Many may miss amnesty chance

Malaysian employers unwilling to pay levy for regularisation of illegal workers

A large number of undocumented Bangladeshi workers in Malaysia might be left out of the regularisation process due to refusal of many employers to pay the levy they are supposed to pay for the foreign workers.

There are around five lakh Bangladeshi workers in Malaysia with an estimated three lakh of them undocumented. And almost all of them want to stay back and work, said officials at the Bangladesh high commission in Kuala Lumpur.

Late last month, Malaysia offered amnesty to irregular foreign workers, giving them opportunity to get regularised for jobs or return home without facingpenalty.


Those unregistered will face arrest and punishment.

For regularisation, the workers must get registered with the government. The registration process will begin on July 18 and continue for two weeks.

Transit for only peaceful purposes

Says Indian external affairs minister, leaves Dhaka

Indian External Affairs Minister SM Krishna yesterday asserted that the transit through Bangladesh is for peaceful purposes only.

Transit is for improving the lives of people. It will spur economic growth and development on both sides of the border; it is not simply a flow of goods and services across frontiers in the context of transit, he said while delivering a lecture prior to his departure from Dhaka ending his

three-day visit here.

Bangladesh International Institute of Strategic Studies organised the lecture on "India and Bangladesh: Partners in Progress" at its auditorium yesterday morning.

Replying to a question from the audience, he said India would transport only goods if the transit is given. He said India is always a peaceloving country and it wants peace, prosperity and stability in the region and also throughout the world.

He said there is no way India,

which extended tremendous support during Bangladesh's birth, could do anything that goes against Bangladesh. Highly praising Bangladesh for its recent economic development, Krishna said Bangladesh thanks to the achievements has reached the centre-stage of global affairs.

On Indo-Bangladesh commonality, the minister said India and Bangladesh have a natural propensity to work together in varied and

EU supports social business

ness and promoting innovative methods of accessible finance are not only a matter of justice but also a concrete way to help the poorest of the poor, **European Commission** President José Manuel Barroso has said.

He said social business is also "a smart investment in our shared future. The European Commission will therefore continue its substantial aid to microcredit projects across the globe."

The European Commission president made the remarks after a meeting with Nobel Laureate Prof Muhammad Yunus at his office in Strasbourg in France on Wednesday, said a statement from Yunus Centre yesterday.

They talked about the role of the EU in promoting microcredit and social business across the world. Prof Yunus thanked Barroso for his support for social business that could be a concrete way to solve social problems around the globe.

The two also discussed the introduction of appropriate laws and regulations in the European Parliament that would support social business. After the meeting, Barroso told the press: "I

MOLESTATION Victim off to Singapore for treatment

The class-X student of Viqarunnisa Noon School and College, who was molested allegedly by her teacher, went to Singapore for treatment Thursday night.

She will undergo treatment at Mount Elizabeth Hospital for the elbow injury she sustained during the incident. She got hurt when accused Porimol Joydhor tied her hands, said victim's grandfather.

Her parents and brother accompanied her to Singapore, he said, adding that the victim's father, who has a heart condition, fell sick on Monday and he also needs better medical care.

Asked whether their absence would affect the case, the grandfather said saving lives is the priority now and the rest depends on the people of the country and the media.

He also claimed of receiving threats over the phone from anonymous callers.

According to the victim's written complaint to the school authorities, Porimol, a teacher of Bangla department of the school's Bashundhara branch, sexually assaulted her for the first time on May 28 and then again on June 17 when she went to his coaching centre at his residence in Badda. The incident sparked a
