SWAN CONFERENCE ENDS

Call for peace, green economy

The two-day conference of South Asian Women's Network (SWAN) ended in the capital yesterday adopting a Dhaka Declaration with a call for establishing peace in the region and strengthening life-giving traditions.

"The resources of the earth are for the welfare of all, not the profits of a few. They generate creative and dignified livelihoods and they provide the basis for poverty alleviation," says a statement by SWAN calling for green ways of economy that is diverse, decentralised and a path of empowerment for all.

It said, "Today, those who have created the ecological crisis talk of the Green

Economy. For them, the Green Economy is appropriating the remaining resources of the planet for profit."

According to the SWAN conference privatisation and commoditisation of nature, her species and ecosystem cannot be a part of green economy.

The conference considered the status of women of Afghanistan as a critical concern of all women in the region and called for building peace.

As for Bangladesh, internationally acclaimed legal expert Irene Khan said the court in Bangladesh has given some very progressive rulings on equal rights of women, but the political leaders here have not moved accordingly

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WAR CRIMES TRIAL

Rules amended to protect witnesses

The International Crimes Tribunal has incorporated the provision of protecting witnesses and victims of the 1971 war crimes after bringing amendments to its rules of procedure.

Exercising the power as provided under section 22 in the International Crimes (Tribunal) Act 1973, the tribunal also amended 22 sections to its rules, said Md Shahinur Islam, registrar of the tribunal, yesterday.

Addressing a press briefing on the tribunal premises in the capital, Shahinur said, "The tribunal has brought the amendments to its rules for the second time to make the whole trial process effective and acceptable."

The latest amendments were published as official gazette on June 28.

The tribunal made the first amendments to its rules in October 2010 to stipulate that anyone being investigated for

Fraudsters swindle Tk 150cr, disappear
