A Tk 33.56 crore agreement to address some key concerns of development partners and policymakers on aid management was signed between Bangladesh and United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) yesterday.

The agreement over the project titled "Strengthening Capacity for Aid Effectiveness in Bangladesh" would be implemented by Economic Relations Division (ERD) over the next four years from September 2011 to June 2015.

ERD Secretary M Musharraf Hossain Bhuiyan, on behalf of the government, and UNDP County Director Stefan Priesner inked the agreement at ERD in the city's Sher-e-Bangla Nagar.

UNDP signed the agreement on behalf of 18 development organisations including DFID and DANIDA, who already committed to fund the project. Several other development partners expressed their firm interest to join the project.

Development aid constitutes around 50 percent of the Annual Development Plan of Bangladesh, said UNDP Assistant Country Director KAM Morshed while speaking at the programme.

A recent ERD study titled "Aid Management in Bangladesh:

A review of policies and procedures" identified several areas of improvement in the way aid is managed and utilised in the country. "The unique nature of the project is the effort to materialise

a joint commitment made by 18 development partners of

Bangladesh," said Stefan. DFID Country Representative Gwen Hines said, "This is an important step towards maximising the impact of development aid provided to Bangladesh and enhancing transparency to see what is being done and what results are delivered.

# Land boundary agreement not 'surrender' WikiLeaks reports to Bangladesh, says Assam govt

Rejecting the opposition charge that the land boundary agreement and exchange of enclaves with Bangladesh were "surrender", the government of India's North Eastern state of Assam yesterday said the deal will help solve the long-standing border dispute between the two countries and insurgency problem.

"The land deal will be beneficial as several acres of land under Bangladesh will come to Assam and the border dispute will be solved," government spokesman and Accord

Implementation Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma told reporters in Guwahati.

As long as the boundary was not demarcated, fencing could not be erected and the open border helped infiltration from outside. Now with proper demarcation of the boundary, border fencing work will be completed, which will not only stop infiltration but help check trans-border crime, Sarma said.

The major opposition parties in Assam include Bharatiya Janata Party, Asom Gana Parishad, student bodies Assam Students Union and Asom Yuva Chatra Parishad and the popular peasant body Krishak Mukti Sangram Parishad.

The parties opposed the land deal signed recently during the visit of Prime Minister Manmohan Singh to Bangladesh, claiming that several acres of Indian territory were surrendered to a foreign country.

Coming down heavily on the erstwhile Prafulla Mahanta-led Asom Gana Parishad government in Assam, the senior minister alleged that the state "surrendered" huge areas of land to Bangladesh at that time.

"But it is to the credit of the Tarun Gogoi-led Congress government that those areas have been brought back.

"India has not surrendered land to Bangladesh (as alleged by the political parties) and in fact it has regained its own territory which will in the long run help solve the border problem," Sarma

Referring to the recent protests by the opposition parties and the student bodies, Sarma alleged that these were intended to destabilise the government.

STAFF CORRESPONDENT A tannery owner and his wife were injured seriously after a gang of unidentified miscreants stabbed them indiscriminately in their house at


