# The Vendor of Amulets

t was in Rampura that the man with brilliant henna-dyed hair and beard caught my eye. He had walked down the road holding a seven-foot pole when an old woman stopped him and started ing. talking. The pole was covered with merchandise trinkets and costume jewellery, it appeared. I stopped for a closer look.

"Have you been selling these all your life?" I asked.

"Only five years," he replied tersely. His name was Md. Anwar Hossain. He was seventy-six. In another life, he said, he had been a soldier, first serving in East Pakistan Rifles, then Bangladesh Rifles. He started in infantry and rose to Subehdar rank. "There are 850 miles of border in this country. I have seen it all, north to south, east to west," he barked, military style.

But tragedy struck soon after he retired: his entire life saving was robbed from his village home in Jamalpur.

He was going to start a small business with the capital, but now found himself in dire straits. "I came to Dhaka and went without food for seven days until a kind Bede showed me this business. That's how I got started," he said, his voice surprisingly free of regret or self-pity. [Bedes are nomads who live on boats and wander around the country.]

There were several types of tabij, large and small, empty and filled. The latter contained tiny scrolls filled with

prayers. He had small shells worn around the chest for ulcerous pain; rings and metallic bangles for joint pain; and black rubber rings for the ankles of those having trouble walk-

He also carried the latest fashion among amulets, a silver tabij shaped like a bullet.

His 60-70 items cost between five and twenty Taka each. On a good day his sales approached 1000 Taka, he said. How about today? He extracted a few notes from his shirt pocket. "That's it?" I asked, disappointed. Signalling me to wait, he emptied several other pockets. "I sold close to five hundred Taka today from 9:30 to eleven," he declared.

"Do you always sell in Rampura," I asked. "No, I sell everywhere from Shonir Akhra to Mohammedpur to Badda," he said. "Shonir Akhra is quite far. Do you take the bus?" I asked. "I walk everywhere, a different place each day," he said.

Mr. Anwar told me he had two grandchildren by his son, back in Jamalpur. "When will you see them?" I asked. He gave me a "you-have-to-bekidding" look. "At Eid, of course! I will take a week off."

A swarm of women appeared unexpectedly looking for medicinal talismans. I watched Mr. Anwar fit a rheumatism ring into a woman's finger. As I looked over his offerings on the she negotiated the price down to ten Taka, I decided to take my leave. It was turning to be a good day for the vendor of amulets.

# 17 killed, 62 hurt during Eid

Seventeen people were killed, 62 injured and over 50 houses were ransacked throughout the country during the Eid vacation since Tuesday.

Six people were found dead in the city and its outskirts.

Kamrangirchar police recovered the body of Jarina Begum, 30, wife of Kuwait expatriate Mohammad Ali, with stab injuries from her residence in Hasan Nagar on August 29. Her two children were also rescued from there.

Jarina's brother Moktar Hossain said the killer also looted around 20 tolas of gold ornaments and Tk 3 lakh in cash from the house.

Quoting his niece Meem, 9, Moktar said owner of a tea shop adjacent to Jarina's house took some money from Jarina some months ago promising to buy a piece of land for her.

He came to Jarina's house on August 28 at night and gave biscuits to the children, who immediately lost their senses. The children remember hearing the sound of a quarrel coming from Jarina's room, said Moktar.

A case was filed with Kamrangirchar Police Station in this connection.

Meanwhile, the slaughtered bodies of two elderly women were recovered from their residence at Maniknagar of Keraniganj early Tuesday.

Officer-in-charge of Keraniganj Police Station said the deceased are Julekha Begum, 65, and her aunt Rezia Begum, 75. Police arrested Rezia's son Asad, 30, in this connection.

Ashulia police recovered the floating body of a woman aged around 28 from river Turag on Thursday evening.

Savar police recovered the roped body of a youth named Sarwar Hossain, 26, from Duttapara of Birulia area on Thursday night.

### Money Laundering Charges Against Khaleda, Harris

# ACC investigation continues

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) is conducting inquiries into money laundering charges against BNP Chairperson Begum Khaleda Zia and her former political secretary Harris Chowdhury alongside a dozen high profile political and non-political persons.

"ACC is currently conducting inquiries into around 15 allegations of money laundering against some people including Leader of the Opposition Khaleda Zia and Harris Chowdhury", Advocate Md Khurshid Alam Khan, lawyer of the commission, told the news agency yesterday.

ACC has already filed around 30 money laundering cases against a number of people including Khaleda's two sons Tarique Rahman and Arafat Rahman Koko, BNP lawmaker Salauddin Quader Chowdhury, former BNP shipping minister late Akbar

Hossain's son Ismail Hossain Simon, businessman Giasuddin Al Mamun, former chairman of Proshika Qazi Faruque Ahmed, his son Qazi Rubayat Ahmed, unipay2u Chairman Shahiduzzaman alias Shahin, its Managing Director Muntasir Hossain, and Assistant Manager of Power Grid Company of Bangladesh Arshad Ali. Trial of one of the money laundering

cases had already been completed, in which Koko and Simon were convicted of laundering SGD 2,884,000 and USD 932,000 to Singapore and jailed for six years and fined Tk 19.041 crore. Around 15 cases of money launder-

ing are under trial while 15 others under investigation, an ACC official said, adding that most of such cases were lodged during the immediate past law maker Salauddin Quader caretaker government.

ACC on July 7, 2010 pressed moneylaundering charges against BNP Senior Vice-chairman Tarique Rahman and

his business partner Giasuddin Al Mamun on charge of laundering Tk 20.41 crore between 2003 and 2007. On August 11 this year, the High Court

vacated its earlier stay order that cleared the way for continuing a money laundering case filed against Qazi Faruque Ahmed, former chairman of Proshika, and his son Qazi Rubayat Ahmed on charge of laundering Tk 1.03 crore. ACC on October 11, 2009 sued


unipay2u Chairman Shahiduzzaman alias Shahin and Managing Director Muntasir Hossain on charges of fraudulently collected Tk 246.13 crore and split the cash into their own and the organisation's accounts to conceal the source of the fund.

The commission earlier sued BNP Chowdhury on charges of laundering \$250,000 and HK\$100,000 (\$12,864) to buy Beximco Pharmaceuticals' global depository receipts (GDRs).





#### BSS, Dhaka Indian media seem to be highly optimistic about a positive outcome
