



## Message from the High Commissioner

On the joyous occasion of the Independence Day of the Maldives, I wish to convey my sincere felicitations to His Excellency President Mohamed Nasheed, the Government and the people of Maldives both living at home and abroad. May I also extend warm wishes and greetings to the Government and people of Bangladesh who have always been most supportive to the developmental needs of the Maldives.

Our close contact with the people of Bangladesh go back many centuries. Memories and stories about trips to Bengal are the common folklore of Maldivians. We know that merchant ships from Chittagong frequently visited the shores of the Maldives carrying textiles and other necessities. History shows that Bengal used cowrie-shells imported from the Maldives, as a currency during medieval period. In fact, trade between our two nations continued almost uninterrupted well into the middle of the 20th Century.

Fraternal links continue today in a much stronger and enduring manner. The establishment of a first ever resident diplomatic mission of the Maldives in Dhaka in July 2008 has further contributed to consolidate these ties. The first Maldives' Supplement issued today in a Bangladeshi newspaper is a case in point.

Cordial relations at diplomatic level are only one aspect of the everlasting bonds between our two countries. Close interaction between our respective peoples forms the mainstay of relations between the Maldives and Bangladesh today. Presently, more than 60,000 Bangladeshi expatriates are contributing significantly to the economy of the Maldives.

The Governments of our two countries are working towards expanding and facilitating people-to-people contacts. During the visit of His Excellency Mr. Ahmed Naseem, Minister of Foreign Affairs of Maldives to Bangladesh in May this year, a Memorandum of

Understanding was signed between the two countries to ensure better recruitment and regulatory mechanism for the placement of manpower from Bangladesh. As Bangladesh is becoming an important destination for Maldivian students, especially in the field of medicine, an MoU was signed between the two governments for cooperation in the field of education during the visit of Bangladeshi Minister of Education, Honourable Nurul Islam Nahid to the Maldives in January this year.

Enhanced economic and commercial

ties are vital for linkage between peoples of any two countries. In this regard, Maldives has taken a number of initiatives recently towards reaching this objective. During Minister Naseem's visit, it was agreed to share Maldives' tourism experience with Bangladesh, and to encourage two-way tourism flows as well as tourism investment. Two weeks ago, the Government of the Maldives embarked upon an ambitious programme to begin a shipping link directly connecting Chittagong and Hittadhoo Port in the Southern Province of the Maldives. This regular sea-cargo service would revive the historic link between the business communities of the two countries. It would also provide an opportunity for high-quality Bangladeshi products that are in constant demand in the Maldives such as building materials, ceramics, textiles, pharmaceuticals, fresh fruits and vegetables to reach the Maldives on a regular basis.

#### **Maldives** ...the Sunny Side of Life

The Maldives has always been a unique nation. Apart from a period of Portuguese domination in the Sixteenth century and carrying the status of a British Protectorate from 1887 to 1965, the archipelago has been an independent country for at least twenty-five centuries.

The Maldives is a member of the United Nations, the Commonwealth and the Non-Aligned Movement. The Maldives main



tains a very cordial relationship with the international community and the Maldivians themselves take pride in their hospitality and friendliness!

The population of the Maldives currently stands slightly in excess of a quarter of a million. A common language (Dhivehi) and a religion (Islam) have been two blessings that unite the people into a cohesive and peaceful society.

As a visitor, come to the Maldives and dare to count exactly how many islands there are in the country. They say that counting the islands including the sand spits is like trying to count how many stars there are in the sky! So, the commonly agreed upon figure of 1190 is but an approximation. These islands are grouped into natural atolls that are protected by surrounding reefs. The islands are of pure white coral sand are low lying, the



highest point on any given island being no more than a meter and a half above sea level. Coconut palms and an abundance of tropical plants make these islands an idyllic place for your holiday if you want to see nature at its best.

The Maldives actually straddles the equator. The climate is tropical with no major seasonal differences. Though the southwest monsoon does bring most of the rain, mostly around June and July, tropical rain showers can occur any time! The skies are usually clear and the sun shines brightly. That is when the cooling

If you are a surfer you will find just the right waves in some places. If you are a divining enthusiast, be prepared for a binge! The white coral beaches are simply unbelievable. #### A haven for foreign investments

Foreign Direct Investments (FDI) has played a crucial role in the economic development of the Maldives. The Government of Maldives acknowledges the importance of foreign investment and recognizes its contribution to economic development and employment creation. The Law on Foreign Investments in the Republic of Maldives (Law 25/79) governs foreign investments in the country.

The success of foreign investments in the Maldives can be attributed to its open and liberal economic environment, relative political stability and the consistent growth of the economy, which has achieved an average annual growth rate of 7.5 percent over the last 15 years. Moreover, the dynamic private sector and developmentoriented legal structure all contribute to a climate conductive to trade and investment. The World Bank's 2006 Investment Climate Assessment "Ease of doing business Index" ranked the Maldives top in South Asia.

Foreign investors are offered a simple and transparent policy environment and continuous efforts are being made to make the investing environment more predictable and transparent. Capitalizing on the numerous benefits of investing in the Maldives, many reputed international brand names have established their presence in the country. Amongst them are world class resort investments by international hotel chains and other regional brands. While all sectors of the Maldives economy are open for foreign investors, it aims to attract more foreign investment with an emphasis on investments that are capital intensive, enhance transfer of technology, introduce new skills and
