### Malinga mauls Scotland

Sri Lanka fast bowler Lasith Malinga ensured the islanders tour of Britain ended on a winning note as he took five wickets in a 183-run one-day international rout of Scotland here on Wednesday.

Beaten in both Test and one-day series by England, the World Cup finalists proved too strong for a Scotland side who'd only the day before piled up 323 in a shock win over fellow non-Test team Ireland.

Sri Lanka made 284 for seven, featuring fifties from openers Mahela Jayawardene (64) and Dimuth Karunaratne (60).

They then saw Malinga, one of the most difficult bowlers in world cricket to face on account of his round-arm, 'slingshot', style take five for 30 as Scotland were shot out for 101 with Majid Haq's 34 double the next best score of any other home batsman.

## ICC vows to protect its soul Macomm London Six's

As England and India get ready to contest what will be the 2,000th Test match ever played, the International Cricket Council (ICC) has promised to protect the "pinnacle form of the game".

Next week's first of a four-match series at Lord's, the 'home of cricket', will also be the 100th Test between England and India and is set to provide India star Sachin Tendulkar with his latest opportunity to become the first batsman to score a hundred international hundreds.

The series also gives England, currently third behind India and South Africa, the chance to leapfrog Mahendra Singh Dhoni's tourists at the top of the ICC's world Test rankings should they take the series by a margin of 2-0, 3-1 or better.

There have long been fears for the future of Tests, which date back to when Australia played England at Melbourne in 1877, with current concerns based on the rise of Twenty20 -the youngest of cricket's three international formats.

And while next week's match at Lord's is set to be a sell-out, crowds for Test matches elsewhere in the world have often proved patchy compared to those for 50 overs per side one-day internationals and the even briefer Twenty20.

However, ICC chief executive Haroon Lorgat said the advent of a World Test Championship, scheduled to culminate in an inaugural tournament between the leading nations in England in 2013, would help revive the

five-day game.

"As we all prepare to celebrate the staging of the 2,000th Test match, one cannot imagine it to be any better than between two of the top teams in a series that carries with it the battle for top spot in the rankings," Lorgat said in an ICC statement issued Thursday.

"That is great context, and we will enhance that with the ICC World Test Championship in future."

And the South African administrator insisted: "Test cricket is the pinnacle form of the game, and we will continue to protect and promote it above all.

"It is our link to the game's origins; it is what defines greatness and it is recognised by the players as being the benchmark by which they wish to be graded and remembered.

"History has proven that no other form of the game can create memorable and meaningful moments like Test cricket can."

## Dhoni's simple mantra Sachin has no weakness

Sachin Tendulkar has been in scintillating form for the past few seasons and even after 22 years on the road in international cricket, former England captains Michael Vaughan, Nasser Hussain, Mike Atherton and Graham Gooch feel the talismanic batsman will pose the biggest threat to the Englishmen in the much anticipated Test series that begins next week at Lord's.

"Sachin's a different player now from 2007; the best players in the world change little things about themselves to keep themselves in the game."

"In the last two years he's become more aggressive, he's gone back to his old way of trying to score when for a period he tried to survive," Vaughan told The Cricketer magazine.

"Chris Tremlett bowled well against him in 2007 and he's a miles better bowler now. But Sachin doesn't have any weaknesses although every batsman is vulnerable on and around the off stump early on. England might go aggressive at him, test him with a few short balls, I've seen people do that over the last two years and it hasn't affected him, "Vaughan added."

Hussain, on his part, felt that Tendulkar has managed to rediscover his aggressive instincts, even after two decades of international cricket.

"Technically and mentally Sachin has changed little over the years but he has changed his game plan."

"He began as a flamboyant, extravagant stroke- maker who had all the shots and simply loved the game. Once the records and the hundreds started to be racked up, he turned into a runmachine."

"The Indian public became driven by his stats and consumed by a Sachin infatuation." "His priority was his wicket. Once Sehwag arrived, he was

happy to let him tee off." "In the last couple of years he has rediscovered his flamboy-

ance and is playing shots again," Hussain said.

Another England captain and astute batsman, Atherton, recounted how dropping Tendulkar proved to be an expensive and unforgettable experience.

"I dropped him in the gully at Trent Bridge (in 1996) and he went on to get a big hundred."

"He's not a man you want to put down early on. He was calm at the crease, difficult to get out of his bubble."

"There weren't any flaws. He was just a very solid, orthodox

player." "One of the most remarkable things is that he has hardly changed at all, exactly the same set-up, very few changes to his method. He's trusted in his technique and power all this time."

"He's stayed true to his game." Gooch, who saw the Mumbai batsman blossom as a youngster, said: "No one had ever seen him in 1990. As a 17-year-old it was evident that the lad had great skill, great balance, great

timing, an eye for the ball.' "You could see he had all the attributes to make a top player." For one so young he had a poise and composure about his

batting."

"You don't often get that in young players; you get the talent and the stroke-making but poise, authority and composure normally come."

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### Deadliest No 7 If Shane Warne was a batsman's worst nightmare after they had tackled Glenn McGrath, spare a thought for the tired bowler who had to contend with Adam Gilchrist in a Test match.

He was Australia's most destructive batsman and he came to bat after Matthew Hayden and Ricky Ponting had completed their pummeling, Mark Waugh bored of toying with the bowlers and brother Steve exhausted his bag of concentration. After removing these great batsman, bowlers who played against Australia after November 1999, had Gilchrist walking in after all the work was seemingly complete.

Everything, however, was not smooth with the man from country New South Wales who once tried the Mark Waugh mullet to impress his girlfriend. After moving to Perth, he had to deal with the pressure of playing in place of a local favourite. Even after he succeeded in ODI cricket, his Test place was always in question and it was only after the legendary Ian Healy was unceremoniously dropped, that Gilchrist came into the picture.

But since that debut innings against Pakistan in Brisbane where he blasted 81 in no time and the six dismissals, Gilchrist never looked back.

In the next Test, he is part of one of the most remarkable come-from-behind Test victories. After Australia fell to 126-5 chasing 369 to beat Pakistan, Gilchrist hammers 149 not out during his massive partnership with Justin Langer.

In his first tour to India as a Test player, the lefthander tells his teammates that when he goes out to bat, he thinks he's already in his 20s, a mental makeup that helps him settle nerves. In the first Test, the idea seems to work. After Australia fall to 99-5, Gilchrist take the game by the scruff of the neck with his good mate Hayden and hammers 122 off 112 balls. Australia extend their winning run to 16 Tests but inexplicably, Gilchrist can't score anymore and so does Australia, losing 2-1 after taking a 1-0 lead in Mumbai.

The next year, Gilchrist ups the ante with an innings that was as brutal as it was emotional for the man. Gilchrist had been a victim of a vicious internet rumour and he lets the emotional side of him come out when he cries after reaching one of many milestones in the innings. Still, he has toyed around with South Africa so brutally that Wisden describes the innings thus: "Gilchrist was playing with them like a cat keeping a half-dead mouse alive for entertainment." The entertainment was 204 off 213 balls with 19 boundaries and eight sixes and Australia won by an innings and 360 runs.

Though he was set to revel on tired bowlers, he often got Australia out of huge trouble. Against Bangladesh in 2006, his counter-attacking 144 with 15 fours and six sixes kept Australia's head above water after the Tigers had made 427 in the first innings. Ponting finished a job that could have really embarrassed Australia with a second innings century that saw them home by just three wickets.

Among his peers, Gilchrist is too far ahead. Mark Boucher is the second highest scorer in Test cricket among wicketkeepers and the South African has already played 43 more Tests than Gilchrist, scoring 12 less centuries.

What Gilchrist did, ultimately, create was an allrounder spot that Australia so desperately craved over the years. But he changed the definition of the wicketkeeper, troubling cricketers, coaches and administrators the world over.

## PCB dubs ICC report 'scholarly exercise'

Pakistani cricket bosses on Wednesday hit back at the International Cricket Council's proposals for overhauling the sport in the troubled country, suggesting it was a pointless "scholarly exercise".

The Pakistan Task Team (PTT), set up by cricket's governing body, presented a report at an ICC meeting last month with 63 recommendations -- including changes to governance and moves to revive matches with India.

Ijaz Butt, chairman of the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB), said his organisation had identified problems in the report.

"While the intent (of the PTT) cannot be questioned, a few discrepancies can be identified in the report, which PCB has rectified and sent to the ICC in the hope it's taken in a positive spirit," said a PCB statement quoting Butt.

The PTT was formed to revive international tours of Pakistan, suspended after a terror attack on the Sri Lankan team in 2009, and to strengthen the game in the country which has been battered by allegations of spot-fixing.

Its recommendations, however, are not binding on Pakistan.

The PCB said it considered the report to be a "scholarly exercise" that has not made substantial steps to restart international cricket in Pakistan.

"Whereas the Indian government issued favourable statements regarding the resumption of cricket, the Indian Board is still waiting formal signal from its government," Butt said.

The board also rejected a PTT recommendation that the country's cricket chief should not be appointed by Pakistan's President, who is also patron of the PCB.

"The circumstances in Pakistan are unique and cricket administration requires and deserves government support," the PCB statement said.

"Without government support international cricket may not return to the country," it added.

Butt was involved in a public spat with former one-day captain Shahid Afridi, after the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) punished the all rounder for allegedly breaching a code of con-

duct and making allegations against the board. When contacted ICC chief executive Haroon Lorgat on Wednesday confirmed that ICC has received the PCB's reservations but reiterated that the PTT was formed to help

Pakistan. "We have to adopt a strategy to ensure Pakistan manages to fulfil all its current and future commitments and doesn't suffer any isolation," Lorgat told AFP from Dubai.
