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History repeats itself

Obasi learns it the losing way

Six years ago, a 19-year-old Chinedu Obasi was so close to lifting the World Youth Football Championship. The Nigerian youngster was one of the stars of that tournament, having scored three important goals. He scored against Switzerland in the group stages, then scored against Morocco to see the African side to the cherished final.

But there in the final, Obasi came up against a man who would later go on to become the best in the world. He was playing against Lionel Messi's Argentina. Obasi showed his best by scoring one, but fell short by two penalties from Messi. Having come so close and yet bidding the Cup goodbye is something which makes Obasi very emotional to this day. A member of the Nigeria national side now, Obasi recalled that match with much affection and a bit of sadness, as he talked at his hotel lobby yesterday.

"It was a very emotional match for me. Because I scored in that match, yet ended up on the losing side. We had to concede to the two penalties from Messi. It still hurts as we came so close to winning the trophy."

Despite that tinge of sadness, Obasi is fond of that tournament in Switzerland since it was there that he grabbed the attention of football pundits and was soon rewarded with a promotion to the national side. "It was a memorable tournament for me. I scored in the group phase and then scored in the semifinal too," recalled Obasi fondly.

Life would have been lot easier had it been the end of the story. But as fate conspired three years later, Obasi's Nigeria was up against the same team in another final, this time the Argentine national team in the final of the Beijing Olympics in 2008. As luck would have it, Nigeria lost that too.

Nigeria though had their revenge lately, earlier this year, when they thrashed the former world champions by 4-1 in Abuja. Sadly for Obasi, he wasn't in the playing eleven in that SEE PAGE 17 COL 1
