Three bakery owners jailed

A mobile court team of Bangladesh Standards and Testing Institution (BSTI) awarded different terms of imprisonment to owners of three bakeries for manufacturing bakery items in unhygienic condition and without taking BSTI licence at Kalyanpur in the city yesterday.

The team led by Executive Magistrate
Mohammad Al Amin with the help of Dhaka district administration and police personnel awarded four months imprisonment to Abdul Kuddus, owner of Eastern Bakery at 19, Kalyanpur, and Nizam Uddin, owner of Bannya Bakery at 24, Kalayanpur, says a press release.

The court also awarded one-month imprisonment to Md Ershad, owner of Jewel Bakery at 19/1, Kalyanpur for the same reasons.

DU students threaten movement

Students of the Dhaka University (DU) yesterday threatened to start tough movement if the authorities do not reduce the amount of class absence fine.

Several hundred students brought out a proces-

sion to press home their demand on the university campus and handed over a memorandum to Vice-Chancellor Prof AAMS Arefin Siddique.

The university authorities increased the fine from Tk 1,000 to Tk 5,000 on August 7.

Pension of sub, zila-registrars postponed

The government postponed proceedings regarding pension of all sub-registrars and zila-registrars exempted by the now defunct Truth and Accountability Commission (TAC) as Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) initiated proceedings against them.

"As those who went to TAC are currently under ACC scrutiny, all proceedings in this regard will remain postponed until the matter is disposed of," said a press release issued by law, justice and parliamentary affairs ministry yesterday.

The order comes a day after the anti-graft watchdog announced initiation of legal proceedings against all the 448 people who confessed before TAC of their corruption and surrendered their ill-gotten wealth in exchange for clemency.

Two alleged Hizb ut-Tahrir men arrested

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab-2) personnel early yesterday arrested two alleged members of banned Hizb ut-Tahrir, including a Dhaka University student, from a house in the city's Hajaribagh area.

Of the detainees, Towhidur Rahman, 22, is a second semester student of the DU marketing department, while Tariqul Hasan Ashiq, 18, is an admission seeker, said Mohammad Safiul Sarwar, assistant superintendent of police (ASP) of Rab-2.

Sarwar said huge anti-state publications, including leaflets and books and a laptop, have been seized from their possession.

Towhidur and Ashiq are staying on the second floor of the house of a retired secretary as tenants near Madhubagh Mosque.

Sarwar said the detained persons admitted their involvement with the banned organisation.



Returnees protest unfair arbitration

One migrant spent Tk 4.5 lakh only to get Tk 15,000 as compensation

A group of around 60 migrant workers formed a human chain inside the manpower bureau premises at Kakrail yesterday protesting what they termed unfair arbitration to the returnee migrants.

They said they went abroad with emigration clearances of Bureau of Manpower Employment and Training (BMET) but were forced to return following various forms of exploitation and irregularities by the recruiting agencies.

Upon return, they sought justice at BMET, the only place they have to seek redress, but were subjected to negligence, harassment and injus-

Humayun Ahmed flies to New York for cancer treatment

Popular writer Humayun
Ahmed flew to New York
yesterday morning for the
treatment of colon cancer,
diagnosed at Mount
Elizabeth Hospital in
Singapore recently.

"Just a few days back he went to Mount Elizabeth Hospital for a routine check up. There the doctors found a cancerous tumor in his colon. But he did not want to undergo treatment there.

"That is why he came back to the country and flew for Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center without any delay," said Dr Muhammad Zafar Iqbal, noted writer and professor of Shahjalal University of Science and Technology.

Dr Zafar, Humayun's younger brother, said after an open heart surgery at Mount Elizabeth Hospital a few years back, Humayun used to go there from time to time for routine check ups. Humayun's wife and two sons also went with him

According to oncologists, most tumors in the colon are cancerous. But the rate of colon cancer is low in Bangladesh compared to lung, oral, head-neck and oesophagal cancer.

"But in the context of mortality, for men, colon cancer is perilous after lung cancer," said Prof Akram Hussain of LabAid, adding that surgery is the first treatment of colon cancer.

Cure from this cancer depends on in which stage the tumor is diagnosed, said the experts.

Humayun, now a fulltime author and moviemaker, was a professor of the Department of Chemistry at University of Dhaka.

After publication of his first novel Nondito Noroke, he emerged as one of the most prominent novelist and story-writer of Bangla literature in the

He also achieved success as a screenwriter for television since the late 1980s. In the early 1990s, he entered the movie world and proved himself to be a successful film-

maker.

Metro Rail Route Change Finance minister yet to meet PM

Finance Minister AMA Muhith could not meet Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday for a final resolution over modification of the metro rail route due to his busy schedule, said ministry sources.

There is a little chance of holding the meeting before Friday, said the sources.

Japan International Cooperation Agency (Jica), which is keen to fund 80 percent of the metro rail construction cost, has been pressing for the final decision. Jica officials on Tuesday made it clear that it would not be

able to provide the money in a year if the final decision on metro route is not given in four days.

The route was supposed to come from Agargaon through

Bijoy Sarani to Farmgate. But due to objection by the air force, the route will now be diverted to Khamarbari from Bijoy Sarani-Crescent Road to go to Farmgate.

Construction of \$1.8 billion metro rail, crucial for transporting a large number of passengers from one corner to

porting a large number of passengers from one corner to another of the city during the peak time, has been uncertain due to the government's decision to modify the route following serious objection by the air force.

Experts and government officials have strong reservation about the new proposed route as well since it falls on the parliament complex and seriously damages the beauty of Luis I Kahn masterpiece.

The election, the first in 18 years, was scheduled for today.

A Chittagong court on Tuesday postponed the election upon a petition by Atiqur Rahman, vice president of CCC Jatiyatabadi Sramik Karmachari Union. The petition cited anom-

alies in the voter list.

Protesting the court order, supporters of three unions gathered on the CCC premises since morning, hampering the official activities for four hours.

Gazipur dyeing factory fined

The Department of Environment (DoE) yesterday fined a dyeing factory at Gazipur Tk 1.10 crore for dumping untreated chemical wastes into the river Turag and surrounding areas.

It also requested the Board of Investment to cancel registration of the dyeing factory, Life Textile Ltd and two others --Wakafi Knit Fabrics Ltd and Nightingale Fashions Ltd. The DoE also asked Bangladesh Bank, Islami Bank

Bangladesh Ltd, Krishi Bank and Jamuna Bank to stop loan facility to these factories.

ADoE team, while conducting a drive on Tuesday, found Life

Textile Ltd had been running its operation without environment clearance certificate and Effluent Treatment Plant (ETP). It summoned the factory authority at its office and handed down the punishment.

In last six years, the factory had dumped 3.5 cubic metres of untreated chemical wastes in nearby areas.

On March 2007, the DoE served a notice on it to stop its operation as the factory was polluting environment. But it

South Korea asks Bangladeshis to return by Sept 30

South Korea is asking the Bangladeshi workers, who end their job periods by September 30, to return home and facilitate more Bangladeshis to find jobs there.

South Korea started hiring foreign workers, including Bangladeshis, under Employment Permit Scheme (EPS), through which the sending and receiving governments manage the recruitment system.

Under the arrangement 1,500 Bangladeshis went to Korea in 2008. Of them, 3-year job period of 860 Bangladeshis is going to be over on September 30, according to a press statement issued by the Korean embassy in Dhaka.

If anyone can get reemployed by this time could continue to work there, but those failing to be reemployed will be considered as irregular.

The number of irregular foreign workers is considered as a basis to determine the number of workers from any country, the statement said. If there are fewer irregular Bangladeshis in Korea, it will set a bigger annual quota of recruiting from Bangladesh, it explained.

The Korean embassy and EPS Centre in Dhaka expect all the Bangladeshis whose job periods end by September 30 will return home and facilitate more recruitment from here.
