City agree Tevez sale

Manchester City have agreed a deal to sell their Argentinian star Carlos Tevez to Brazilian side Corinthians, the English Premier League club's manager Roberto Mancini said Monday.

"At the moment we have an agreement with Corinthians, but Carlos now is still a City player," Mancini told Sky TV.

According to reports the deal will be closed when personal terms between the 27-year-old Tevez and his new club are agreed.

The Brazilian side had offered 40 million euros (\$63.57 million) for the striker but City had been holding out for more for their captain and Corinthians have reportedly made an improved offer.

The striker wants to leave Manchester as his daughters live in South America with their mother. The Argentina forward, formerly with West Ham and Manchester United, led City to FA Cup glory and Champions League qualification last season.

Tevez, who missed the crucial penalty kick as Argentina went of the Copa America quarter-final 5-4 on penalties against Uruguay on Saturday, arrived in English football at West Ham from Corinthians in August 2006.

Selling Tevez to Corinthians would enable City to offload him to a club with whom they are not in direct competition, either domestically or in Europe, while also boosting the player's family arrangements with his estranged partner living in Buenos Aires. Tevez said Monday that "I would have no problem to go back to Corinthians", where he won the 2005 league title and became a great crowd favourite.

City defender Joleon Lescott admitted he would be disappointed to see his team-mate depart but understood his wishes.

The England international told Sky Sports News: "We'll be disappointed if Carlos leaves but it was down to the club and Carlos what was best for each other and they have come to an agreement so I wish both parties all the best.

extra-time in Santa Fe. "I would not call it failure - that is a very strong word. We work to win and I think we

really played very well" Batista opined. But the side failed to take advantage of having an extra man for most of the second half after Uruguay scorer Diego Perez was

red-carded late in the first half. In that second period, "the intensity dropped off we rather lost our way," Batista acknowledged.

"Today, we did not play badly, we made chances... but we will keep on plugging away to raise our game," said Batista, who took over from Diego Maradona following last sum-

mer's World Cup thumping by Germany. Asked if he might think about stepping down, Batista - a Maradona teammate in the successful 1986 World Cup campaign - said

he wasn't thinking along those lines. "That is not something going through my

head," he said. "Going out hurts, but you have to continue on.

wanted to win the Copa America, but our objective is the World Cup," he insisted.

That is also Brazil's refrain as Argentina's eternal rivals host the 2014 tournament.

But the auriverde remain in the Copa for now as they head into a Sunday quarterfinal against Paraguay.

Batista insisted that Lionel Messi deserved praise despite not finding the net in the tournament on the back of 53 goals for Barcelona last term.

"He played exceptionally for 30 minutes. He had a very good game," Batista said.

Argentina defender Pablo Zabaleta insisted, nonetheless, that the albiceleste should have seen off their rivals from across the River Plate.

"It is a bad feeling as we know we should have won it. We had chances and for much of the game we had a man extra," he conceded.

Uruguay's Liverpool striker Luis Suarez insisted that penalties are essentially a lottery. "When it comes down to a shootout it's

really down to luck, and when it came to the penalties luck was on our side," Suarez said. "We left everything out on the pitch as

Uruguay always do. We knew it would be a tough Copa but confidence is on the rise," he told reporters.

"We were a man down for almost the whole of the second half so it was a huge effort" to come through.

vowed to lead the club to an elusive Champions League title at the first attempt, dismissing suggestions his squad of super stars are past their prime.

"In the next year for sure the trophy will arrive in this club," the former Porto coach declared confidently, in shades of his compatriot Jose Mourinho, the selfproclaimed "special one" who failed to deliver club football's top prize for Chelsea's ambitious owner Roman Abramovich.

"Chelsea have been in a couple of semifinals and also one final in recent times. I don't see why we can't go on to win it," the Portuguese told reporters as the London team arrived in Kuala Lumpur to kick off their 15day Asia tour.

The trip will be Villas-Boas' first chance to see his players in competitive action on foreign soil and he said he will make a decision based on that whether to dip

into the transfer market.

"We need to get the most information as possible (during the tour). By the time we go to the market, we will know the kind of players we want. Hopefully we can do the deal that we want," he

"I will use all 26 of my players in the tour and we will make a decision once the tour is over."
