

2nd Test from today

England want more like Lord's

England will look for more of the same against India in the second Test at Trent Bridge starting here on Friday.

They thrashed the tourists by 196 runs on Monday, with James Anderson taking five for 65 in front of a full house at Lord's in the 2,000th Test of all-time.

England, who will replace India at the top of the ICC's Test table if they win this four-match series 2-0 or better, had things pretty much their own way at Lord's, with Kevin Pietersen making a double century, Matt Prior a reviving second innings hundred and Stuart Broad returning to his best bowling form.

And even when dropped catches or contentious lbw decisions, for which there are no reviews this series because of Indian objections to ball-tracking technology, went against England, it made little difference.

"We know we're playing really, really good cricket at the moment," said Anderson. "Everyone's chipping in -- and if we need someone to step up, generally someone is.

"We're trying to improve each day, as

individuals and as a team. If we can do that, we know we can do great things."

Anderson, often a beneficiary of the swing friendly conditions on offer at Trent Bridge, has dismissed Sachin Tendulkar six times in seven Tests, including lbw for 12 in the second innings at Lord's to leave the India great stranded on 99 international hundreds.

"When you get him out you know it's a key dismissal, so we know we've got to be on top of our game to do that," Anderson said.

England had a huge break at Lord's when Zaheer Khan broke down early with a hamstring injury and then didn't bowl at all in the second innings.

England have a doubt over fast bowler Chris Tremlett, unable to train on Wednesday because of a tight hamstring.

If Tremlett is sidelined, fellow Ashes-winner Tim Bresnan will be recalled.

Rahul Dravid was the only member of India's celebrated top order to make a century at Lord's but the likes of Tendulkar and Venkatsai Laxman will be keen to post a significant score.

So too will 21-year-old left-hander Abhinav Mukund, opening while Virender Sehwag recovers from a shoulder injury.

Sehwag has an unrivalled ability to attack the new ball whereas Mukund, who

made 49 and 12 at Lord's, is a far more orthodox opener.

"I don't want to replace Sehwag or play like he does, because it's not possible," Mukund said. "I just want to go out and play how I know. If it comes off it will help the team."

And he insisted India were well-capable of demonstrating the resilience that had taken them to the summit of Test cricket during the rest of this series.

"Being the world number one, the India team has conquered a lot of challenges on the way here.

"We've come here to take up this challenge, and will definitely give it a good fight."

Lochte breaks record, but at cost of Phelps

America's Ryan Lochte broke a 19-month record drought and deepened Michael Phelps's season of woe Thursday as he won a thrilling 200m individual medley at the World Championships in Shanghai.

In a high-tempo evening at Oriental Sports Centre, Australian hotshot James Magnussen delivered a fifth-to-first victory in the 100m freestyle and Jiao Liuyang claimed China's fourth swimming gold in the women's 200m butterfly.

Lochte out-duelled Olympic champion Phelps to win the medley in 1min 54.00sec,

shaving one tenth of a second off his 2009 world record, with his team-mate taking silver and Hungary's Laszlo Cseh third.

With the win, the 26-year-old Lochte retained his world title and earned further bragging rights over his long-time rival, who is struggling to reach the level that has earned him 14 Olympic gold medals.

Lochte also ended a lengthy barren streak which had seen no long-course records broken since super-fast polyurethane swimsuits were banned at the start of last year.

"I knew it was going to be a battle between Michael and I. I got the better end this time," Lochte said. "Any time you break a world record, you've got to be excited. I trained really hard and it paid off."

Phelps enjoyed a slim early lead over the butterfly leg but Lochte, swimming in the adjacent lane, edged it over the backstroke, breaststroke and freestyle sections to win by 0.16sec.

Lochte had already beaten Phelps to win the 200m freestyle title, turning the screw on his out-of-sorts team-mate after Phelps was part of the United States' relay team that lost its six-year grip on the 4x100m relay on day one.

But Phelps stormed back with a dominant win in the 200m butterfly, which is not one of Lochte's events, sealing the 23rd world title of his record-breaking career as the clock ticks down to his retirement next year.

In the 100m freestyle final, Magnussen was well out of the medals at the turn but he roared past the field over the second 50m to take it in 47.63sec ahead of Canada's Brent Hayden and William Meynard of France.

London begins 2012 Olympics countdown

The one-year countdown to the 2012 Olympics got under way here Wednesday with officials bullishly predicting London was on course to deliver the best ever games with 12 months to go.

International Olympic Committee chief Jacques Rogge was set to extend a formal invitation to the world's athletes during a 7:00pm ceremony at Trafalgar Square in the culmination of day-long events to mark the one-year milestone.

British diver Tom Daley was due to plunge into the waters of the gleaming new Aquatics Centre, one of an array of new venues which have been built at the 2.5 square kilometre (one square mile) Olympic Park site in east London.

The British capital is also showcasing some of the venues being incorporated into the city's most famous landmarks, including a beach volleyball arena at Horseguard's Parade where tonnes of sand have been deposited.

London 2012 organising committee (LOCOG) chairman Sebastian Coe said preparations for the Games were on schedule with 90 percent of venues complete.

"We are fully on track, we are on schedule, and we are within budget with one year to go and I take particular pride in that," Coe told journalists.

Fingers crossed for Tremlett

England captain Andrew Strauss was optimistic Chris Tremlett would be fit to face India in the second Test here at Trent Bridge despite the fast bowler's "tight" hamstring.

The giant Surrey quick, who suffered the injury during England's 196-run first Test win at Lord's concluded Monday, trained briefly at Trent Bridge here on Thursday -- the day before the second of this four-match series starts.

He also received massage treatment on the outfield.

With England set to field just a four-man attack, they won't want to gamble on the fitness of one of their bowlers, especially as Lord's showed what can happen when a member of a bowling quartet breaks, with India's Zaheer Khan spending most of the match off the field because of a hamstring problem.

England also have Ashes-winning seamer Tim Bresnnan waiting in the wings.

Strauss, however, said of Tremlett: "I think he's fine, obviously he's had a bit of a niggles with his hamstring. He's just getting a massage and will be coming out for a bit of a bowl later.

"At the moment we expect him to be fit for

tomorrow (Friday) but obviously like all these things we'll see in the morning.

"We're confident he should be okay.

"You've always got to weigh these things in, it's a short turn-around between Test matches but we're not going to pick someone in the side unless we're sure he is 100 per cent fit and able to get through the full five days."

And he said there would be no issues over Tremlett being so keen to keep his place in the side that he would go into the game not fully fit.

"Everyone understands they have a responsibility to be honest," he said.

Strauss added: "Tim Bresnan has not let anyone down. He was outstanding in Australia and is getting better and better."

England will replace India at the top of the ICC's Test Championship table if they win this series by 2-0 or better, but Strauss said: "We're not worrying about that, just winning the next match and the series."

And he warned India would be stung by the manner of their defeat at Lord's.

"When you lose a Test, you want to prove you are better than you showed and I'm sure India will want to do that."

Strauss added England would not be getting carried away on the back of their first Test win, saying: "If you're too self-satisfied, you get caught out the next time you are on the field."

Too good, but too late

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The performance of Bangladesh opened up a debate whether Bangladesh played badly at Beirut or Lebanon, saddled on a cosy 4-0 advantage, took the second-leg match lightly. But whatever the argument is, the half-packed big bowl crowd is convinced that the national team played the best football after a long, long time.

behind the 2-0 win over Lebanon in Dhaka.

"We had earlier sought pardon of the football-loving people of Bangladesh after losing 4-0 in the first leg and we were keen to prove that regardless of whether we concede 4 goals. Besides, we were all fit and comfortable in our home conditions and finally proved our worth," said Sujan.

The desire to compensate for the huge loss in Beirut was stronger for the striking duo Emily and Mithun, as they were condemned for breaking team discipline by playing on hire just the day before their departure to Lebanon for the first-leg match last week.

"Me and Emily could not sleep well and felt ashamed of what we did and are very keen to erase the memory of our misdeed from people's minds by doing something good for the country. This eagerness drove us to play better in front of the home crowd," said Mithun, who opened the account after the barren first half.

"You saw what we did as all of us gave 200 percent and left the field with heads held high as we were determined to win the match regardless of whether we advance to the next round," said Emily, adding that the gruelling journey to Lebanon and some problems there cost them dearly in the first-leg match.

Goalkeeper Mamun, who foiled at least three efforts from the opponents, said their determination to do something better drove them to put on a good show and hoped that he would try his level best in future. Ilievski also termed Mamun the successor of retired goalkeeper Aminul Haque.

On the other hand, Lebanon coach Emile Rustom congratulated the Bangladesh side for the brave show but believed that Lebanon had missed a lot of chances, which cleared the path for Bangladesh.

"I was expecting that the game would be a difficult one but our players squandered a lot of chances," said Rustom adding that it was difficult for Bangladesh to win the game by a 4-0 margin though everything is possible in football.

"After winning the first-leg match comprehensively, perhaps our players were relaxing a bit," Rustom said. "It was the same Bangladesh in Beirut but today they availed the chances that came their way and in contrast our players failed to cash in on the opportunities they created."
