Pak defiant as US halts \$800m aid

The Pakistani military was defiant yesterday after Washington said it would suspend \$800 million worth of security aid, saying it was capable of fighting Islamists without US assistance.

"The army in the past as well as at present, has conducted successful military operations using its own resources without any external support whatsoever," military spokesman Major General Athar Abbas told AFP.

Abbas said the military had not been officially informed of the decision to suspend aid.

US President Barack Obama's chief of staff, William Daley, confirmed in a television interview on Sunday that the United States has decided to withhold almost a third of its annual \$2.7 billion security assistance to Islamabad.

Relations between the key allies in the war on Al-Qaeda drastically worsened after US commandos killed Osama bin Laden in Pakistan in May, humiliating the Pakistani military and opening it to allegations of complicity or incompetence.

Abbas referred AFP to an extraordinary

statement issued by army chief of staff General Ashfaq Kayani on June 9 as part of the bin Laden fallout, which recommended that US military aid be redirected towards civilians.

The US move was welcomed by Pakistan's neighbour and rival India.

"It is not desirable that this region had to be heavily armed by the US," External Affairs Minister S.M. Krishna said according to the PTI news agency, adding that the spending would upset the regional power balance.

The suspended aid includes about \$300 million to reimburse Pakistan for some of the costs of deploying more than 100,000 soldiers along the Afghan border, according to the New York Times.

Pakistan says it has 140,000 soldiers in the northwest, more than the 99,000 American troops in Afghanistan, fighting a local Taliban insurgency.

The United States has long called on Pakistan to do more to crack down on militants, such as the Al-Qaeda-linked Haqqani network, who use its soil to attack within Afghanistan, but the army says its troops are too over-stretched.

Egypt protest enters day 4 REUTERS, Cairo

More than 2,000 Egyptians braved sweltering heat yesterday for a fourth day of protests aimed at pressing Egypt's military rulers to enact swifter reforms and speed up the prosecution of Hosni Mubarak and his allies.

The protesters have halted traffic through Cairo's Tahrir Square, a major thoroughfare and the heart of the protest movement that brought down Mubarak on February 11. Tents where some have camped stand on traffic islands in the square.

In Egypt's second biggest city of Alexandria, about 100 protesters were also camped in one of the city's main squares.

Anger has been driven by what protesters say is the ruling military council's failure to deliver on promises. One of the main demands is a swift trial for those who killed protesters.

India hails US suspending aid to Pakistan

India yesterday welcomed the United States' decision to suspend \$ 800 million military aid to Pakistan, saying a heavy presence of arms would have disturbed the equilibrium in the region.

"With reference to the special circumstances between India and Pakistan and how India has consistently taken the view that it is not desirable that this region had to be heavily armed by the US which will upset the equilibrium in the region itself. To that extent India welcomes this step,' External Affairs Minister S M Krishna told reporters here.

Indian Union Cabinet reshuffle today

Indian Premier Manmohan Singh will undertake a reshuffle of his Council of Ministers today inducting some new faces and possibly dropping a few ministers.

Trinamool Congress Chief Whip in Lok Sabha Sudip Bandhopadhyay is likely to be inducted as a junior minister while his party colleague and Minister of State for Health Dinesh Trivedi is tipped to be promoted to cabinet rank and shifted to Railway Ministry.

The Railway portfolio became vacant since Trinamool Congress chief Mamata Banerjee resigned and took over as Chief Minister of West Bengal. The reshuffle exercise was fine tuned at a

meeting the PM and Congress President Sonia Gandhi had yesterday morning.

The reshuffle may not cover the ministers of Finance, Home, Defence and External Affairs.

With Uttar Pradesh set to go to assembly

polls next year, Minister of State for Steel with independent charge Beni Prasad Verma is likely to be promoted as a cabinet Minister while Raj Babbar, a lawmaker from Agra, may find a berth.

Those speculated for promotion junior to full cabinet ministers include Jyotiraditya Scindia, junior minister of Telecom.

The resignation of Textiles Minister Dayanidhi Maran of DMK in the wake of his being named in 2G telecom spectrum allocation scam and the resignation offer by Corporate Affairs Minister Murli Deora has lent urgency to the reshuffle.

Another DMK representative A Raja quit as Teleocm Minister in connection with 2G scam in November. Those who may make the exit include Minister for Development of North East Region B K Handique whose place may be taken by Pabansingh Ghatowar, MP from Dibrugarh in Assam.

WAR CRIMES TRIAL

Uganda charges rebel commander

Uganda opened its first war crimes trial yesterday, charging a commander of the Lord's Resistance Army rebellion blamed for brutal civilian murders during a 20-year war in the north of the country.

Thomas Kwoyelo was charged before the International Crimes Division court in the northern town of Gulu with 53 counts of wilful killing, hostage taking, destruction of property and causing injury.

The 39-year-old Kwoyelo denied the charges arising from his role as a "colonel" under the command of the LRA supremo Joseph Kony.

US Defence Secy blames Iran

US Defence Secretary Leon Panetta has said that his country will act "uniterally" to confront what he said were Iranian threats to US interests in Iraq.

Speaking during his first visit to Baghdad since taking office on July 1, Panetta said yesterday that the US was "very concerned about Iran and the weapons they are providing to extremists here in Iraq".

He blamed weapon supplies from Iran for the increase in violence in June, the deadliest month for US troops in Iraq in two years.

"In June we lost a hell of a lot of Americans as a result of those attacks. And we cannot just simply stand back and allow this to continue to happen," he said.

Panetta said Washington's first effort would be to press the Iraqi government and military to go after the Shia groups he said were responsible for the attacks.

"Secondly, to do what we have to do uni-

laterally, to be able to go after those threats as well, and we're doing that," he said, referring to the right of US forces to defend

themselves on Iraqi soil.

"And thirdly, to bring pressure on Iran to not engage in this kind of behaviour. "Because, very frankly, they

need to know that our first responsibility is to protect those that are defending our country. And that is

something we are going to do." Underscoring US concerns over independent armed groups, three rockets landed

in Baghdad's Green Zone after Panetta's arrival, Iraqi police told the AP news agency. US troop uncertainty

Panetta is holding closed-door meetings with Iraqi officials during his visit and is expected to press them for a decision on whether they will allow US troops to remain in the country past an official withdrawal deadline at the end of the year.

Obese British man in court fights for surgery

A British man weighing 22 stone (139 kilograms, 306 pounds) launched a court appeal yesterday against a decision to refuse him state-funded obesity surgery because he is not fat enough.

Tom Condliff, 62, says he needs stomach surgery to save his life, but the state-run National Health Service refuses to fund a laparoscopic gastric bypass operation.

The High Court refused to quash the decision in April, and Condliff took his fight yesterday to the Court of Appeal, in what is expected to be a two-day hearing. The former policeman became obese

due to drugs he takes to treat long-term diabetes. He takes 28 different drugs and

uses breathing masks and inhalers. In April, the court heard that his body

mass index, at more than 40, was below the threshold of 50 at which his local health authority in Staffordshire, central England, would pay for surgery.

In that hearing, the judge said Condliff had tried non-surgical ways to lose weight but had failed, adding that everyone agreed surgery was "clinically appropriate" for him.

However, the judge ruled the NHS had not breached the article of the European Convention on Human Rights under which Condliff had lodged his claim.

Britain has the highest obesity level in Europe, with 24.5 percent of adults classed as obese, according to a study released in December by the European Commission and the OECD. The European Union average is 14 percent.

Three die in China coal mine rescue

Three rescuers died as they tried to help workers trapped in a colliery in eastern China, local authorities said yesterday, as 21 people remained stuck in another mine in the same region.

The three rescue workers were trying to reach miners trapped in a colliery in Shandong province's Zaozhuang city after a fire broke out underground on Wednesday evening, according to the local government.

One of the rescuers collapsed underground due to the extreme heat, then two other relief workers tried to save him but they too fell and lost consciousness, it said in a statement.

Other rescuers came up behind them and carried them to the surface, but the three had died, it added. According to the last official tally on Friday, 28 people were trapped underground.

The news comes as 21 workers remain trapped underground in another mine in Shandong, after water flooded an iron ore pit in Weifang city on Sunday, local authorities said.
