

## Japan 2-0 up against Argentina

Up-and-coming Misaki Doi gave Japan a perfect start as they led 2-0 against Argentina on the first day of the Fed Cup World Group II play-off on Saturday.

The 20-year-old, who reached the third round at Wimbledon at her first attempt, whitewashed Maria Irigoyen 6-0, 6-0 in the opener of the best-of-five contest in the Japanese city of Kobe.

Ayumi Morita followed her with a solid 6-2, 6-3 victory over Mailen Auroux in the second singles.

After reverse singles matches on Sunday, Rika Fujiwara and Kurumi Nara will play the doubles against Irigoyen and Auroux.

The World Group II play-off was originally scheduled for April but the earthquake and tsunami and ensuing nuclear emergency in northern Japan forced its postponement.

The two countries have an even 3-3 record but Argentina have won the last three ties. The winners will be promoted to World Group II along with Belarus, Slovenia and Switzerland next year.

## KP the X-factor

Former England captain Michael Vaughan and Australian spin legend Shane Warne feel that maverick all-rounder Kevin Pietersen will be England's x-factor in the forthcoming Test series against India.

Pietersen had a quiet Test series against Sri Lanka, scoring just 162 runs from three matches. But his valuable knock of 227 runs in the second Ashes Test helped England win the series Down Under.

Vaughan feels that former England captain Pietersen's form will be important for the team against India.

"His Test form is not a massive worry. In an x-factor series against India, which will bring big crowds and a buzz, I think he will perform," Vaughan was quoted as saying by the Daily Telegraph.

Warne feels that Pietersen can provide the thrust if England want to snatch the No.1 Test crown from India.

"If Kevin Pietersen finds his form again and provides that x-factor, then there is no reason why England can't become the No.1 team," said Warne.

Pietersen had admitted that the draw of luck hasn't particularly helped him recently. But he was looking forward to a big knock.

"I feel 100% that I'm on the brink of a big score. I've felt better and better. But the way that I play, looking to score and be aggressive and take the attack to the opposition, you are going to have good days and bad days. I've just got to keep playing the way I play and, if the way I'm playing at the moment is anything to go by, I'm very happy," he said.

# Strauss back on track

England Test captain Andrew Strauss warmed up for next week's first Test against India by scoring a quick-fire 78 as Somerset reached 329-2 against the tourists at Taunton on Friday.

Strauss has made a brief loan move to Somerset from Middlesex in the hope of rediscovering his form after a miserable run during England's recent Test series win over Sri Lanka.

The switch paid dividends as Strauss shared a 101-run partnership with Arul Suppiah before the opener was dismissed by Amit Mishra shortly before lunch on the opening day of the three-day match.

Strauss scored just 27 runs in three Tests against Sri Lanka and, with Middlesex's fixtures offering little chance for first-class action, he decided to take the risk of giving India's bowlers a chance to dent his morale ahead of the start of the first Test at Lord's.

He struck 11 boundaries and brought up his half century from just 63 balls, although he did survive an lbw appeal from Indian seamer Zaheer Khan when he had scored only 20.

Strauss escaped again on 64 when Wriddhiman Saha, the reserve wicketkeeper playing in place of the rested MS Dhoni,

dropped an edge off Mishra.

However, Saha took the next chance when an edge bobbled off the pad, ending Strauss's innings on 78 from 98 balls.

India's bowlers found it hard going during 75 overs of action on a rain-interrupted day at Taunton and Somerset look on course to score a huge first innings total.

Suppiah was India's chief tormentor and finished the day on 145 not out after hitting 14 fours and one six.

Nick Compton also weighed in with 88 before India's Suresh Raina had him caught by Yuvraj Singh just before the close with the score on 324.

Zaheer is the only one of the India attack taking on Somerset who is certain to play at Lord's, with Ishant Sharma and Praveen Kumar rested following their workload in the recent Test series against the West Indies.

Although bowlers Shanthakumaran Sreesanth and Munaf Patel failed to stake a claim to start at Lord's, a strong Indian batting line-up featuring Sachin Tendulkar and Rahul Dravid will fancy their chances of responding with a big total of their own.

### MATCH FEE FOR THE "A" TEAM PLAYERS

The board has decided that "A" team players will be brought under the board's salary structure. Sources said that an influential director questioned the salary structure for the A team players and he found no reason to give the players a handsome amount. Many were surprised by his unprofessional attitude regarding the issue. Besides, BCB will form an anti-corruption unit for domestic cricket as per ICC guideline while they will send delegations to India, England and Australia to discuss bilateral cricket series within the next FTP cycle. Finally, it was also decided that the GP-BCB National Academy will tour South Africa from August 3 to August 22.

# Warne predicts 1-0 for England

Australian spin legend Shane Warne foresees England beating India 1-0 in the upcoming four-Test series as he feels Andrew Strauss' men will manage to do just enough to upstage their world number one rivals.

Warne said England are a good side capable of coming out triumphant against Mahendra Singh Dhoni's men in the series starting July 21 but the hosts would do their reputation some good by being more attacking in their approach.

"It is important England nail teams if they get them on the ropes. Make it more entertaining and be more aggressive. If you do that then it is fun for the players and that comes across to the crowd. To summarise I think we all believe England are a good side. They have variety in their attack," Warne told 'Daily Telegraph'.

"They have great top order batting, for them to make the next step and stay there it will be about how they play the game. If they just stick to process and wear oppositions down they will not win series by whitewashes. They are just going to do enough and win 1-0. Strauss needs to put them in a situation where it is win at all costs," he added.

Former England captain Michael Vaughan agreed and said explosive batsman Kevin Pietersen will have a huge role to play in making the series engrossing.

"His Test form is not a massive worry. In an x-factor series against India, which will bring big crowds and a buzz, I think he will perform," he said.

Warne said England have the requisite balance in their team. "If you put (Ian) Bell in form, (Alastair) Cook, (Jonathan) Trott, Strauss, Pietersen with the x-factor and (Eoin) Morgan's variety together then suddenly you have got a hell of a top six," Warne said.

"Throw in Chris Tremlett with his height and steep bounce, James Anderson's skill of swinging the ball and Graeme Swann as the best spinner in the game and it all looks good. England just need to find the right person to fit in the third seamer's role and then there will be no weak spot in the team," he said.

Vaughan compared India with Australia and said like the former world champions, Dhoni's men will also soon be in a transitional phase after greats such as Sachin Tendulkar retire.

"We are not playing in an era when we have a great team like Australia who have dominated for so long. They were so much better than the rest of the world. India are a good team but you can certainly see England within a year or so getting there," he explained.

# Sehwag to miss first two Tests

Influential opener Virender Sehwag is set to miss the opening two Tests against England, but India remain hopeful that he will be fit for the final two games.

Sehwag skipped the latter stages of the Indian Premier League as well as India's tour to the West Indies after undergoing surgery on his right shoulder. He was initially expected to be fit for the first Test against England starting at Lord's next Thursday, but his recovery is taking longer than expected and he has been all but ruled out of the first two Tests.

India captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni admits Sehwag will be a big loss, but backed Abhinav Mukund, who opened with Murali Vijay during the Windies Test series, to form a good partnership with Gautam Gambhir at the top.

"We are a side that relies on our openers quite a bit," Dhoni said. "If we get off to a good start then we can really capitalise with the middle order we have."

"As far as Virender Sehwag is concerned, there aren't many cricketers in the world who can have the impact he can. Of course we'll miss him, but the good thing for Indian cricket is it gives a chance to a youngster like Mukund who can have a look at international cricket and see what areas he needs to improve. Viru will be back at some point, but it's good to have Gautam back as well."

Dhoni isn't the only one who can't quite pinpoint Sehwag's return date as coach Duncan Fletcher also admitted they are not quite sure when the right-hander will be available for selection again.

"We've heard that he'll be over here for maybe the third and fourth Test, so we're crossing our fingers for that," Fletcher is quoted by Cricinfo as saying.

## Defying dominance

The enduring appeal of Test cricket is that it allows space for some memorable rivalries to take hold and build over the years. Over the last twenty years, cricket's power base has shifted first from the West Indies to Australia, and now from Australia to India's financial, and more recently, cricketing strength. Both these shifts have been marked by some very memorable series.

The first shift was seismic, and it occurred when Australia upended the West Indian juggernaut in their backyard in 1995, ending nearly two decades of Caribbean dominance. Then, would-be legends like Glenn McGrath and Steve Waugh emerged for the Australians, players who would mould the Australian hegemony over the next decade.

But West Indies weren't dead and buried, as during the 90s they still had the players of the high calibre of Brian Lara, Courtney Walsh and Curtly Ambrose. Though they were roundly beaten during their tour to Australia, they put up a final show of the joy and uniqueness of Caribbean cricket when the world-beating Australians came to tour in 1999.

In the first match of the four Test series Australia fully imposed their superiority over the previous masters by bowling West Indies out for 51 in the second innings and winning the match by 312 runs despite neither side crossing 300 over the course of the Test. The world expected more humiliation to follow, but the great West Indian dynasty had one last gasp left in the form of their last three great players.

Captain Lara kicked off an epic run with the bat with a faultless 213 in the first innings of the second Test at Jamaica, and with good bowling from Ambrose, Walsh and off-spinner Nehemiah Perry turned the tide on the world's best team, emerging victors by ten wickets.

The next Test at Bridgetown was Lara's Test and one of the all time classics, with West Indies winning by 1 wicket, spurred by Lara's unbelievable 153 and beating off the best that McGrath, Jason Gillespie, Shane Warne and Stuart McGill had to offer. Walsh took five wickets in the match, and West Indies went 2-1 up with the possibility of a series victory that would have been scarcely believable in the aftermath of the first Test debacle.

The miracle was not to be as a Justin Langer-inspired Australia won the last Test by 176 runs to square off an epic series at 2-2. The West Indies star thereafter quickly faded, catalysed by the retirements of Ambrose and Walsh.

During Australia's dominance, one side defied them, if mostly at home. India, first under Mohammed Azharuddin and then under Sourav Ganguly took two series off them at home, the second of which must go down as one of the greatest ever. Steve Waugh dubbed India as his 'final frontier' as he as player had not won a series there.

But the new Indian captain decided to get under the skin of the tough-as-nails Waugh, making him wait at the toss before the first Test in Mumbai. The effect wasn't immediate, Australia winning the Test by 10 wickets in a display of rare cricketing prowess.

Halfway through the second Test in Kolkata India seemed out of it, following on more than 274 runs behind. But then one of cricket's miracles occurred. Rahul Dravid and VVS Laxman came together with India lurking at 232 for 4, still 42 runs adrift of making Australia bat again, and stayed together for more than one and a half days in a partnership of 376 runs. Late on the fifth day, Harbhajan Singh took India's first ever Test hat-trick to hurry Australia to defeat.

Harbhajan picked up fifteen wickets in the next match in Chennai -- taking his series total to 32, and Sachin Tendulkar scored a gem of a century to inflict a 2-1 series defeat on Australia and deny Waugh his final frontier.
