

Hostel closed  
as Buddhist  
students clash

A Buddhist hostel for Chittagong University students was closed yesterday for the next seven days following a clash among the resident students that left three of them hurt Tuesday night.

Wounded are Ajit Chakma, masters student of sociology department; Shimon Chakma, 2nd year student of communication and journalism department; and Sohel Chakma, 2nd year student of dramatics department of CU.

Shimon and Sohel are now under treatment in Chittagong Medical College Hospital.

Witnesses said supporters of Parbata Chatram Jana Sanghati Samity (PCJSS) and United People's Democratic Front (UPDF) were locked into the clash following an altercation inside the hostel. Ajit supports PCJSS while Shimon and Sohel support UPDF, they said.

Some 78 Buddhist students of Chittagong University reside in the Buddhist hostel "Gobinda-Gunalankar Boudha Chhatrabash" of Bishwa Shanti Pagoda, near the university campus.

## Checking poll expense a big challenge

Says chief election commissioner

The major challenge of the Election Commission lies in checking campaigning expenditure in both parliamentary and local government elections, according to the commission head.

Despite repeated attempts, the commission cannot control excessive spending for election campaigning, as it is an invisible offence, said Chief Election Commissioner Dr ATM Shamsul Huda. "It is not a problem only in

our country, but in most of the democracies around the world."

Dr Huda was speaking at a dialogue with Bangladesh Islami Front at the commission's secretariat in the city as part of its ongoing dialogue with the registered political parties.

About post-poll violence, the CEC said that in most cases, defeated parties attacked the winners after announcement of result. It indicates the contenders cannot tolerate accepting defeat. This culture should end for democracy to flourish, he added.

Election Commissioner M Sakhawat Hussain stressed the need for reviewing existing laws to strengthen the commission.

He also opined for a new law that would direct four ministries including the home, LGRD and cooperatives, defence, and public administration to work in consultation with the EC during election period.

A 13-member delegation of Bangladesh Islami Front led by its Chairman MA Mannan recommended at the dialogue that the electronic voting machine

(EVM) be introduced in phases in different local government elections before the parliamentary election.

The EC on June 7 launched dialogues with the political parties for their opinion on some key issues like RPO; laws on demarcation of constituencies and appointment of election commissioners; and introduction of the EVM.

The main opposition BNP and its alliance partner Jamaat-e-Islami did not join the EC dialogue.

Slovak entrepreneurs urged  
to invest in Bangladesh

Newly appointed Bangladesh Ambassador to Slovak Republic Mosud Mannan presented his credential to President Ivan Gasparovic.

It said Mannan presented his credential on Tuesday when he held a 35-minute meeting with the Slovak president who expressed his satisfaction over the existing bilateral ties, says a press release yesterday.

The ambassador reminisced with respect the role of the people of Slovakia, the break away republic of formerly Czechoslovakia, during and after the War of Liberation of Bangladesh in 1971.

The Slovak president opined that exchange of visits at the highest level could help strengthening the relations.

Gasparovic agreed to support a proposal of the ambassador to provide scholarships for Bangladeshi students in different universities in Slovakia and fresh agreements on trade, education,

culture, science and technology and other areas of cooperation in line with the old pacts between Bangladesh and Czechoslovakia.

As the President Gasparovic pointed out his country's capacity in building different kind of machineries specially its long involvement in automobile assembling, the ambassador suggested involving the private sector and trade bodies to look into possibilities of having business in various fields.

He also urged the Slovak entrepreneurs to take advantage of the current liberal investment policy in Bangladesh.

The ambassador also urged the Slovak president for his country's support to Bangladesh candidature for the non-permanent seat in UN Security Council and on the issues of Climate Change.

Before presentation of the credential, a smartly turned-out contingent of the Slovak Army offered a guard of honour to the new Bangladesh envoy.

## Road crashes kill 7

Seven people were killed and three others injured in separate road accidents in Sirajganj, Satkhira, Natore and Narsingdi yesterday.

A correspondent from Sirajganj reports: A motorcyclist was killed on the spot as the motorcycle hit the railing of Dabirganj Bridge on the Hatikumru-Bonpara highway of Solenga upazila yesterday.

The deceased is Mohsin Hossain, 35, of Changta village under Ullahpara upazila.

Police sent the body to Sirajganj General Hospital for autopsy.

Our Satkhira correspondent says: One young man was killed on the spot as a truck dashed him with a wall while it was parking in a bid to load rice from a rice mill at Patkeghata bazar in Tala upazila yesterday.

The deceased is Tuhin Sana, 24, son of Md Walir Rahman Sana, of village Barobila of Tala upazila.

Our Natore correspondent adds: Three people were killed on the spot and another was injured in a head-on collision between a Dhaka-bound mango-laden truck from Chapainawabganj and a Natore-bound truck from Dhaka at Nayabazar in Gurudaspur upazila yesterday.

The deceased are driver of the Dhaka-bound truck Amin Hossain Manik, 25, helper Mizanur Rahman, 32, of Rahshahi and Abdul Mannan, 30, of Manikganj.

The injured was admitted to a local hospital.

Our Narsingdi correspondent says: Two people were killed on the spot and two injured after a Sylhet-bound bus rammed a pick-up van on the Dhaka-Sylhet highway in Belabo upazila.

The deceased are Musalin, 27 and Belayet Hossain, 25.

The injured were admitted to Narsingdi Sadar Hospital.
