# Bus fares, CNG price hiked

Analysts fear bad impact on consumer spending

Less than 24 hours into the hike in fuel prices, the government yesterday increased bus and auto-rickshaw fares, and the price of compressed natural gas.

Bus and minibus passengers now have to pay an additional 5 paisa per kilometre while CNG-run auto-rickshaw passengers 14 paisa per km, according to the revised fares that came into effect midnight last.

The per km fare on buses is now Tk 1.60, which was Tk 1.55, while the fare on minibuses is Tk 1.50, upped from Tk 1.45.

The minimum fare on buses (Tk7) and minibuses (Tk5) remain unchanged.

Bus fare between Dhaka and its neighbouring districts like Narayanganj, Munshiganj, Gazipur, and Manikganj, was fixed at Tk 1.50 per km.

Diesel-run inter-district buses will also charge extra 5 paisa per kilometre at Tk 1.20.

The communications ministry reset the transport fares following a proposal of Bangladesh Road Transport Authority, ministry sources said.

This was the second transport fare hike in four months. On May 19, the government hiked the transport fares by 30 percent.

## Distance saved Troubles fragile Dhaka

Sikkim quake a warning for the unplanned city

Even the vulnerable and unplanned buildings in Dhaka sustained Sunday's Sikkim earthquake, as it wakened by the time it struck Bangladesh.

The capital felt a "weak" (3.0 to 4.0 on Richter scale) jolt while the northern districts shook "lightly" (4.0 on Richter scale).

The United States Geological Survey (USGS) made a map following the earthquake Sunday evening to measure the intensity of the quake in different areas. The USGS initially measured it at 6.8 on Richter scale but later: quake-prone in the world, revised it at 6.9.

The quake that had its epicentre in Sikkim of India killed at least 71 people in India and Nepal. In Bangladesh, the nearly two-minute quake damaged a number of structures but claimed no life.

Dhaka is one of the top earthquake-prone cities in the world, earthquake expert Prof Humayun Akhter said.
