Barca the team to beat Tough times ahead, says

Seeking a third Champions League title in four years, Barcelona will again be the team to beat when Europe's elite club competition kicks off this week.

Led by Lionel Messi, the Spanish giants produced a football clinic to dispatch Manchester United 3-1 in last season's final at Wembley and few would bet against them being anointed European champions for a fifth time in May's showpiece at Munich's Allianz Arena.

"They are so difficult to play against," said United striker Wayne Rooney. "It is hard to get the ball off them and when you do, you are tired from chasing around.

"You have to applaud them for the way they play. They are a great team to watch. Our aim for us to reach that level over the next few years."

Fierce Spanish rival Real Madrid, English sides United, Chelsea and bigspending newcomer Manchester City plus Italian champion Milan are among the main threats to Barcelona this season.

And it's at home against Milan, a seven-time European champion, where Barcelona begins the defense of its title in a repeat of the 1994 final, which the Serie A team won by dishing out a memorable 4-0 thrashing.

Barcelona is Europe's superpower 17 years on, however.

Of the first timers, Man City looks likely to be the one to break up the established order.

Backed by the bottomless pockets of Abu Dhabi billionaire Sheikh Mansour, City has built a squad that is the envy of most clubs on the continent and has won all four of its matches in the Premier League this season. With options in its forward line comprising Carlos Tevez, Sergio Aguero, Edin Dzeko, David Silva and Samir Nasri among others, they could make a splash back in Europe's elite for the first time since 1968.

"This a new season, a new era," said England defender Joleon Lescott, who is among the raft of expensive recruits brought in by City over the past two years. "We've got new signings and once everyone is together and firing on all cylinders, I'm sure we will be there or thereabouts."

City opens up Wednesday against Italian side Napoli, with four-time European champion Bayern Munich of Germany and Spanish team Villarreal also in a tough-looking Group A.

Bayern Munich coach Jupp Heynckes has warned the German league leaders that a 7-0 rout of Freiburg should leave no room for complacency as they embark on their much-anticipated Champions League campaign.

Having last won the Champions League title in 2001, Bayern begin their Group campaign at Spain's Villarreal on Wednesday.

Tough tasks lie ahead as Bayern face German titlerivals Schalke 04 and Bayer Leverkusen over the next two weekends in the Bundesliga before hosting Manchester City at the Allianz Arena on September 27 in the Champions League.

"We know we'll have to keep on improving, because we have a packed and intense programme over the next few weeks," said Heynckes.

Bayern striker Mario Gomez, who scored four goals, and midfielder Franck Ribery, two, shone in Saturday's rout in Munich while replacement Nils Petersen scored the seventh just before the final whistle.

The rout leaves Bayern top of the league and with just over a month gone of the new season, they already have a goal difference of 15.

as a 'brat'

Former FIFA vice-president Chung Mong-joon has compared Sepp Blatter to a "little brat," saying he rules the governing body of world football like a dictator. Chung made the criticism in

a memoir published in South Korea last week, titled My Challenge, My Enthusiasm. Chung had been regarded as a leading candidate to succeed Blatter as FIFA president before being defeated in an Asian election for the vice presidency early this year. The book hits stores as

Blatter prepares to present detailed anti-corruption reforms in October after a year of scandal that has rocked world football.

"President Blatter is fluent in five languages, has a good way with words and is intelligent ... but I think he is not an international gentleman and he is like a little brat," Chung said in the book.

Chung, who served as a FIFA vice-president for 16 years, accused Blatter of trying to usurp the authority of FIFA's executive committee via his proposal to create an oversight, anti-corruption panel that could include former U.S. diplomat Henry Kissinger and opera singer Placido Domingo.

'Germany more complete than Spain'

Brazil head coach Mano Menezes has heaped praise on the quality of the Germany national team, stating that it is a more complete package than current world champions Spain.

The 49-year-old tactician has come under fire of late after watching Brazil crash out of Copa America in the quarterfinals at the hands of Paraguay.

Menezes has vowed to improve the quality of the team, but a 3-2 defeat against Germany and a 1-0 victory over Ghana have given the fans very few reasons to rejoice.

The coach conceded his side are still far away from what they have been in the past, and stated he believes Germany are currently the best national team on the planet.

"It is necessary to recognize Brazil are no longer playing the best football in the world," he told Veja. "This is nothing new. At the 2010 World Cup we were behind Germany, who for me are the most complete team, even more complete than Spain.

He added "Germany has always been very methodical and almost perfect when it comes to tactics, but they lacked the ability to solve matches. This gap has been brilliantly filled by players such as [Mesut] Ozil, [Thomas] Muller and [Bastian] Schweinsteiger."

Menezes lamented that, contrary to Germany, Brazil will have to go through a quick period of transition for the upcoming World Cup, but stressed he still thinks he can turn the team's fortunes around.
