Mukund learns from father

India opener Abhinav Mukund said a piece of sage advice from his father and his ability to cope with short-pitched bowling have helped him on the current trip to the Caribbean.

The left-hander scored 62 to help India to 308 for six at stumps on Day Three of the third Test against the West Indies on Friday at Windsor Park, giving them a first innings lead so far of 104.

Mukund, playing in only his third Test, was relieved to pass 50 for the first time.

"I have played a lot on matting pitches while I was growing up," he said. "My dad always told me that a lot of deliveries in international cricket are short-pitched, so I practised this a lot, and can play short bowling pretty well."

Mukund said he still found it difficult to adapt to the pitches in the first two Tests in Jamaica and Barbados, where the fast bowlers gained appreciable bounce and movement.

Suraj Randiv's maiden five-wicket haul did the bulk of the damage as Sri Lanka held England to 268 for nine in the fifth and final one-day international at Old Trafford here on Saturday.

Off-spinner Randiv took five for 42 during his maximum 10 overs in a match where a win for either side would give them a 3-2 series win.

Dhammika Prasad, in for injured fellow seamer Suranga Lakmal, responded impressively with two for 26 in six overs.

England lost wickets either side of a fourthwicket stand of 118 between Jonathan Trott (72) and Eoin Morgan (57) after captain Alastair Cook won the toss and batted in initially overcast conditions.

Craig Kieswetter (43) and Cook (31), who'd shared an unbroken

stand of 171 in England's crushing 10-wicket win at Trent Bridge on Wednesday, enjoyed another rapid first wicket stand.

But from 85 without loss, England slumped as three wickets fell for 10 runs in 19 balls.

They scored a six and eight fours in the first nine overs but only managed five fours in the next 41.

Cook, who had made 119 and 95 not out in his previous two innings, was deceived by a ball from the 26-year-old Randiv that turned sharply away from the left-hander and was stumped by Kumar Sangakkara.

Kieswetter, who hit five fours and a six, was then bowled by a ball that kept low from Prasad. His exit meant England now had two batsmen at the crease on nought in Trott and

Kevin Pietersen. And Pietersen managed just five when he was caught behind off Prasad.

Trott completed his patient fifty in 63 balls with two boundaries, with former Ireland international Morgan reaching the landmark in 54 balls but with just the one four.

India captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni led four batsmen with half-centuries that put his side in

a formidable position in the third Test against West Indies on Friday. Dhoni, a struggler for

most of the series, was unbeaten on 65, propelling India to 308 for six, replying to West Indies' first innings total of 204 at stumps on the third day of the rain-hit game at Windsor Park.

Left-handed opener Abhinav Mukund supported with 62, V.V.S. Laxman scored 56 and Suresh Raina made 50.

The visitors took advantage of a West Indies attack hamstrung by an illness that sidelined fast bowler Ravi Rampaul to give their strongest batting performance of the series.

Dhoni added 103 for the sixth wicket with Raina either side of tea, taking the fire out a West Indies fightback

which saw India reach 182 for five at the break. The India captain reached his 50 from 96 balls, tapping a delivery from his opposite number Darren Sammy to mid-off for a single that also brought him his 3,000th Test run. He has so far struck just three boundaries

from 109 balls. Raina brought his 50 up in 102 balls, work-

ing a delivery from Devendra Bishoo into square leg for a single.

Bolt sets Paris alight

Jamaican sprint star Usain Bolt stole the limelight of a highquality Diamond League meeting on Friday, dominating the field to win the men's 200m with ease.

Bolt, in just his second 200m of the season after setting a world lead of 19.86sec in Oslo last month, masterfully negotiated the curve before opening up down the home stretch to put a distance between himself and the field.

The 24-year-old eased up well before the line but still managed to clock 20.03sec ahead of France's triple European champion Christophe Lemaitre (20.21) and American veteran Darvis Patton (20.59).

"It was windy out there and I got cold in the delay," said the double world and Olympic sprint champion in reference to a delay of several minutes caused by a breakdown of the starters' equipment.

"In the straight my legs didn't feel good, but I got through injury free."

Controversial South Africans Oscar Pistorius and Caster Semenya had mixed evenings in the men's 400m and the women's 800m.

Pistorius, who is a double leg amputee now cleared to run in able-bodied races, failed in his bid to get the qualifying time of 45.25sec to compete at the August 27-September 4 world championships in Daegu, South Korea, coming in fifth in 45.84sec, Christopher Brown of the Bahamas victorious.


"I was hoping to do a bit better because I'm still running behind the minimum time for Daegu," said Pistorius, who uses artificial legs: springy, lightweight, J-shaped limbs called "Cheetahs".

"But I think I should be pretty happy, especially being in the first lane where the curve was very tight: it wasn't an advantage for me."

It was smiles for Semenya, however, after two disastrous previous outings. The world 800m champion, forced into a lay-off because

of doubts over her true gender, shrugged off a sluggish first lap to win the two-lap event in 2:00.18. "It's a good feeling to win here but I expected a faster

race," said Semenya. "Now I need to go back home and train hard for the world championships." Kiwi Valerie Adams scored a morale-boosting victory over fierce Belarus rival Nadezhda Ostapchuk in the women's

Welcome back

When the Indian legend Kapil Dev bowled to Jimmy Cook on a crisp November 1991 morning at the Eden Gardens in Kolkata, the world had officially changed.

South Africa were being reinstated into the civilized world after half a century of Apartheid rule and in a hastily organised series, India decided to host the social pariahs for their first-ever encounter as sovereign nations.

The process began the year before after the National Party government in South Africa took the first step towards dismantling discrimination when it lifted the ban on the African National Congress and other political organisations. Nelson Mandela, the ANC stalwart who was imprisoned in Robben Island for 27 years, walked out a free man and became the president of South Africa after its first universal elections in 1994.

But before Mandela could become the head of the country, he kept tabs on the historic return Test match of South Africa. After the Basil D'Oliveira incident in 1968 and the subsequent suspension by the ICC in 1970, South Africa returned to Tests in 1992 when they toured the West Indies.

After an impressive performance at the World Cup, Kepler Wessels led a highly talented side to the Kensington Oval in Bridgetown, Barbados the spiritual home of West Indies cricket.

In an attack led by the fearsome Alan Donald, it was Richard Snell, coming in at second change, who took out openers Desmond Haynes, Phil Simmons, captain Richie Richardson and Kenny Benjamin in the first innings as West Indies were all out for 262.

South Africa gave an apt riposte with opener Andrew Hudson eking out 153 in an innings that spanned more than eight hours. He survived two missed chances: on 22 by Courney Walsh at long leg from the first ball Curtly Ambrose had banged in really short to him, and again on 66 by West Indies' new wicketkeeper, David Williams, off Patrick Patterson.

With help from skipper Wessels and all-rounder Adrian Kuiper, Hudson helped South Africa (345 all out) take a 83-run lead. Jimmy Adams and Brian Lara fought hard to give the first time tourists a fight but West Indies made only 283 in the second innings, leaving South Africa just 201 to win.

Debutant Adams was at his dogged best, hitting eleven boundaries in an unbeaten 79 while Lara fell for 64 to Donald who took four wickets. Snell impressed again, picking up four more and it was all down to the South African batsmen.

They began solidly as Day Four ended on a bright note for them. Beginning the final day on 122-2, only the bravest would have put money on a West Indies win but that is exactly what happened. The story goes that Richardson roused his two front-man-Walsh and

Ambrose into bowling a spell that defied belief. After getting rid of Wessels for 74, the duo barged into South Africa's batsmen, Walsh taking four for eight in 11 overs. Cutting the ball both ways, he finally found the form that eluded him earlier. Ambrose mopped up the tail as parity, at least for the time being, was restored.

It was a sign of things to come as South Africa are one of the top sides in world cricket at the moment and since that day in 1992, have presented some outstanding cricketers.
