20 protesters killed Aftermath of 6.8 Quake in India, Nepal in anti-Saleh march in Yemen

At least 20 protesters were killed in the Yemeni capital Sanaa yesterday, when security forces opened fire on one of the biggest demonstrations against President Ali Abdullah Saleh in recent months, a Reuters witness said.

Scores were wounded when protesters tried to break through lines of police who also sprayed them with tear gas as tens of thousands spilled out of Change Square, where many youths have camped out since early this year demanding an end to Saleh's 33-year rule.

Injured protesters were rushed into a field hospital in the square on stretchers. "This is the worst day I've seen in three months. We're expecting more dead to come in," said doctor Jamal al-Hamdani, who was treating patients.

A Reuters witness saw dozens of men slumped on the ground, overcome by tear gas inhalation. Men on motorbikes and ambulances whisked them away from the scene.

Saleh, recovering in neighbouring Saudi Arabia from a June assassination attempt, is holding onto power despite international pressure to quit and eight months of protests which have paralysed the impoverished Arab state.

The Defense Ministry said on its website

protesters threw petrol bombs, setting a police car ablaze. State media blamed gunmen belonging to opposition parties for opening fire on the march.

Frustrated by Saleh's tenacity and their failure to dislodge him, protesters are seeking to ratchet up demonstrations, which have dragged into their eighth month.

"Escalation, escalation," they chanted, flooding side streets where there were large numbers of security forces and armed anti-Saleh tribesmen, who have thrown their weight behind the popular uprising.

"The pain and the bullet won't be a problem," said one protester with a heavily bandaged foot. "What we need is to get rid of this regime ... I could go on until they kill us all," Radwan Qasem, 37, told Reuters.

Earlier on yesterday, fighting broke out in a northern district of Sanaa, the latest breach of a ceasefire between tribesmen opposed to Saleh and troops loyal to him.

Shelling could be heard near the home of a prominent anti-Saleh tribal leader in the Hasaba district, the site of weeks of fighting. The family of Sadeq al-Ahmar said the Republican Guard, commanded by Saleh's son, had shelled their house.

The United States and Saudi Arabia fear unrest in Yemen will embolden al Qaeda's Yemen-based regional wing to launch strikes in the region and beyond.

The Bhowanipore seat fell vacant after Bakshi resigned. As per the Indian constitution, any minister of federal or state government, if not already elected, has to be a member of the national parliament or state legislature within 90 days of his or her becoming



Sudan, south Sign security Palestinian statehood bid will fail: Israel PM

Israel's prime minister predicted yesterday that the Palestinians' quest for UN membership would fail because it bypasses negotiations with the Jewish state, and said he was working close with Washington to ensure the statehood bid withers in the Security

Council. Benjamin Netanyahu put the blame for stalled negotiations squarely on the Palestinians, who are skeptical of his commitment to peacemaking and have refused to return to the bargaining table without an Israeli freeze on settlement construction.

"The truth is, Israel wants peace, and the truth is, the Palestinians are doing all they can to torpedo direct peace talks," Netanyahu told his weekly Cabinet meeting.

"They must understand that despite the current attempt to bypass negotiations again by going to the UN, that peace is achieved only through direct negotiations," Netanyahu added.



"Their attempt to be accepted as a full member of the UN will fail."

Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas said over the weekend that he would submit his bid for full membership to UN chief Ban Ki-moon in New York on Friday, during the annual

General Assembly session in New York. Netanyahu said there was "close cooperation" with the U.S. to make sure the Palestinians' bid is shot down in the UN Security Council, the powerful body that must approve a membership bid. The US has threatened to veto the move if it wins backing from nine of the Council's 15 members - something Washington is trying to prevent.


That would leave the Palestinians with the option of seeking a lesser status of nonmember observer state at the General Assembly, a forum where they would expect to win the necessary simple majority of those present and voting.

Although that would be a largely symbolic victory, the Palestinians hope to use their elevated status on the international stage to press Israel for concessions in any future negotiations.

Netanyahu said he was traveling to New York with two goals: to block the statehood bid at the Security Council and to present "our truth."

Shortly before Netanyahu spoke, a close ally, Cabinet Minister Moshe Yaalon, told Army Radio that "we don't have a partner for peacemaking." It was not clear whether Yaalon was expressing a personal opinion.

two first degree criminal cases. One of the cases is for possessing illegal firearms, and the other is for obstructing law enforcers from carrying out their duties and attempting to murder. Even a home ministry investigation found no evidence of Limon's involvement in any wrongdoing. The boy, who had worked in a brick field on his holidays to chase his dreams of further studies, now faces a gruelling path in the country's judicial system.

Now that the Centre for Disability in Development (CDD) in Savar fitted Limon with an artificial leg on August 29, his worries about going back to normal life, especially to his studies, grows further. Limon wants life. to return to Kathalia College

higher secondary certificate when the incident maimed

him. "The cases against me have no basis whatsoever, but still to prove my innocence my parents and myself have to take the pain of going to the court every time there is a hearing," Limon said with tears in his eyes, "We are poor people trying to survive by working hard and studying. Why should we be subjected to such torture?"

Officials of Ain O Salish Kendra (ASK), a human rights organisation giving Limon legal support in both cases, said unless the cases against him are dismissed, he cannot go back to normal

Documentation Unit of ASK Nur Khan Liton said only the state could help Limon's reintegration into normal

"With physical disability he won't be able to support his family any more," said Liton, "For him to attend hearings in two cases is painful and troublesome, so to continue his studies under these circumstances will be very, very difficult if

not impossible." A High Court bench granted Limon bail for six months on May 6. ASK officials said they will file relevant appeals with the High Court as soon as it opens on October 10 following a vacation.
