### Police intercept procession

Police yesterday barred a protest procession of National Committee to Protect Oil, Gas, Mineral Resources, Power and Ports from going to Shyamoli in the city.

The committee, protesting the government signing a product sharing contract with ConocoPhillips, an American oil company, held a rally in front of Mohammadpur Town Hall and tried to move towards Shyamoli.

Police also snatched their banner and detained two of the committee leaders for sometime before releasing them. The committee called a half-day hartal on July 3.

### JnU to open PhD programme

### Schoolboy drowns in Buriganga

A schoolboy drowned in the river Buriganga while taking bath with some of his friends at Farashganj Ghat yesterday.

The deceased Akash Sarkar, 12, son of late Dulal Sarkar of the city's Banglabazar, was a class VI student of Jubilee High School.

"I didn't want to let him go, as Akash didn't know how to swim. But he insisted," said his mother Beauty.

As Akash went under water, the other boys started screaming. Locals rescued and took him to Dhaka Medical College Hospital around 3:00pm. Akash died shortly afterwards.

## WAR CRIMES TRIAL

# US rights officials for global standard

Two senior officials of International Centre for Transitional Justice (ICTJ), a US-based human rights organisation, hoped that trial of 1971 crimes against humanity will be held up to international standards.

ICTJ Director (Asia) Patrick Burgess and Prosecutions Programme Director Marieke Wierda expressed the optimism while talking to reporters after a meeting with the prosecutors dealing with cases relating to the war crimes charges at their office at Old High Court Building in Dhaka yesterday afternoon.

"We hope that trial of the crimes committed during the liberation war of Bangladesh will be held maintaining transparency, neutrality and international standards, as the international community has attention to this trial," said Patrick Burgess.

He did not make any specific comment on the process of ongoing trial of war crimes charges, saying that the trial process is still now at the primary stage.

Chief Prosecutor Ghulam Arief Tipoo, however, said that the visiting ICTJ representatives have expressed satisfaction over the law, rules and ongoing process for holding trial of the war crimes charges.

Earlier, the ICTJ officials met the members of agency probing the allegations of the crimes against humanity.

# Gayoom for accelerating regional ties

Former president of the Maldives Mamun Abdul Gayoom yesterday urged the South Asian leaders to find new ways of accelerating regional cooperation for achieving the goals of South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (Saarc).

"We have to be practical and have to cordially understand what potentials we have and how best we can utilise the potentials," he said.

The leaders of Saarc should not have such dreams and ambitions that cannot be realised, he said, adding that they must be practical.

The former president of Maldives was speaking at a press conference at a city hotel organised by

University of Science and Technology of Chittagong (USTC).

Mamun Abdul Gayoom arrived here on Sunday on a four-day visit at the behest of USTC. During his visit, he will attend the university's fourth convocation to be held at Bangabandhu International Convention Centre on June 29.

The former president said the Saarc countries have not been able to achieve the goals of Saarc yet because of many problems.

"We set very high goals of ourselves and we have been able to achieve some of the goals not all because of many resources and other technical problems," said Gayoom.

But, he said, that does not mean

Saarc has failed. "It [Saarc] is going ahead," he said, hoping that the regional cooperation will have a great future.

About the ways to strengthen the regional cooperation, he said that the top leaders of Saarc have to have more commitment and dedication to accelerate the regional cooperation.

He said the private sectors of these countries have an important role to play in this regard.

"There must be more cooperation among the private sector of the Saarc countries," Gayoom added.

The former president gave a picture of educational situation of Maldives and also spoke about the issues like climate change, man-

power, and his foundation named Mamun Foundation that focuses on higher education, health care, environment, empowerment of women and promoting Islam.

About higher education, he said education is the basis of all development as it is not possible for any country to be developed without it.

"Higher education is a must for us, for our development and to be able to face the challenges of twenty first century and globalisation and to solve socio-economic problems," he added.

About climate change, Gayoom said it is a global problem and thus the solution is also global.

"We must address the real causes of climate changes," he said.

## Shafiur Rahman passes away

He was 80.

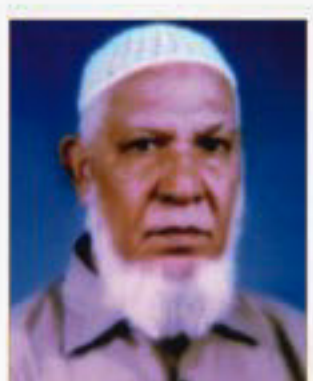
Born in 1931, Shafiur was a devoted admirer of classical music that led him to found the SSPG.

# Rural dev division to run fair price shops \$75m ADB loan for Khulna Wasa

Rural Development and Cooperatives Division (RDGD) under LGRD and cooperatives ministry will run eight fair price sales centres in the capital instead of Border Guard Bangladesh (BGB).

The ministry sources said the eight shops will be handed over to RDGD before the month of Ramadan to ensure fair prices of essential commodities.

The decision was taken at a meeting held in the ministry's conference room on Sunday with State Minister for LGRD and Cooperatives Jahangir Kabir Nanok was in the chair.

The government has a plan to start such kind of shops at 100 places across the country gradually. It has also a plan to set up a shop in each ward of the Dhaka City Corporation, said the ministry sources.

During the last caretaker government, 11 shops were run in the city to control the prices of essential under the "Operation Dal Bhat" initiative of the then BDR.

Location of the eight shops are Pallabi, Jatrabari wholesale market, Uttara wholesale market, Darussalam colony area, Mohakhali T&T colony, Manik Miah Avenue, South Side of Sangsad Bhaban and beside Shahinbagh colony.

The main goal of the initiative is to bring goods from farmers directly and sell it to the people to ensure fair prices of essential commodities.

UNB, Dhaka

The government yesterday signed a loan agreement of 75 million US dollar (approximately Tk 524 crore) with Asian Development Bank (ADB) to expand access to potable water in Khulna city.

Economics Relations Division (ERD) Secretary M Musharraf Hossain Bhuiyan and ADB country director Thevakumar Kandiah signed the agreement on behalf of their respective sides at NEC-II in the city.

The assistance will improve and extend water distribution network and water sources management in Khulna city and ensure professional and sustainable corporate management of Khulna Wasa.

The project will improve the access to the piped network from 23 percent in 2010 to 62 percent by 2018, benefiting about 710,000 persons in Khulna city.

The project will expand the access to water supply services by building a surface water treatment plant and extending the distribution network to cover the whole city.

"The project will contain water-borne diseases and improve the overall health condition in the city," said ADB Country Director Thevakumar Kandiah. "It will also reduce the drudgery of women who spend a daily average of 90 minutes managing water for the whole family."

He said after the project completed in 2017, the entire population of Khulna city will benefit from improved access to clean water round the clock.

## Punishment to torturer husband demanded

Speakers at a human chain programme yesterday demanded quick trial and exemplary punishment to Hasan Sayeed Sumon, who tortured and blinded his wife Rumana Manzur, a Dhaka University teacher, to stop recurrence of such an incident.

They also appealed to the government to ensure women's safety by implementing existing laws relating to women's rights.

For the Women By the Women Forum organised the event in front of Jatiya Press Club in the city.

Dhaka Development Forum, Jatiya Konna Shishu Advocacy Forum, Aparajeyo Bangladesh, ActionAid Bangladesh, Bangladesh Women's Health Coalition and Shachetan Nari Samaj expressed solidarity with the programme.

Rumana, an assistant professor of Department of International Relations and a postgraduate student at University of British Columbia in Canada, lost her eyesight as Sumon pushed his fingers into her eyes on June 5. He also gnawed Rumana's nose, cheek, and throat.

They said Rumana did not tell others about past incidents of torture by Sumon as she loved and trusted him very much.

Citing the example of Sutapa, a DU student allegedly killed by her in-laws, they said women very often do not get justice as the culprits go unpunished.
