Robbery at city factory, house

Criminals flee with Tk 29 lakh, valuables, claims injured owner

A gang of criminals allegedly robbed cash and valuables worth around Tk 4 crore from a factory and a house after beating the factory owner in the city's Badda area on Thursday evening.

Quamrul Ullah, 49, owner of a cosmetic company Enjoy, was admitted to Dhaka Medical College Hospital early yesterday.

Quamrul, who was alone at home during the robbery, said 15 to 20 men entered the house around 5:00pm and forcibly took him to a field, around one kilometre away.

They confined him to a room for four hours and again beat him. They also forced him to sign on a blank paper, he added.

When they let him go, he returned home to find all the furniture and valuables of the house and his factory, adjacent to the house, missing, including Tk 29 lakh in cash, he said.

He said the factory was closed that day.

Officer-in-Charge Mahabubur Rahman of Badda Police Station said three people were arrested after Quamrul filed a case in this connection.

Quamrul sold the house to an Australia expatriate Mizanur Rahman for Tk 75 lakh in 2006 and was living as a tenant. He wanted to buy it back for Tk one crore but Mizanur was not agreeing, creating tension between the two, he added.

Quamrul claimed that he paid Quamrul Tk 19 lakh in advance to buy the house last year and alleged that Mizanur's associates were involved with the robbery.

3 commit suicide

A female garment worker committed suicide by hanging herself at her house at Kalyanpur in the city yesterday.

The deceased is Nazma Akhter, 20, a divorced garment worker.

Police said they recovered her body from the house after she committed suicide by hanging from ceiling with her

Police arrested garment worker Rassel from Tolarbagh of the area on allegation of provocation following the incident.

Quoting family sources, police said Nazma had a love affair with Rassel and he was forcing her to marry him.

Meanwhile, in Jamalpur, two people, including a college girl, committed suicide in separate incidents in Sadar upazila.

Noushin Yeasmin Rimi, 24, daughter of Samsul Haque, of village Kutamony, committed suicide under the wheels of a Dhaka-bound Jamuna train at Tarakandi Rail Station yesterday morning. She was a degree student of Govt Ashek Mahmud College and also a Kindergarten teacher.

Police recovered the body and sent it to Jamalpur Sadar Hospital morgue for autopsy.

In another incident, Sabuj, 26, a pesticide trader, of municipality area, committed suicide by taking poison on Thursday night.

Sources said he committed suicide over a family feud.

The saddest-looking vendor stall I ever saw was in the rain in Khilkhet. Empty and desolate, it announced the services of a watch repairman to an indifferent world. But the stall next door was buzzing with customers braving the rain. What was he offering? Umbrella repairs, of course.

Another day, as the rain just started, I took shelter in the porch of a cinema hall. The papaya vendor, his trolley in the porch, was looking pleased. "I love this weather," he announced.

"Why", I asked. He mumbled unintelligibly, leaving me puzzled.


The explanation came soon. The porch filled with hundreds of rain-soaked people. Presently they grew tired of watching the rain and looked for diversions. The papayas tempted many and soon the vendor had sold everything.

Rickshawallahs get no break in the rain because they live hand to mouth and must earn every day. But on rainy days they can exact a premium from passengers. Those with a good panikapor-waterproof wrap to protect the passenger - can charge the highest fares. I once observed a savvy rickshaw passenger negotiating in Siddiq Bazar. When quoted the fare, she immediately asked to see the panikapor. "Eeesh! Your panikapor has holes! No way will I pay

twenty Taka to Gulistan!"

Rain has always been a good excuse for the tardy. I recall overhearing a man issue this monologue when his mobile phone rang:

"Sir! Assalamu-alaikum Sir! I am caught in the rain in Sutrapur for half an hour and will be late for work, Sir! Yes, heavy rain Sir! Sorry Sir, all the busses are full. Not a single rickshaw, Sir!" His boss, in far off Banani, does not know that the rain in Sutrapur started only five minutes ago, or that several empty rickshaws are waiting on the street. Mr. Tardy had just bought himself another hour before starting work!

Dr Waheed praised Sheikh Hasina's campaign to protect the planet from the wrath of climate change and her role in accelerating people's empowerment and establishing the rights of people, including autistic kids and other physically and mentally challenged people in society.

On Saarc, the two leaders focused on future action plans of the association.

The prime minister described poverty as the main enemy of the South Asian nations and called for concerted efforts for its alleviation. She also laid emphasis on increasing connectivity in South Asian region for socioeconomic prosperity.

During the meeting with Kamalesh Sharma, the prime minister mentioned her government's role in strengthening the foundation of democracy in the country.

Hasina said opposition party MPs have been made the chairmen of various parliamentary standing committees. The opposition MPs are attending the meetings and going abroad on tours, but unfortunately, she said, they do not attend the parliament sessions.

The secretary general hoped Bangladesh would be able to become a modern, developed country under the able leadership of Sheikh Hasina.
