## 7 parties to join AL-led alliance Says IOJ leader

Bangladesh Islami Oikya Jote yesterday claimed that at least seven of 13 political parties, now vehemently against the government for the 15th amendment to the constitution, could jump ship and join the ruling party alliance soon. A faction of the Islami Oikya Jote and a 12-party alliance

of mostly religion-based parties led by Bangladesh Khelafat Majlish have been protesting the removal of the words "absolute faith in Allah" from the country's charter. Mesbaur Rahman Chowdhury, chairman of Bangladesh Islami Oikya Jote, which supports the Awami League-led

grand alliance, at a press conference claimed leaders of the ruling party assigned him to negotiate with those parties to get them onboard the ruling alliance. Mesbaur said he had preliminary discussions with those

parties and seven of those gave him positive response. The parties have placed some demands for joining the

grand alliance and the ruling party leaders will sit with them on July 25 to discuss, he said. However, Organising Secretary of Bangladesh Khelafat

Majlish Humayun Kabir said they had no discussion with Bangladesh Islami Oikya Jote leaders.

# Toxic fish feed may cause human death

Say scientists

Consumption of fish which has been fed toxic food and reared in polluted waters can cause serious health hazards, sometimes even leading to death. Chief Scientific Officer of Bangladesh

Fisheries Research Institute (BFRI) Dr Yahia Mahmud said this yesterday while presenting a key-note paper at a seminar titled "Safe Fish Cultivation to Protect Public Health".

BFRI organised the seminar at Bangladesh Agriculture Research Council auditorium in the city.

Pathogen produced from unhygienic sanitation and untreated poultry faeces causes cholera, diarrhea, dysentery and typhoid while heavy metals in untreated effluent can even lead to cancer, blindness and deafness, said DrYahia.

Fish farmers use different types of harm-

antibiotics in rearing fish that could cause tumor, cancer and physical and mental disabilities. Such chemicals also hamper the normal breeding process and growth of fish, said DrYahia. Dhaka University Zoology department Prof

ful chemicals including insecticides and

Dr M Niamul Naser said Farmers feed fish with metronidazol, a medicine used to cure gastroenteritis (stomach inflammation due to bacterial infection) in humans. When this fish is consumed, the bacteria in that person's body becomes resistant, making the medicine ineffective when administered later. Speaking as the chief guest, Agriculture

Minister Begum Matia Chowdhury stressed the need for proper implementation of existing laws to ensure safe fish farming, enabling the country to earn foreign currency and its people to stay healthy.

The students' front has divided into at least six groups in the last one year, mentioned a JCD activist. A large number of JCD leaders and activists have

beendemonstrating for the last six months demanding fresh central committee. There were protests ever since the Tuku-Alim committee was formed on July 1 in 2009. The JCD men accused incumbent President Sultan

Salauddin Tuku and General Secretary Amirul Islam Alim of failing to lead the organisation.

## RU MCJ dept celebration begins today



# Stop cutting trees | Antibiotics import on hills

Demand four environmental orgs

Leaders of four environmental organisations yesterday demanded the government to stop cutting hills and trees on hills and a ban on lifting sand from streams on hills across the country.

The demands came at a rally organised by Bangladesh Paribesh Andolon (Bapa), Green Voice, Puraton Dhaka Paribesh Unnayan Forum and Seba in front of Jaitya Press Club in the city.

Pointing at the landslide on July 1 that killed 17 people, they said cutting hills is the main cause of landslide which causes the death of many people during heavy rains every year.

They also demanded a ban on construction of houses on hills for non-indigenous people, a stop to planting alien trees and appointing a corruption-free body to protect, use and develop forests on hills.

Bapa Joint Secretary Zakir Hossain presided over the rally where Citizen Rights Movements Secretary General Tushar Rehman, Seba Executive Director Dr Md Nuruddin, the forum Convener Ashraf Amir Ullah and Bapa Executive Member Prof Mahbubur Rahman also addressed.

# for poultry mulled

Fisheries and Livestock Minister Abdul Latif Biswas has said the government is considering import of essential antibiotics to sustain the growth of poultry industry in the country.

"Essential antibiotics are needed to protect poultry from diseases... the government is considering lifting the ban on import of antibiotic for poultry," he said at a function on Thursday night. Biswas was speaking at the 'Installation Ceremony 2011-

12' of the World Poultry Science Association-Bangladesh Branch (WPSA-BB) at Hotel Ruposhi Bangla in the city. Food and Disaster Management Minister Abdur

Razzaque, Fisheries secretary Ujjwal Bikash Dutta and WPSA-BB President Moshiur Rahman, among others, also spoke on the occasion. Latif Biswas informed that the government has taken an

initiative to register each and every poultry feed mill of the country to ensure quality of poultry feeds and the registration process will begin soon. "Since the independence, the country's poultry industry has achieved significant growth both in terms of production

and quality," he said. He said now about one crore workforce along with 15 crore consumers are related with this industry.

# Sugar, edible oil prices still high

Sugar, edible oil and gram are selling in retail markets of Chittagong at much higher prices than that the government fixed to curb price hike of commodities ahead of Ramadan.

The retailers are blaming the wholesalers for not being

mockery. On Wednesday, the government fixed Tk 65 for a kilogram of sugar, Tk 109 for a litre of loose soybean oil and Tk 99 for a litre of loose palm oil for the retail market. The Chittagong district administration on Thursday fixed the wholesale

price of moderate quality of gram at Tk 55 while the retail

price at Tk 58. But visits to Khatunganj and Chaktai areas revealed a completely different picture. Retail price of sugar at Karnaphuli CDA Market in Choumuhani, Karnaphuli Complex in Sholoshahar, Reazuddin Bazar and Kazir Dewry Bazar is between Tk 70 and Tk 75 per kg while different kinds

of gram are selling at between Tk 65 and Tk 80 a kg. Meanwhile, supply of soybean oil has drastically declined in the retail market while its price is hovering between Tk 120

and Tk 124 a litre. Abul Bashar, proprietor of M/s A Bashar Store at Karnaphuli CDA Market, said he bought sugar from Khatunganj wholesale market at Tk 67.50 a kg on Wednesday and the purchase cost rose to Tk 70 a kg with the transport,

labour and packaging expense. Bashar was found selling sugar at Tk 72 a kg.

"How can I sell it at government-fixed rate when I can't even buy it at Tk 65 from the wholesale market," he complained, adding that he may now have to stop business in the face of discontent from consumers and mobile courts.

The retailers of edible oil and gram spoke of the same reason in defence of the price hike of these two items.

Contacted Deputy Commissioner (DC) Foyez Ahmad said they have already started monitoring the city markets through mobile courts.
