Shaheed Munier Chowdhury Remembered

Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy arranged a memorial programme in honour of Shaheed Munier Chowdhury on June 28. The programme was held at the Studio Theatre Hall of the academy. A discussion and staging of Munier Chowdhury's play "Dando" were the highlights of the programme.

Chowdhury's student Professor Shamsuzzaman Khan, and Professor Israfil Shaheen of Department of Theatre, Dhaka University, spoke on the life and works of the personality. Currently the Director General of Bangla

Academy, Professor Khan, termed Chowdhury as "one of the finest teachers he had studied under." He also called Chowdhury "a progressive man." "His way of teaching literature was comprehensive. His ability to explain subject matters always mesmerised me," said Professor Khan.

Liaquat Ali Lucky, director general of Shilpakala Academy, presided over the discussion. Ali Ahmed, officer of the academy, gave the welcome speech.

After the discussion, the play was staged. Directed by Mohammad Jasimuddin, the play was a comedy addressing morals. The story follows a thief who breaks into a house

every night and overhears the elderly couple living in it. The husband accuses the wife of having extramarital affair with the family doctor, while the wife accuses him of pursu-

ing a relationship with another woman. Saki Farzana, Bidyut Sarkar and Mahbub Liton played the central characters. Fazle Rabbi designed the set, light and costume.

Shaheed Munier Chowdhury was born on November 27, 1925. Chowdhury attended Aligarh Muslim University and studied English Literature for his bachelor's degree in 1946, and master's at the Dhaka University in 1947. He completed his second MA in Bangla in 1954, and third in Linguistics in 1958 from Harvard University.

at Brojolal College in Khulna in 1947. He joined Dhaka University in 1950 and taught both English and Bengali between 1950 Chowdhury actively participated in the

Chowdhury started his teaching career

Language Movement (1952), and was imprisoned by the Pakistan government. He wrote the famous symbolic drama, "Kobor", during his imprisonment.

On December 14, 1971 Munier Chowdhury, along with other Bengali intellectuals, was abducted from his house and executed by the Pakistani army and its

Bankim Chandra: The First Prominent Bengali Novelist

Bankim Chandra Chattopadhyay is considere one of the greatest novelists of the subcontinent. Bengali novel practically began with him. He is widely regarded as a key figure in literary renaissance of Bengal as well as undivided India. Some of his writings, including novels, essays and commentaries, were a breakaway from the traditional verse-oriented writings, and provided an inspiration for authors. June 27 marked the 173rd birth anniversary

Bankim Chandra was born in the village Kanthalpara in Naihati, in an orthodox Bengali Brahmin family, to Jadab Chandra Chattopadhyay and Durga Debi. He was educated at the Mohsin College in Hooghly and later at the Presidency College, graduating with a degree in Arts in 1857. He was one of the first two graduates of the University of Calcutta. He later obtained a degree in Law as well, in 1869.

He was appointed as Deputy Collector of Jessore. Bankim Chandra went on to become a Deputy Magistrate, retiring from government service in 1891. His years at work were peppered with incidents that brought him into conflict with the ruling British. However, he was made a

Companion, Order of the Indian Empire in 1894. Following the model of Ishwarchandra Gupta, Bankim Chandra began his literary

career as a writer of verse. His first fiction to appear in print was "Rajmohan's Wife". Noted poet and essayist Rabiul Hussain said

about the literary icon, "Often referred to as the first modern novelist in the sub-continent Bankim Chandra Chattopadhyay fused the formal, Sanskritised Bengali with the colloquial/spoken language to forge a prose that everyone could grasp. Renowned poet and essayist Zahid Haider

said, "Bankim's novels are informative, entertaining and well composed. They can be categorised into three genres: historical romances, novels highlighting nationalist fervour, and those reflecting the socio-political and econom ical conditions in 19th century Bengal.' Novelist and short story writer Professor

Harunuzzaman said, "The first successful Bengali novelist, Bankim Chandra Chattopadhyay's works are very significant for the socio-political history of Bengal. For, his works called for the rise of Hindu nationalism. and as history has revealed, had cast an impenetrable gap between Hindu and Muslim

Veteran essayist Ahmed Sofa wrote in a literary journal, "Bankim and some other conservative 19th century thinkers had often sent their contemporary readers on the lunatic fringe and sparked many acts of communal violence". "Kapalkundala" (1866) was Bankim's first major publication. The heroine of this novel was modelled partly after Kalidasa's Shakuntala and partly Shakespeare's Miranda. However, the partial similarities are only inferential analysis by critics, and Bankim's heroine may be com-

In "Krishnakanter Will" (1878) Bankim produced a complex plot. In that complexity, critics saw resemblance of Western novels.

His final novel, "Sitaram" (1886), tells the story of a local Hindu lord, torn between his wife and the woman he desires, but unable to attain, making a series of blunders and taking arrogant, self-destructive decisions.

One of the aims of Bankim was to interest people in science and in the progress of the society and country. It was a time when educated Bengalis preferred speaking English instead of their own language. Bankim wanted to foster the love of the mother tongue in the educated Bengalis, and to make them share their knowledge with others through their lan-

Bankim Chandra passed away on April 8,


Veteran Bangladeshi photographer Amanul Haq was quite close to legendary filmmaker Satyajit Ray and declared that Ray was his guru. A leading publishing house, Sahitya Prokash, has recently published a photo album, titled "Prosongo Satyajit". The album features many rare images of the iconic figure shot by Haq. The photographer's informative texts accompanying the images add another dimension to this publication. Images depict the workaholic Ray's moods and expressions: at times solemn, and at others immersed in creative work, or just occupied with mundane

Ray's presence on a number of film sets and shooting spots has also been highlighted. The fact that the globally renowned helmer was a family man has also been focused on in the album. Some of the snaps reveal Ray's close association with Kali Banarjee, Ustad Ali Akbar khan, Chidananda Das Gupta, Subhash Mukhopadhyay, Ajit Kumar Guha, Marie Siton, Madhabi Mukherjee, Chhabi Biswas and other famed cultural personalities.

"In the mid '50s, I moved to Calcutta (Kolkata) from Dhaka and met Subhash Mukhopadhyay. Subhashda was very close to Satyajit Ray. He introduced me to Ray and I showed him my photographs. Ray told me that he had seen the images in one of the earlier issues of 'Notun Shahityo'. This intrigued me, and encouraged me to work with him," Haq reminisces. The low profile and introverted Haq goes on to say, "In my view, Satyajit Ray was a complete human being. Such individuals are rare."

In a journal, Ray wrote, "I have known Amanul Huq for more than 20 years as a photographer of imagination, skill and enterprise. Over the years, he has kept pace with technical developments and has used them to further his aims as a creative interpreter of actuality. For over a generation, he has virtually recorded every aspect of life in his country, revealing a deep love for Bengali life and culture in all its manifestations. He also has the potential to portray it in film, in documentary form, having been a keen student of the cinema and an observer of my working methods in the early '60s."

Bijoya Ray, Satyajit's wife, was greatly appreciative of Haq's talents. In her book, "Amader Kotha", she wrote, "A young man named Amanul Huq came to our house in

1959. His good manners won us over. Manik (Satyajit) liked him and allowed Amanul to photograph him. Amanul became very close to us, even though for a short period." British film critic Marie Seton wrote

book on Ray, titled, "Portrait of A Director: Satyajit Ray". Recalling her meeting with Haq, she wrote, "Early in March 1962, and for approximately a year, I saw a considerable amount of Mr. Amanul


Haq and his work. I met him with Mr. Satyajit Ray in Calcutta when I went there to stay for the purpose of writing a book on Mr. Ray's work. I am very deeply impressed by the range of his (Haq's) work, his compositions and the way he captures authenticity at a single moment I think Mr. Haq is a very outstanding photographer. Mr. Satyajit Ray has the utmost admiration for Mr. Hag over a period of many years."

Actress Michelle Yeoh blacklisted, deported from Myanmar

Authorities in Myanmar have deported Hollywood actress Michelle Yeoh who plans to play prodemocracy leader Aung San Suu Kyi in an upcoming film, an immigration official said on Tuesday.

Yeoh, a Malaysian known for playing Chinese spy Wai Lin alongside Pierce Brosnan in the 1997 James Bond film "Tomorrow Never Dies" among other high profile roles, was detained on arrival at Yangon's international airport on June 22 and sent out of the country on the next flight. "She was deported on the same

day because she is on a blacklist," the official told Reuters, requesting anonymity because she was not authorised to talk to the media. Yeoh, 48, has been in Thailand,

Britain and France filming scenes for the film "The Lady", as Suu Kyi is known in Myanmar. The film is due to be released in October. Suu Kyi, a Nobel laureate and figurehead of Myanmar's fight

against military dictatorship, met Yeoh to discuss the film at her lakeside home in Yangon last December, three weeks after her release from a seven year stint of house arrest.

"The Lady" is a love story about Suu Kyi and her late British husband Michael Aris, and details their long separation while Suu Kyi was detained in 1989.
