He was going to see his mother, a cancer patient living in the city's Kalabagan, and to let her have a glimpse of his fifteen years of life abroad, captured in video and still cameras.

Soon after boarding an Etihad Airways flight (EY140) in Toronto on April 9, air hostesses requested him to send his handbag, carrying the cameras, to his other luggage in the stowage.

Showkat did not mind at all as they assured him of the bag's safety. Little did he know about the shock waiting for him. When

he reunited with his luggage arriving in Dhaka via Abu Dhabi on April 11, he realised the handbag was missing.

Khulna Medical College (KMC) was closed for an indefinite period yesterday amid tension between two groups of Swadhinata Chikitshak Parishad (Swachip), a pro-AL body, of the medical college hospital.

The closure is a sequel to last week's unrest over inviting a pro-Awami League doctors' leader as the chief guest at a programme at the hospital on Wednesday.

The decision came at an urgent meeting of the academic council of the college, following which students were asked to vacate all the three

His studies in limbo

2 Rab cases bar him from normal life

Implicated in two first degree criminal cases, Limon Hossain, the 16-year old college student from Jhalakathi, who was maimed by Rapid Action Battalion on March 23, sees little hope to continue his studies.

"Since my left leg was amputated, following the Rab shooting, my foremost worry has been my education," said Limon, who has been staying at

Gonoshasthaya Nagar Hospital ever since his release from the National Institute of Traumatology and Orthopaedic Rehabilitation (Nitor) where the amputation was done.

"Although people from all walks of life

supported me, I don't know if I will be able to continue my studies with two criminal cases pending against me. These cases were filed by one of the most powerful forces of the country," Limon said.

On March 23, as Limon went to bring back family cattle from the filed near his house, a Rab team, on a manhunt for a local notorious criminal gang leader, shot Limon point blank in the village of Chhaturia. The case triggered an out-

cry nationwide in which Rab started to give contradictory statements. Rab investigators and top officials admitted Limon's innocence on record while others in the battalion mercilessly framed him in **SEE PAGE 6 COL 5**

Ship-breaking worker killed Legal cattle trade to cut border killing

Concludes 2-day seminar on Indo-Bangla relations

The analysts made the observations at a press conference to mark the conclusion of a two-day international seminar on Bangladesh-India Relations at Senate Building, Dhaka University.


