DRS without ball-tracking

There will be no reviews of lbw decisions during the forthcoming England-India Test and one-day series, the International Cricket Council (ICC) announcedWednesday.

Indian concerns over the reliability of ball-tracking technology meant the ICC was unable to get universal adoption of the full decision review system (DRS) for all international matches at a recent meeting.

Now, for the four-Test and five-match one-day series between England and India, there will be no HawkEye predictive tracking system for

However, 'Hot Spot' imaging technology and stump microphone audio will be able to assist the on-field umpires with caught decisions.

India captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni, speaking ahead of the first Test which starts at Lord's here on Thursday, told reporters on Wednesday: "We are not 100 percent convinced on the tracking system and the (measurement of) bounce.

"We are quite happy with the 'Hot Spot'."

England captain Andrew Strauss said he'd rather DRS be used in full.

"I think the system has

worked very well over the last 12-18 months. "We have all got used to it

and have got more decisions

right which is a good thing. "As it happens we can't use the full DRS in this series and we are just going to have to

deal with the half-way house we have got. "I don't think it's ideal but that's the situation we are

faced with. For us as players to be overly concerned about it would be unhelpful."

Waugh backs lie-detection

Former Australia captain Steve Waugh has taken a lie-detector test as part of his bid to help root corruption out of cricket. Waugh believes making

players submit to examination by lie-detectors, or polygraphs as they are also known, could help drive cheats from the game.

As a member of the world cricket committee of Marylebone Cricket Club (MCC), which owns Lord's, Waugh volunteered to undergo a test to confirm he had never been involved in corruption in cricket.

MCC arranged for him to be tested by Steven van Aperen who, it said in a statement, was one of "Australia's leading polygraph examiners".

"Steve Waugh passed this test convincingly," MCC added. Waugh, speaking to reporters at Lord's here on Tuesday, said: "As a former captain l know you never ask a player to do something you are not willing to do yourself.

"So on April 7 I went to Melbourne and went through the process of a polygraph test.

"At the end of the process, which took about two hours, I was convinced that anybody with something to hide would be found out by this process."

Australia great Waugh was

spurred into action following last year's revelations by Britain's now defunct News of the World tabloid that former Pakistan captain Salman Butt, and bowlers Mohammad Aamer and Mohammad Asif, were all involved in the deliberate bowling of no-balls during a Test against England at Lord's as part of a betting scam.

converge in 2,000th Test

Test cricket will celebrate its 2,000th match with a series opener between England and India at Lord's that promises to delight both statisticians and Sachin Tendulkar should the 'Little Master' mark an already landmark occasion with a 100th international hun-

The match is also the 100th Test between England, who gave birth to cricket, and India, now top of the ICC's Test rankings, the 50-over world champions and the sport's financial powerhouse.

That means it will feature a clash between the 'old world' and the 'new' -- as there was, albeit in a different fashion, when England travelled to Melbourne to play Australia in the very first Test in 1877.

Tendulkar arrives at the 'home of cricket', as Lord's likes to call itself, having had to contend with a level of admiration arguably unequalled in both its frenzy and duration in cricket history.

However, the ever-modest Tendulkar, his team-mates and opponents have all said the same thing: there is more to this match than Sachin.

"I'm not thinking of records," he insisted. "I'm just thinking of enjoying this tour," added Tendulkar, whose four previous Tests at Lord's have yielded a meagre top score of 37.

And he is far from the only star in a powerful top-order featuring the likes of Rahul Dravid, who made 95 at Lord's on his Test debut in 1996, and Venkatsai Laxman. "It would be very, very risky to focus all our

energies on one player," said England offspinner Graeme Swann. "Sure, he's the best player of the modern

generation, but if we focus on one guy another will sneak in the back door and take it away from us.

"In MS Dhoni (India's captain) they have

possibly the most charismatic player India has ever had, with the sway he holds in that country now.

"I think he is the most important player in that team now. He leads from the front, is a very dangerous cricketer and if we can get at anyone then he is probably the key man."

India could rue the shoulder injury that has ruled out Virender Sehwag from at least the first two Tests of this four-match contest -- a series that if England win by 2-0, 3-1 or better will see them replace the tourists at the top of the ICC's Test table.

England too boast an in-form top order with Alastair Cook and Jonathan Trott both in the runs.

Bangladesh's golfing sensation Siddikur Rahman carded a decent 4-under-par 68 in the first round of the Worldwide Holdings Selangor Masters on Wednesday, when all the limelight was stolen by Finnish rookie Joonas Granberg who set a new course record of 10-under-par 62 at the at Kota Permai Golf and Country Club.

Granberg took a three-shot lead over second placed South African Tjaart Van Der Walt while Siddikur was on joint seventh position with seven more alongside him at the end of the opening day in the 400,000dollar event.

Siddikur, fresh off his triumph in Sembilan Masters Invitational last week, said he was satisfied with his day's work despite being bothered by a neck injury.

"I'm very happy with it as I'm not feeling well with my neck problem. Shot one bogey on the card through some bad shots but managed some good up and downs for pars. I couldn't hit it too well today (Wednesday) but the putter was excellent. I'm satisfied

"I had a good start. Birdied the 12th hole which was a given. I then chipped in on the 13th. On two, I hit it to four feet, on four I rolled in a 20-footer and on five, I hit it to three feet," Siddikur told the Asian Tour website after the day's play.

Praising the rookie leader Granberg, Siddikur said he was keeping a close eye on the Finn.

"10-under is a great score. I saw him turn in seven under. It's good but let's see what

India captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni Strauss were united in their praise of Sachin Tendulkar with the batting great on the verge of another landmark record.

The India star needs just one more

century to become the first batsman to

score a 100 international hundreds -he already has 51 in Tests and 48 in oneday internationals, both records. Tendulkar could create yet more cricket history when England and India

meet in the first of a four-Test series at Lord's starting here on Thursday, in what will be the 2,000th Test ever played and the 100th between the two countries.

His stellar international career started when he was just a 16-year-old back in 1989.

Dhoni, asked what had motivated Tendulkar, who has scored over 14,000 Test runs at an average of more than 56, to keep playing at such a high level for so long told reporters at Lord's on and England counterpart Andrew Wednesday: "I think he loves the game, he has a passion for the game. "Every time he turns up on the field he wants to improve his game. He may spend one-and-a-half hours on the field, but in that time he makes sure he is learning something, and when he goes back to the dressing room he can proudly say today's time I utilised to the best.

"He tries to keep it very simple and doesn't complicate things.

"Overall, I think he's an ideal cricketer to look up to, the way he has conducted himself on and off the field, irrespective of the fact that when he made his debut in one year's time he was a superstar.

"He has remained the same for the
