

A bonding of heritage and nature

Ustad Rashid Khan creates a whirlwind of notes at Celebrating Life 2011 finale

Dhaka music connoisseurs were seen eagerly waiting at the entrance of Bangabandhu International Conference Centre on September 12. Though it was the award giving ceremony of 'Celebrating Life', the main attraction was a live performance by Indian classical vocalist Ustad Rashid Khan. 'Celebrating Life' is an annual talent hunt recognising emerging photographers, filmmakers and lyricists, organised by The Daily Star and Standard Chartered Bank, Bangladesh.

Khan's sublime style of rendition has won him legions of disciples and ardent fans.

Perfect diction, clarity in sur (musical notes) and gayaki (creative musical progression), command over all aspects of laya and rhythm, depth of composition and an unmistakable interplay between notes and words to evoke the desired mood and emotions have created the hallmark of Ustad Rashid Khan's music.

The full-house hailed the artiste as he appeared on stage. Star Arts & Entertainment editor and Nazrul Sangeet artiste Sadya Afreen Mallick and singer Khairul Anam Shakil introduced the Ustad to the audience.

The Ustad on surmandal began with a rendition set on a profound, melancholic raga -- Malkauns. The meditative khayal was on vilambit ektaal. An intimate bond between the human soul and the eternal soul was the essence of his bandish: "Tu hai malik mero. karam karo".

Through articulating the word "Malik" repeatedly during the blossoming of the melodic alaap, the Ustad tried to appease the Divinity, and also the raga that is considered a manifestation of Divinity by musicians. Sarangi artiste Murad Ali Khan predominantly played the gamakbased alaap and bistaar in between the bandish so superbly that the immaculate jugalbandi appeared as a musical sawal-jawab.



With the words "Yaad aawat mohe pi ki bathia", the Ustad tions. started a drut bandish on teentaal. The rendition was like flashes of lightning on a monsoon night. Wah! Kya Baat! were the instant responses form the audience that was producing rounds of applause every now and then.

Taan performances by Khan's disciples -- Krishna Bongane and Wali Fateh Ali Khan -- were excellent. The duo

accompanied the maestro in vocals too. Fashioning a musical high, Ustad Rashid Khan moved on to another drut bandish, "Aaj morey ghar aairey balma" on teentaal. Subhankar Banerjee styled two tabla rela (torrent of beats). Amid the performance, solo pieces by harmonium player Jyoti Guho and the sarangi artiste were added attrac-

Another khaval (short) on the intense Raga Megh followed. "Aayi barkha jhum jhum kar" was the bandish that splendidly went well with the weather.

With the bandish "Eri sakhi mori piya ghar aaye", a romantic kaharba was next. Based on Raga Mishra Pahari, the composition terrifically captured the hearts of the listen-

Based on another romantic raga, Mand, a thumri performance by the artiste moved the audience. Ustad Bade Ghulam Ali Khan recorded and immortalised "Yaad Piya Ki Aaye". Ustad Rashid Khan wrapped up his performance with another thumri , "Aaj Radha Brijko Chali", set on Bhairavi, a

The unquenchable thirst of the Dhaka audience for good music was seemingly not appeased, as they wanted more renditions from the Ustad who has a Padma Shri, as well as the Sangeet Natak Akademi Award to his credit.

The artiste whom Pandit Bhimsen Joshi considered "an assurance for the future of Indian vocal music" was indeed the part of the finale pretty much everyone was looking forward to, but the event had much more to offer.

"Why celebrate life?" -- pondered Mahfuz Anam, editor and publisher of The Daily Star. "Life is all we have, and if we don't have celebrations, life becomes drab. Culture, arts particularly fine arts, give life a higher purpose. Bangladesh's best face is its culture. If we want to make a lasting impact on a global level, our cultural heritage would be the apt means," he said.

"Because of harsh economic realities, we don't get to celebrate our cultural heritage in a befitting manner. In music, lyricists are often sidelined; photography is an emerging medium in Bangladesh but it needs more recognition and filmmaking should be widely encouraged. "Celebrating Life' is our [The Daily Star and Standard Chartered Bank, Bangladesh] effort to recognise and promote emerging talents," Mahfuz Anam added.

Though the annual talent hunt had a massive pool of 4000 photographs and 6000 songs to choose from, the standard of film entries was not up to the mark. "However, 'Celebrating Life' held a workshop for 30 young aspiring filmmakers, and we'll support the cream of the crop in producing films," The Daily Star editor informed.

Jim McCabe, CEO of Standard Chartered Bank, Bangladesh, delivered the vote of thanks. In his speech, McCabe said that as one of the oldest financial institution in the country, Standard Chartered Bank would continue supporting excellence in the cultural field.

Twenty up and coming lyricists and photographers were

awarded at the programme. The winners received their awards from the chief guest, Information and Cultural Affairs Minister Abul Kalam Azad. Ripa Sarker won the top spot in lyrics category; Bilal Hossain and Tahera Halim are the first and second runner-up respectively. M. Yusuf Tushar won the first prize in the photography category; Mamun Sultan and Noor Ahmed earned the first and sec-

The unexpectedly remarkable performance coincidentally matched the unpredicted rain that washed the city. The refined Pakhawaj, the heady concoction of khol and madol, and the consummate tabla sent a bold message: when it comes to culture, Bangladesh has no shortage of brilliance. That message is at the centre of 'Celebrating Life'. The event couldn't have had a better start.
