Rupert Murdoch said yesterday that he cannot be held responsible for the scandal at the News of the World, saying he was let down by "people I trusted".

His son, James, apologised to victims, saying hacking was "inexcusable".

Two hours into the hearing, a man tried to throw a foam pie at Rupert Murdoch and proceedings were briefly suspended.

The protester appeared to lunge towards the News Corp chairman and chief executive but was fought off by a group of people, including Mr Murdoch's wife, Wendi. A man has reportedly been detained by police.

Rupert Murdoch's appearance before the Commons media committee is the first time he has faced direct scrutiny by MPs during his 40-year UK media career.

He said he was "humbled" to have to explain his firm's conduct to MPs.

Faced with a series of questions from Labour MP Tom Watson, Murdoch paused extensively and his son James made several attempts to intervene.

However, Watson made clear that he wanted to hear answers from the father and not the son.

Police, Rajuk say no arrangement in place for monitoring

World's 'largest' uranium deposit found in India

A new mine in south India could contain the largest reserves of uranium in the world, a government official said in remarks reported yesterday, signalling a major boost for the energy-hungry nation.

The Tumalapalli mine in Andhra Pradesh state could provide up to 150,000 tonnes of uranium, Srikumar Banerjee, secretary of the Department of Atomic Energy, told reporters after a four-year survey of the site was completed.

"It's confirmed that the mine has 49,000 tonnes of ore, and there are indications that the total quantity could be three times that amount," Banerjee was quoted as saying in The Times of India.

"If that be the case, it will become the largest uranium mine in the world," he said.

Previous estimates suggested that only about 15,000 tonnes of uranium would be produced at the mine, which is due to start operating by the end of the year.

Poachers held with venison

Gazi, 25, and Md Saiful Gazi, 24, are of Belai village and Md Nasir Uddin Sheikh, 48, is of Pipul Bunia village in the upazila.

Under interrogation, they confessed to trading tiger skin alongside poaching deer.

After a tip-off, police ambushed the poachers near the canal when the boat anchored there, said Abdul Karim, an assistant sub-inspector of Rampal Police Station.

Last chance for BNP

EC won't press it for electoral reform talks if tomorrow's fixture goes unattended

The Election Commission wants the cabinet division and three ministries concerned to do the administrative job ahead of the parliamentary polls in consultation with it.

Talking to reporters yesterday, Election Commissioner M Sakhawat Hussain said the EC has already suggested incorporating a provision in the Representation of People Order to that end.


"We have proposed that the cabinet division and home, LGRD and public administration ministries consult the commission while discharging administrative duties," Sakhawat added.

Often, he noted, their decisions affect the conduct of the polls. The EC wants to work closely with them so that they do not take such decisions.

Meanwhile, Chief Election Commissioner ATM Shamsul Huda yesterday said BNP will get no more chances to participate in the EC's ongoing dialogue on electoral reforms if it skips the talks tomorrow.

The main opposition party was invited three times to the dialogue, which the EC has been holding with the registered political parties since June 7. But it refused to join, terming the commission "controversial". It did not even reply to the commission's third letter sent on July 6 requesting the party to sit tomorrow.

"We've given them [BNP] enough time. But they didn't join the talks. We cannot wait any longer for them **SEE PAGE 19 COL 8**
