This does not mean you do not adapt but that you remain steadfast on your foundation, the one that your parents and your teachers spent years helping you build. Don't do things that will shame your family or teachers.

6. Don't quit before finishing your studies.

7. Stay on top of coursework: In four years of a demanding engineering education, I never stayed up all night to study. My secret was to stay ahead of my

8. Avoid vices: Pick sensible friends 4. Producer, not consumer: the world who will not lead you astray. Learn to deal with temptation: avoid drugs and alcohol; don't overeat. But don't become a monk or a nun either - enjoy your youth which comes only once.

9. Teachers: Show respect to teachers, work with them and learn the most from them. Don't be shy about negotiating better grades if you believe you deserve better, and can prove it.

10. New situations: You will always face new situations, sometimes in urgent circumstances. Be unwavering in your faith. Don't panic or give in easily. Take your time making a decision. Avoid shortcuts.

### 6 killed in city road crashes

Six people, including a schoolboy and a nurse, were killed in five road crashes in the city yesterday. The deceased were Shabnam Mushtari, 24, a nurse of

Ibrahim Cardiac Hospital and Research Institute at Shahbagh; Mohammad Limon, 9, a class IV student of Pallabi Govt Primary School and also a helper of a human haular; Kirwan Murong, 22, a security guard of a garment factory at Banani; Shariful Islam, 32, a security guard; Khorshed Alam, 20, a helper of an air conditioner technician; and Khorshed's cousin Shah Alam.

Shabnam was run over by a Farmgate-bound bus of 'Bihanga Paribahan' while she was crossing the road in Bangla Motor area around 1:00pm.

Limon was killed when he fell down on a road from the rear of a speeding tempo and was hit by a covered van from behind at Pallabi. Witnesses said the covered van first hit the tempo while

Limon was standing at the rear at Lalmati Tempo Stand in Mirpur around 9:00am.

Police said locals caught the vehicle driver and handed him over to police.

Kirwan Murong was killed when an airport-bound speeding microbus hit him near Banani Chairmanbari area at about 12:15am while he was crossing the road.

The microbus fled after the accident.

Shariful Islam, of Nalitabari in Sherpur, was killed as an unidentified vehicle crushed him on Dhaka-Mymensingh road near Khilkhet Police Station around 4:30am.

Khorshed Alam and his cousin Shah Alam were killed when a speedy pickup van hit them while they were crossing Dhaka-Mymensingh highway near Khilkhet over bridge around 7:30pm.

#### Cocktail hurled at **DUVC**

Unidentified criminals threw a cocktail at Vice Chancellor (VC) of Dhaka University Prof AAMS Arifin Siddiqui on the campus yesterday evening.

The cocktail exploded near IER, a few metres away from the VC, while he was going to his office in the Registrar's Building around 6:00pm. The incident took place

on the eve of two-day strike on the campus called by Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) from today.

The VC suspected that the cocktail might have been hurled at him to create panic ahead of the strike.

"Academic activities will not be hampered due to this attack. We will run classes and other activities during the strike," he said.

OC of Shahbagh Rezaul said it was a cracker, which was not life risking.

Two other cocktails exploded in front of National Museum in the evening, said police.

### Govt barring pre-hartal activities: Prof Anu

The National Committee to Protect Oil, Gas, Mineral Resources, Power and Ports yesterday alleged government's obstruction in its activities ahead of the half-day hartal called for tomorrow (Sunday) in protest against signing production-sharing contract (PSC) with US-based oil company ConcoPhillips for gas exploration in the Bay of Bengal.

"Police are preventing our activists from distributing leaflets published in justification of the protest, charging baton on our gatherings, and arresting the activists," said Prof Anu Muhammad, general secretary of the platform.

Eight activists of the committee have been arrested in the last three days, he said while addressing a rally in front of

Jatiya Press Club in the city yesterday. On June 18, the national committee called the half-day

hartal, which was later supported by different organisations.

Meanwhile, Islami Andolan Bangladesh (IAB) called a half-day hartal for tomorrow, which coincides exactly with the length and time of the hartal called by the national committee.

Prof Anu Muhammad termed the IAB hartal a government's conspiracy to foil the their protest.
