Loyalty came first for Hasina

WikiLeaks cables show the way Hasina acted after 2008 polls victory

had noted that it might be

her last election, said a leaked US diplomatic dispatch posted on WikiLeaks. "...While she [Hasina] may want to

promote new leaders in order to begin building a legacy, she has also been rewarding loyalty in the selection of candidates [in the ninth parliamentary polls]," the cable said citing an hour-long meeting with Hasina.

On her return from the United States, the then political and economic councillor of US embassy in Dhaka held the oneon-one meeting at her residence on November 16, 2008.

The US embassy in other diplomatic dispatches portrayed a new look of Sheikh Hasina who emerged as "the undisputed leader of her party and the nation" within less than a year after assuming office

Ahead of 2008 parliamenary polls, Sheikh Hasina through the ninth parliamentary polls held in December 2008.

A diplomatic cable sent to Washington on August 3, 2009 by the then deputy chief of mission Nicholas J Dean described how Awami League President Hasina sidelined her party's senior leaders and promoted leaders loyal to her to the party and also cabinet.

"With the formation of the new party Central Committee and the expansion of the Cabinet, Hasina has underscored the premium she places on loyalty," commented Dean.

"While some party stalwarts dropped from the Central Committee and excluded from the Cabinet were guilty of actively conspiring against Hasina, others were apparently dropped for not being sufficiently loyal -- sins of omission rather than commission."

Rights leader Sultana Kamal tells The Daily Star about state's lack of sensitivity

The biggest concern over human rights situation in Bangladesh is lack of state sensitivity to the fact that "human rights are unconditional," rights activist Sultana Kamal has said. "Under no condition,

human rights can be violated. But the authorities are not aware of this," said Sultana, executive director

of Ain O Salish Kendra (ASK), which is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year.

Over the years, the rights body fought many legal bat-

tles on violation of human rights, opposed extrajudicial punishment in the name of fatwa, eviction of slum dwellers without rehabilitating them, torture in custody and physical and mental torture of students at educational institutions. CHASED BY COPS

'Robber' dies jumping off runaway truck

An alleged robber died after he jumped off a truck being chased by the police at Badda Natun Bazar area on Pragoti Sarani in the capital early yesterday. Police arrested eight other robbers and recovered the

iron rods that the gang of nine looted from Banani Chairmanbari area. The dead is Alamgir Hossain, 28, of Patuakhali.

Sub-inspector Shahin Miah of Gulshan Police Station

said the robbers in a truck came to a house a Chairmanbari area at around 3:00am where workers were unloading iron rods from another truck. The robbers took the workers hostage brandishing

sharp weapons and robbed the rods, he added. When the workers raised hue and cry, a patrol team of

police chased the miscreants. The robbers were going to Badda via Kuril Biswa Road. As the truck approached another police check post, Alamgir jumped off the truck. He was taken to Dhaka Medical College (DMC)

Hospital at 7:10am where doctors declared him dead. Gulshan police said they recovered the robbed rods,

seized the truck used by the robbers and a case was filed in this connection.

China favours Tahrir seen as biggest threat

Observes study on terror

The militant outfit Hizb ut-Tahrir is slowly gaining ground and is currently the strongest force in anti-state activities in Bangladesh. The outfit has been banned here since 2009. The organisation is very active on university cam-

puses, has strong national and international links, and is standing strong at a time when other major Islamic outfits are suffering from leadership problems.

The views came yesterday at the launching ceremony of a Bangladesh Enterprise Institute study on 'The State of Terrorism in Bangladesh, 2009-10'. BEI organised the programme at its office in the city.

While discussing the state of terrorism activities in the country, senior security officials, researchers, writers and diplomats agreed that Hizb ut-Tahrir is a matter of big concern for the nation.


"Of all the Islamic outfits, Hizb ut-Tahrir is currently the biggest threat," said Col TM Jobaer, Director of National Security Intelligence (NSI).

"The organisation is strong because it has a strong international agenda -- it wants to establish a Khilafat in many countries," he said.

The BEI study interviewed 1,214 citizens from different age groups and professions.

UNSC set to start parleys on Palestine

Netanyahu urges talks without preconditions

The UN Security Council was set to start consultations yesterday on Palestine's application for full membership of the world body, although a vote on the historic bid is not expected for weeks.

Security Council consultations were set to begin at the UN headquarters in New York at 3:00pm.

The United States has already threatened to veto the move, insisting that only direct Palestinian-Israeli talks can set up a Palestinian state. US President Barack Obama says the UN bid is an unrealistic shortcut that will not produce real and lasting peace on the ground between the two sides.

The mediating foursome of the United Nations, the United States, the European Union and Russia has been urgently trying to get both sides back to the negotiating table.

On Friday, the Quartet offered a counterpoint to the unilateral Palestinian bid at the UN, calling for new peace talks to begin within a month with both sides committing to seeking a final deal this year. Palestinian leader Mahmud Abbas, riding a wave of
