India must boost counter-terror ops

Says Indian PM



Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh said yesterday that this week's attack in Delhi served to remind everyone that the country urgently needed to boost its intelligence gathering abilities.

"The terrorist attack in Delhi last Wednesday is a stark

reminder to us that there can be no let-up in our vigilance," Singh said during an address to a multiparty gathering on national integration, three days after a bomb ripped through a crowd outside the High Court, killing 13 people.

"We must continuously upgrade and strengthen our investigating agencies and our intelligence gathering apparatus to deal more effectively with the newer methods and technologies" adopted by terrorists, he



government had done much to bolster intelligence-sharing between state and central agencies and had strengthened coastal security, but admitted

that "major challenges still remain". Experts say Indian security agencies, and in particular the police, suffer from underfunding, a lack of training and poor

intelligence gathering and sharing.

As part of the investigation into Wednesday's attack, police in Indian Kashmir detained a man suspected of sending an email claiming responsibility for the court bombing.

Fierce clashes erupt for Gaddafi bastion

Surrender deadline expires for former regime loyalists

The deadline expired yesterday for forces loyal to ousted Libyan strongman Muammar Gaddafi to surrender, with fighters of the country's new leadership poised to attack hold-out strongholds.

After fierce clashes on Friday in Bani Walid, a Gaddafi bastion southeast of Tripoli, an AFP reporter on the town's eastern front at Sedata some 60 kilometres south of Misrata could hear distant artillery fire.

Nato aircraft could also be heard overhead, he said.

The National Transitional Council (NTC) set Saturday as the deadline for towns still loyal to Gaddafi to surrender, and on-off talks have been going on for days over Bani Walid.

A number of former regime officials, including Gaddafi's spokesman Mussa Ibrahim, are believed to be holed up there.

NTC chief Mustafa Abdel Jalil arrived in the port city of Misrata while en route for his first visit to Tripoli since the fighters of the new leadership captured the capital.

Abdel Jalil told AFP his visit to Tripoli from NTC headquarters in Benghazi was "temporary," and that the council he heads would move to Tripoli "after the (full) liberation" of Libya.

An AFP correspondent said Abdel Jalil was due to give a news conference in Misrata, a city which suffered a lengthy siege by pro-Gaddafi forces that was lifted only in August.

Fighters returning from the front reported clashes between NTC "sleeper cells" and pro-Gaddafi forces in and near Bani Walid overnight, and said they were reinforcing advance positions amid "fierce resistance" from diehards.

According to chief NTC negotiator Abdullah Kenshil, "the attack will take

place, but its timing will be decided by military leaders on the ground."

On Friday, a top NTC commander said "decisive military action" was imminent.

On Friday ahead of the deadline, fighting erupted in Bani Walid as pro-NTC elements inside the town clashed · with Gaddafi forces.

G8 renew promises to help 'Arab Spring'

G8 finance ministers outlined plans yesterday to support the Arab Spring amid claims their previous promises to help the region's transition from dictatorship to democracy did not materialise.

The Group of Eight finance chiefs meeting in Marseille reaffirmed their pledges for \$40 billion (29 billion euros) in financing to Tunisia, Egypt, Morocco and Jordan over the next two years, officials said.

The money is earmarked to support reform and help new governments weather short-term economic instability in the wake of popular uprisings that began in Tunisia and toppled its strongman leader before spreading to Egypt and Libya.

The ministers from Britain, Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Russia and the United States on Saturday turned their attention to the Arab Spring.

They had invited Libya's new rulers to Marseille in a follow-up to the economic support for post-revolutionary governments announced at a G8 meeting in Deauville, northern France, in May.

The fledgling Libyan administration's officials on Saturday joined Egypt, Jordan, Morocco and Tunisia to explain how they planned to relaunch their economies and hear what help they can expect from the world's major economic powers.

Iraqi security forces on Friday found a mass grave in Dujail north of Baghdad that contained the bodies of 40 men who were killed during the past two years, police said.

The victims were mostly taxi drivers, an interior ministry official said, adding three men have been arrested and confessed to the murders, which he believes were carried out by a gang.

The source said the bodies were buried in a mass grave. All were male, and all died from gunshot wounds.

"The earliest victim was killed two years ago, and the latest 10 days ago," said a police official.

Musharraf vows return to Pakistan

Former Pakis-tani President Gen Pervez Musharraf said on Fri-day that he is determined to return to Pakistan by March 2012, even if he is arrested.

"Let them arrest me... I'll [still] go back," he told the BBC.

Gen Musharraf is wanted by an anti-terrorist court in Pakistan over accusations he failed to protect Benazir Bhutto assassination in December 2007.

He describes the case against him as "baseless".

Last month, the court ordered the seizure of his properties and freezing of his bank accounts after his continued refusal to respond to the accusations.

Flyover not faulty

The committee comprised of representatives from Buet, DCC, LGED and the army, recommended constant monitoring of the 1.9km flyover and said a thorough investigation would be done if the problem arises again.

"We examined whether there is any loss or deflection of the foundation. If there was any problem in it then structural faults must be evident," Prof Munaz Ahmed Noor of Buet civil engineering department told a press conference at Nagar Bhaban in the city yesterday.

Asked why the shuttering plates subsided, he said it might have been there since construction. "It was not noticed then as we have little experience in precision construction," said Munaz.

'We have little experience in precision engineering. So, two girders could not be set on same level due to the fault in construction," said Munaz, adding, to notice the sinking earlier, "If we are wrong, then the problem will worsen. If we are right, then the committee believes there is no need for repairs."

He, however, said there is no major fault in the construction. "As an expert, I will not term it subsidence. It is a construction error which occurred during finishing. So there is no danger at all."

The Tk 81 crore flyover was designed and constructed by the local engi-

neers. The flyover has been maintained by Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) since six months after it was opened to public on March

23, 2005. The flyover was closed around 7:00pm Friday. Khilgaon level crossing and its surrounding roads witnessed heavy congestion yesterday before the flyover was opened around 1:00pm. MONITORING

Sources said the DCC hardly monitors or maintains the flyover. The DCC zone office-4 is responsible for the flyover but sources say that the office is least bothered about it. "Some people in the DCC

are pocketing the maintenance fund," a DCC official told The Daily Star seeking anonymity. DCC Mayor Sadeque Hossain Khoka, however, said, "We are doing everything regarding flyover main-

tenance." Khoka and the

DCC chief engineer could not give any idea of the size of the maintenance fund. Asked why the DCC failed Khoka said unlike journalists DCC engineers do not

The mayor said they did not consider the sinking a fault.

Khilgaon flyover was planned and designed by the former Awami League government between 1998 and 2000. Groundwork began at the fag end of its tenure.

But the BNP-Jamaat government stopped construc-

tion for about a year and changed the design following influence of then public

works minister Mirza Abbas. There were two loops in the original design so that people living in Rajarbagh, Malibagh, Shahjahanpur, Khilgaon, Goran, Bashabo and Sabujbagh of the capital could move smoothly avoiding the Khilgaon Level Crossing that caused regular congestion.

One of the loops was omitted from the design. The result was people coming from Khilgaon and Rampura could not easily go

towards Motijheel and Kamalapur Railway Station. Mirza Abbas at a press

conference in 2005 said the

loop could not be constructed due to scarcity of land. The other loop that started from north Shahjahanpur and then went towards Sayedabad to

facilitate easy movement of people from Rajarbagh is also faulty, experts said. "The loop suddenly takes

a 90-degree left turn which is very risky," said a Buet expert. He said the flyover failed to yield full benefits due to the design change.
