Route changes responsible; funding faces a year's delay

Foreign funding for the metro rail project in the capital might be delayed for a year, as the government appears unable to convey to the donor agency within this month its decision on the air forcesuggested route diversion.

Besides, various alterations to the route alignment already increased the project cost by one billion US dollars putting the figure at \$2.7 billion, said officials of the government and the donor agency.

The government has to officially convey its decision on the latest route realignment proposal to Japan International

Cooperation Agency (Jica), the lone financier of the project, by September 30 to avail the funding, said a Jica official on Monday, preferring anonymity.

Otherwise the fund allocation cannot be endorsed in the current fiscal year of Japan, causing deferment for a year.

UN chief pleads to break ME stalemate

There is no short cut says Obama; 66th General Assembly begins

UN leader Ban Ki-moon yesterday pleaded for a new international effort to break the Middle East "stalemate" amid a looming diplomatic showdown between Palestinians and Israelis.

Frantic diplomacy from the world's leading powers went on to forestall a Palestinian drive for UN statehood recognition as the 66th UN General assembly began in New York.

Speaking at the start of the UN General


Assembly summit of world leaders, Ban vowed "unrelenting" UN efforts to push forward the peace process.
