastian Vettel won the European Grand Prix here on Sunday to extend his lead in the overall standings with his sixth win in eight races.

The 23-year-old German dispelled any thoughts that his last lap error in Canada a fortnight ago which cost him victory would have an adverse effect on him as he coasted home in his Red Bull to beat Spain's Fernando Alonso in a Ferrari.

Vettel's Australian teammate Mark Webber was third. It was just the fourth time in Formula One history that all the drivers finished the race and first time since the Italian Grand Prix in 2005.

Great Britain's 2008 champion Lewis Hamilton for McLaren honoured his pledge to restrain his daredevil style and finish the race, taking fourth place.

Brazilian Felipe Massa in the second Ferrari and Briton Jenson Button, in the second McLaren, finished fifth and sixth.

German Nico Rosberg was seventh for Mercedes and Spaniard Jaime Alguersuari produced a stunning drive to take eighth for Toro Rosso with Germans Adrian Sutil ninth for Force India and Nick Heidfeld 10th for Renault.

"Ooooooh yes, baby!" screamed Vettel over his team radio after winning. "That is better than anything you can imagine this year. Yes. Yehhhh!"

Vettel, whose other two finishes this year were as runner-up, produced the perfect riposte to those who felt he might buckle under pressure.

Team chief Christian Horner paid tribute to Vettel.

"He just enjoyed this afternoon as you could see. He drove a fantastic race and

he got everything right. It was just perfect."

On a sweltering early summer afternoon by the Mediterranean, Vettel produced a start to match the weather as the air temperature rose beyond 30 degrees Celsius and the track temperature hit the high-40's.

This signalled potential degradation problems for the tyres, but Vettel made light of any concerns as he pulled clear without any fuss to lead by 1.3 seconds at the end of the opening lap.

Both McLarens were slow to pull off the grid and gave the Ferraris of Alonso and Massa an invitation to attack. Webber, caught in a scarlet pincer

move, managed to survive.

That left him second behind the champion with Alonso third, Massa fourth and Hamilton fifth at the end of the opening lap, Rosberg also having started well to find his way past Button into sixth.

The 2009 champion, however, was not content to bide his time and found a way past the young German with a late-braking move into Turn Two that lifted him into the top six.

The positions pretty much stayed the same in a race lacking in the drama from Canada a fortnight ago with only Alonso's daring overtaking of Webber enough to send the home crowd into ecstasy.

Shakib propels Worcs

Bangladesh captain Shakib Al Hasan's bowling-heavy form for Worcestershire continued as he was dismissed for just 5 while taking 4 wickets for 31 runs in Worcestershire's 41-run win over Yorkshire in their Friends Life t20 match at New Road, Worcester yesterday.

Shakib faced eight balls before he fell victim to Yorkshire medium pacer Rich Pyra, but teammates Moen Ali (40 off 20), Alexei Kervezee (56 off 36) and James Cameron (55 off 37) more than made up for it to take the

score to a formidable 183 for 7.

Like on Saturday against Leicestershire, breaking the back of the Yorkshire batting by claiming the four middle order wickets of Adam Lyth, Anthony McGrath, Joe Root and Ajmal Shahzad. His figures at one stage read 15 for 4 from three overs, but Shakib was taken for 16 in his last over.

Yorkshire's England cricketer Tim Bresnan tried to make a match out of it with some late order blows, but Yorkshire were always behind the eight-ball, and were eventually dismissed for 142 off the last ball of the 19th over.

SLPL to go on sans India

Sri Lanka Cricket will push ahead with its inaugural premier league with Australian and Pakistani players, despite a no-show by Indian stars, the island's sports minister said Sunday.

"We will lose a bit of money because Indian players are not coming but the tournament will be played as planned," Mahindananda Aluthgamage told AFP after failed talks to bring the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) on board.

Fast bowlers Praveen Kumar and Munaf Patel were among 12 Indian players who were blocked by the BCCI from playing in the T20 Sri Lankan Premier League (SLPL) from July 19 to August 4.

The minister said the Indian board's reluctance stemmed from media reports that the event was being organised by a Singapore-based company with alleged links to Lalit Modi, the sacked former boss of the Indian

Premier League.

"Mr Modi is not involved in our tournament. But we have to accept India's decision. We remain friends with India," Aluthgamage said.

The London-based Modi faces criminal charges, including false accounting, and accusations by the BCCI that more than 106 million dollars were misappropriated during his three-year tenure as IPL chairman.

The Singapore-based Somerset Entertainment Ventures, who won the marketing rights for five years, has already paid an advance of 300,000 dollars to Sri Lanka Cricket, the local Sunday Times newspaper reported.

It said India's reluctance had led to broadcaster ESPN withdrawing support for the tournament, which will feature seven teams and will include a mix of local and international players.

The newspaper said top Sri Lanka Cricket officials met Somerset chairman Sandeep M Bhammer and chief executive Kunal Bhargava on Friday for talks, but details of the discussion remained unclear.

Ilievski imparts pressing

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left to prepare themselves before the home match and it is yet to be found how quickly they can adopt to the new coach Ilievski's strategy.

"The standard of Bangladesh football is not like that of Brazil and they don't have a player like Messi," Ilievski said. "It is a game of eleven players and I prefer to emphasise on all of them, not just a single one."

ICC's crucial meeting on

Cricket's governing body began its annual conference on Sunday with all eyes on controversial proposals to scrap its rotating presidency and bar non-Test playing nations from the next World Cup.

The International Cricket Council (ICC) kicked off four days of meetings between the chief executives' committee and executive board, followed by a full council meeting on June 30, at a glitzy hotel in downtown Hong Kong.

The conference will consider moves, reportedly spearheaded by India and England, to scrap the two-year rotational presidency, although details of any new system remain unclear.

The proposal is expected to be met with vehement opposition from Pakistan and Bangladesh, who are scheduled to nominate the body's next-but-one leader to take power from 2014. Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) chairman Ijaz Butt told reporters before leaving for Hong Kong: "It's Pakistan's turn to nominate the president or the vice-president so we will not allow anyone to snatch that right."

"We have already shown our reservations on both the amendments and since the matter will be discussed at the meeting I am not going to make it more public."

The ICC will also review its unpopular decision to limit the 2015 World Cup, in Australia and New Zealand, to the 10 full-member teams -- excluding countries such as Ireland, the Netherlands, Canada and Kenya.

ICC president Sharad Pawar has asked his board to discuss the matter at the conference, with the governing body looking to avoid a repeat of the seven-week World Cup, deemed by some critics as unnecessarily lengthy.

Officials are believed to be in favour of retaining a 10-team limit but may consider a qualifying tournament that would give minor nations a chance of reaching the event.

Also on the agenda will be the issue of whether the ICC should adopt the controversial Decision Review System (DRS).

The ICC has announced its desire for the DRS, whereby teams will be allowed one incorrect referral per innings to the television umpire, to be used for all Tests, ODIs and International T20s.

Decisions would be checked using video, audio, ball-tracking and thermal-imaging technology in an innovation welcomed by most countries.

But powerful India, whose huge revenues give it a dominant position in the ICC, has never agreed to its use nor played a Test or one-day series when the DRS has been in operation.

Another epic by Novak, Marcos

Novak Djokovic and Marcos Baghdatis had the normally reserved Centre Court crowd rocking in the aisles on Saturday as they produced their second Wimbledon blockbuster in four years.

For the record, world number two Djokovic won 6-4, 4-6, 6-3, 6-4 but the scoreline fails to do justice to a match which had everything from temper tantrums to jaw-dropping rallies.

Serbia's Djokovic demolished his racket frame after one point that bordered on the preposterous at the end of the second set but despite feeling heavy-legged he resisted a furious barrage from the grinning Cypriot showman to reach the last 16.

The 24-year-old won 41 consecutive matches this year, including the Australian Open, but few of those wins provided the sheer sporting theatre that captivated 15,000 fans in Centre Court and millions around the world on television.

"I mean, playing here the last five years, there were not many moments when I saw practically all the Centre Court stadium on their feet," Djokovic, who faces French serve and volleyer Michael Llodra on Monday, told reporters.

"It was incredible really. It was exciting to see the Centre Court of Wimbledon being so enthusiastic about the match."

"Me as a player, I have to appreciate that and be happy I was a part of the exciting match."

Once, twice, three times Djokovic, poised to take over as world number one if Rafael Nadal fails to retain his title here, buried his racket frame into the dust patch behind the baseline until his shiny frame was in pieces -- the warning issued by the umpire almost drowned out by the din.

"I like to make sure," Djokovic, who beat Baghdatis in a five-hour epic Wimbledon quarterfinal in 2007, joked later.

TESTS THROUGH TIME



England's knight

Sir Ian Botham was the leading sports personality of his time, the anti-establishment paragon and possibly English cricket's first folk hero since the days of WG Grace. That is as much as can be said about his persona because much more significant was his on-field exploits.

His folk hero status originated from the 1981 Ashes in England which is otherwise known as 'Botham's Ashes'. Four years into his Test career, he was made captain and resigned the post after an unsuccessful tenure, and he was not in the best of states mentally. He bagged a pair in the second Test at Lord's and was not impressive with the ball either. These failures only kindled Botham's fierce competitive spirit, and what came next will forever be remembered as one of the most outrageously courageous displays of skill on a cricket pitch.

England headed to Headingley in Leeds one down in the six-match series and were in trouble pretty soon, following on after being bowled out for 174. Botham provided a glimpse of what was to follow with a swashbuckling 50 off 54 balls. In the second innings, 227 runs behind, England were disintegrating at 105 for 5 as Botham stroled out.

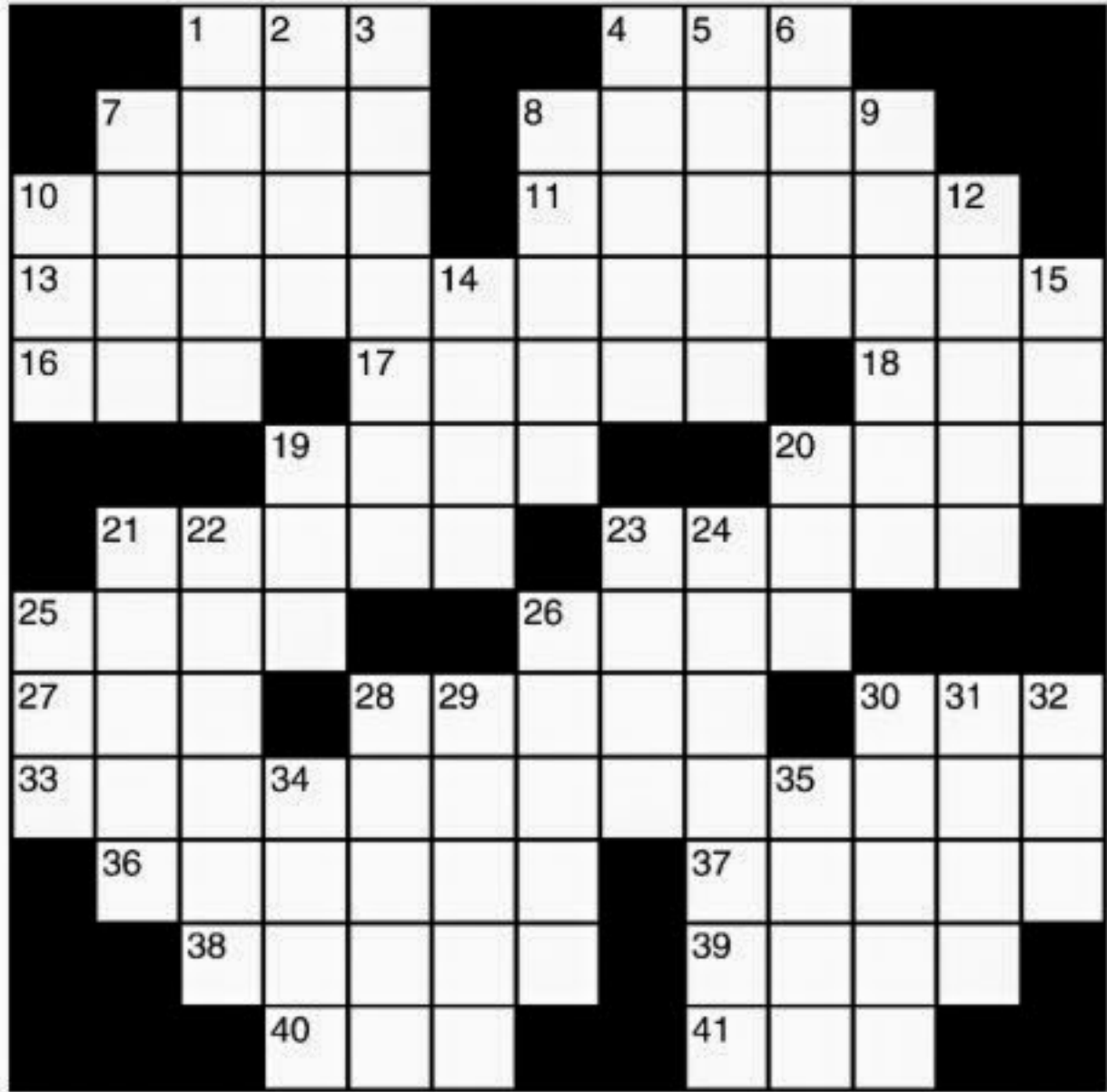
It was not just that he wiped out the deficit in the company of tail-enders Graham Dilley and Chris Old, neither that England's eventual lead of 130 allowed Bob Willis to put in a sensational bowling display to win the Test, but the fact that he scored those runs at better than a run a ball that turned the series on its head. He scored 149 off 148 balls, and 114 of those came in boundaries against an Aussie attack that could all but taste English blood.

He was far from satisfied with his Headingley display. There were two more performances, with the ball in the fourth Test and with the bat in the fifth, which left Australia shell-shocked. Chasing 151 to win at Edgbaston, Australia were 105 for 5 when Botham decided to have his say. They were 121 all out by the time he was finished with a spell in which he took 5 wickets for 1 run.

At Old Trafford, Australia trailed by 101 runs in the first innings and when they had England 104 for 5 and saw Botham coming in, the fielders must have been reassuring themselves that lightning could surely not strike the same place twice. It did. Botham scored 118 off 102 balls -- an innings that witnesses claim to be better than his Headingley scorcher. To hammer the final nail in, He took ten wickets in the final Test, which was drawn, as the Aussies surrendered the Ashes 3-1.

The myth established, Botham went from strength to strength, and was the highest Test wicket-taker with 383 wickets when he retired. The only significant black mark on his record was that he never scored a hundred against the best team of the day, the West Indies. He was never a disciplined cricketer and weight problems meant that his powers were on the wane near the end of his career. He retired in 1992, and England still have not stopped looking for the next Ian Botham.
