Teesta treaty uncertain Transit on, but

Delhi takes time as Mamata says 'no' to deal; Dhaka hopeful, ready to receive Manmohan with all warmth today



A warm welcome awaits Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh who flies into Dhaka this forenoon on a two-day visit aimed at giving a new impetus to the bumpy relations between the two neighbours.

Manmohan's visit to Bangladesh, first by an Indian prime minister in 12 years, suffered a damper after a last-minute drama from Paschimbanga (West Bengal) Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee cast doubt over the signing of Teesta water-sharing treaty.

Bangladesh, however, played down the uncertainty over the deal, citing that no official communication was made by India. Till the filing of this report at 2:00am today, Dhaka held on to the hopes given earlier by New Delhi, turning a blind eye to the headlines made by Mamata across the border yesterday.

The deal that reportedly provided for 50-50 sharing of the river water met protests from Mamata who was so upset that she pulled



out from the entourage of Manmohan.

New Delhi bowed to Mamata, whose Trinamool Congress is a key component of the Congress-led United Progressive Alliance government in the centre.

"Nothing will be done without acceptance by West Bengal," Indian Foreign Secretary Ranjan Mathai told journalists in New Delhi.

Finance minister AMA Muhith has said it is not possible to provide transit facility to India before next year as related work could not be completed.

"We will take time and do not want to do anything in a hurry," Muhith told The Daily Star at his secretariat office yesterday.

He, however, said some deadlines for giving different transit facilities, including use of Chittagong and Mongla ports, will be fixed during the Indian prime minister's Dhaka visit.

On Sunday, Foreign Minister Dipu Moni told a press conference that no transit deal will be signed during Manmohan Singh's visit but a letter of exchange will be **SEE PAGE 13 COL 1**


Paschimbanga Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee has thrown a wrench into the signing of Teesta water-sharing treaty, claiming she has not been consulted about the final draft of the deal.

Indian Foreign Secretary Ranjan Mathai yesterday said no agreement will be signed without consultation with the West Bengal government, reports our New Delhi correspondent.

Mathai was speaking at a press conference at the external affairs ministry on the eve of Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh's visit to Dhaka.

He said, "The subject of water is a sensitive issue. We have been trying to arrive at an agreement on Teesta, which is acceptable to all parties.

"In our federal scheme of things, nothing is done or will be done without consultation with SEE PAGE 6 COL 1

Cricket board acts on Zimbabwe tour debacle

Shakib Al Hasan and Tamim Iqbal have been removed as Bangladesh captain and vice-captain respectively following the Tigers' disastrous performance on the recent tour to Zimbabwe.

Bangladesh Cricket Board's announcement came yesterday after the meeting of the directors who came down heavily on Shakib and his deputy for their failure as leaders both on and off the field while discussing the Zimbabwe debacle.

In December last year both had been appointed captain and vicecaptain for the current year, but BCB's media committee chairman Jalal Yunus said that they had no other choice than taking the hardline to cut short their tenure.


Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina will receive her Indian counterpart Manmohan Singh at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport at 11:55am.

The Indian leader will be presented a 19-gun salute and a guard of honour by a contingent of army, navy and air force troops.

A 136-member official delegation will accompany Manmohan including the chief ministers of Assam, Tripura, Meghalaya and Mizoram.
