Petrobangla's Unsolicited Deal

Russian compressors, drilling job get nod

The prime minister has approved a proposal of Petrobangla to award the contract for installation of two gas compressors on an unsolicited basis to Russian company Gazprom, which is directly in conflict with an ongoing bidding for the same.

The approval given last week covers drilling of 10 wells in different gas fields of the country with help from Gazprom. It exempts Petrobangla from going for any tender under the special act of 2010 for quick supply increase of power and energy.

Accordingly, Petrobangla hopes to sign a memorandum of understanding (MoU) with Gazprom by next week. A team of Gazprom will arrive in the capital for the MoU signing, said Petrobangla Chairman Hussain Monsur.

But the Gazprom deal for both the compressors and the drilling of wells does

not have any financing. It will take more than \$120 million to install the compressors alone, and another \$50 plus million for the 10 wells. If these are to be funded by the government, there is no allocation as

The authorities have also not completed the technical aspects of installing the Russian compressors. Both of these can take many months or even a year to complete, officials said.

Yet, Petrobangla in its July 11 proposal to the prime minister through the energy ministry insists the Russian compressors can be installed much ahead of the compressors being procured under an Asian Development Bank (ADB)-financed tender floated last year.

Officially unaware of this development, the ADB is presently reviewing the evaluation of a tender to award a contract to Korean Hyundai to install two SEE PAGE 6 COL 4 Home cell to monitor

Bengal Tigers in danger

The number of recent recoveries of tiger skin and bones in and around the Sundarbans apparently dooms the government initiatives to save the Bengal Tigers and their habitat.

Experts say though the government has created much hype about conservation of the mangrove forest and the Bengal Tigers, international demands for tiger trophies and its body parts for medicinal purpose remain the same for a long time.

Recent recoveries give a message that the government should increase monitoring on the forest to stop poaching. Besides, ports and the cities should come under vigilance to stop trade and trafficking, said Dr Monirul H Khan of Jahangirnagar University.

Police on Monday recovered four deer heads and 60 kilograms of venison preserved in ice and arrested three poachers in Rampal upazila in Bagerhat.


'Mugger' beaten to death



Hard time ahead for admission seekers

Public universities can accommodate only half of successful HSC candidates

Over half of the students who came out successful in this year's HSC and equivalent examinations will be denied enrolment at the public universities due to shortage of seats.

According to the latest annual report of the University Grants Commission, 229,491 students this year will get the opportunity to enrol at 31 public universities for honours courses.

Besides, 2,712 seats are available at 18 public medical colleges, 300 in three public dental colleges, 3,350 in 45 private

medical colleges and 680 in 12 private dental colleges, say sources in the

Directorate General of Health Services. The rest of the successful HSC examinees will have to go to private universities, or study honours or degree (pass) courses at government and nongovernment colleges and vocational institutions, say education ministry officials.

However, all these candidates will have to vie for university seats also with a large number of successful examinees of last year's HSC exams.

With the pass rate increasing every
