

Ferdinand out | of Man Utd opener

Manchester United defender Rio Ferdinand will miss the Premier League champions' opening Champions League Group C match against Benfica in Lisbon on Wednesday, the club said on Tuesday.

A statement on the club's website (www manutd.com) said Ferdinand was not part of the 19-man squad who flew from Manchester airport on Wednesday morning.

Ferdinand missed matches against Tottenham Hotspur and Arsenal because of a hamstring injury but played against Bolton Wanderers three days ago.

"Ferdinand's regular centre-back partner Nemanja Vidic will also miss the trip (calf), as expected, along with Tom Cleverley (foot), Danny Welbeck (hamstring) and Rafael (shoulder)," the statement said

Colourful midfielder Joey Barton was handed the captain's armband by QPR manager Neil Warnock on his debut against his former club Newcastle United here on Monday but was unable to

deliver them victory in a 0-0 draw. The 29-year-old Englishman - capped once for

his country - signed for QPR on a free transfer last month after falling out with the Newcastle management and board. However, while he along with gifted Moroccan

Adel Taraabt produced sparkling performances in a match that the hosts largely dominated they were unable to find the finishing touch to give them the three points but it at least ended a run of three home defeats. The draw also allowed Newcastle to maintain

their unbeaten start to the season - it sees them go to fourth in the table - which is their best since the 1995-96 season when they ended up finishing second.

QPR had some great chances to put their opponents away with another of Warnock's astute transfer window signings Shaun Wright-Phillips going closest with a chip on 39 minutes but Steven Taylor did brilliantly to hook the ball away off the line.

Indeed Taylor had had to do that earlier in the half this time from as he nicked the ball off Alejandro Faurlin when he was sizing up knocking the ball home from close range.

However, other missed chances from Jay Bothroyd and veteran midfielder Shaun Derry, whose two missed headers illustrated why he hasn't found the net in the past five years, could have been costly against a more ambitious team.

Malaga hits back with win

Bigspending Malaga rebounded from an opening defeat to hand newboys Granada a resounding 4-0 defeat on Monday in the Spanish championship.

Two goals apiece for Spanish international duo Santi Cazorla and Joaquin Sanchez gave the ambitious South coast club their first points of the season in this Andalusian derby. Malaga spent over 60 million of owner Qatari Sheikh Al-

Thani's fortune this summer, so defeat in the first game away to Sevilla was disappointing, but on Monday two of those big name signings showed that they could well be worth the outlay. Cazorla, recruited for 20 million euros from Villarreal,

opened the scoring after four minutes of his home debut with a left footed drive from 20 yards. Joaquin, who also arrived in August from Valencia, then

neatly directed home a Jesus Gamez centre with his head after 25 minutes. Veteran goalscorer Ruud van Nistelrooy nearly added a third after 34 minutes, shooting just wide after great team

play put him clear on goal. Cazorla added to his tally on 47 minutes with a free kick that squeezed through a loose defensive wall to find the left

hand corner of the goal. And it was left to Joaquin to complete the rout on 72 minutes, coolly converting Cazorla's pinpoint pass from the left

For Granada it was a steep learning curve throughout, on their first away day back in Spain's top division, but they showed enough to give hope for future success.

In other games this weekend, Real Madrid beat Getafe 4-2 on Saturday to take an early two point advantage over Barcelona at the top of the league, after the Catalan side dropped points letting a 2-0 lead slip to draw 2-2 away to Real Sociedad.

Valencia beat Atletico Madrid 1-0 to join Real Madrid at the top with two victories from two games, and on Sunday Real Betis beat Real Mallorca 1-0 to do the same.

Arsene Wenger has spoken of his fear that Arsenal are being left behind by a financially elite cartel led by Barcelona and Real Madrid. Arsenal's manager also name-checked Chelsea and Manchester City as part of a group of clubs whose spending power has separated them from the rest of Europe's sides.

The Frenchman foresees an economic meltdown across Europe and he said that it may be the only thing to rein in Barcelona and Real, who have benefited greatly from being able to negotiate individual television rights contracts in Spain. The Premier League has always had a collective agreement.

"I believe that this season, I see two teams that are above the rest Real Madrid and Barcelona and the rest have to catch up during the season," Wenger said. "So for us, it's a new start because we are a new squad. What is at stake during the group stage for us is to show that we can go through.

"We are in our 14th season in the Champions League group phase and what has changed is that the competition inside England has become bigger among the top teams.

"It is as difficult to win the Champions League because a team that wins the Premier League is in the Champions League final almost every year.

"Outside the country, Barça and Real Madrid have much more financial power than they had 14 years ago because they have individualised their TV rights. So they, at the moment, with teams like Man City and Chelsea can take who they want."

Wenger was asked directly about the emergence of a clutch of clubs with financial might that outstrips the rest, and the attendant difficulties for a club such as Arsenal. "You know about it, I don't need to explain that," he replied. "We have seen the first signs of some resistance in Spain, where everybody complains.

"I believe that Europe overall, as a unit, is going towards a massive crisis, which nobody really expects now. I am convinced that Europe will go into a huge financial crisis within the next three weeks or three months and maybe that will put everything into perspective again."
