Platini 'loves' Mourinho

UEFA boss Michel Platini says he loves Real Madrid coach Jose Mourinho even if he said "stupid things" about favouritism that led to a three-match ban.

"I have a special affection for him. I love Mourinho," Platini said in an interview with Spanish sports daily La Marca published Thursday.

"I like the man. His personality and as a coach. That does not take away the fact that the UEFA displinary bodies are going to deal with him," he said in Nyon, Switzerland.

"He said stupid things. That is why the disciplinary committee acted and decided to sanction him."

Real Madrid's appeal against the threematch ban handed to 48-year-old Mourinho for his comments after the first leg of Real's Champions League semi-final defeat by Barcelona will be heard on July 29.

European football's governing body gave three-match European ban to Mourinho, with one match suspended, after he made allegations of favouritism towards Barcelona during the April 27 game.

He was also ordered to pay a 50,000-euro (72,000 dollars) fine.

"I know that you in the newspapers have written or will write that Platini intervened (in the sanction)... it is not true," Platini said. "I don't deal with disciplinary matters or referees," he added.

Birmingham owner charged

Birmingham City owner Carson Yeung, a one-time hairdresser turned football tycoon, appeared in court in Hong Kong Thursday charged with money-laundering, a day after being

arrested by police. A sombre-looking Yeung, 51, declined to comment as he pushed his way through a scrum of reporters to a

waiting minivan after being released on HK\$7 million (\$900,000) bail following a brief appearance at the magistrates court. The millionaire, whose club was relegated from the Premier League last

month, was required to surrender his passport and report regularly to police as part of his bail conditions.

Yeung was arrested on Wednesday after narcotics bureau officers

searched two locations and seized documents.

The charge sheet detailed "five counts of dealing with property known or believed to represent proceeds of an indictable offence", but the nature of the alleged offence was not clear.

Prosecutors said investigations had revealed around HK\$720 million (\$92 million) passing through accounts connected with Yeung.

His lawyer, Daniel Marash, cast doubt on the allegations.

"He has two bank accounts with a lot of money in them but all they're saying is that he has got a lot of money and hasn't paid a lot of tax," he told reporters outside court Thursday. "You cannot assume it's taxable."

The fact prosecutors declined to identify the allegedly criminal origin of the money showed the weakness of their case, he added.

"I think if they could specify it, they

would," Marash said.

The next hearing was set for August. Yeung took control of Birmingham in October 2009 in an 81 million pound (\$130 million) takeover from David Sullivan and David Gold, now the coowners of West Ham.

The club revealed late on Wednesday that Yeung was assisting Hong Kong police in relation to criminal investigations.

Birmingham's acting chairman Peter Pannu insisted the inquiries did not affect the Midlands club's parent company, Birmingham International Holdings, whose Hong Kong-listed shares were suspended from trading Thursday.

The company's lawyers had informed Pannu that the police inquiries "have nothing to do with the operation of BIHL in Hong Kong and therefore nothing to do with the operation of the club, and relate to other matters",

Football's governing body FIFA on Wednesday criticised Nigeria coach Eucharia Uche for branding homosexuality as 'dirty' and admitting she forced lesbians out of her team.

"FIFA is against all forms of discrimination," Tatjana Haenni, FIFA's head of women's competitions, told German television channel ARD.

Haenni said FIFA will be talking to Uche about her comments and reminding the coach of the governing bodies statutes.

In a mission statement, FIFA says it wants to use the sport in 'overcoming social and cultural obstacles for women with the ultimate aim of improving women's standing in society'.

"We are here at a FIFA event and will point out that it would be best to express oneself neutrally," said Haenni.

Uche sparked controversy in a New York stopper Nadine Angerer is openly bisexual.
