BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia yesterday warned the government that her party and allies will allow no general election without the caretaker government system reinstated.

Addressing a grand rally organised by the BNP-led four-party alliance, she said, "A caretaker government and a neutral election commission are a must for acceptable polls. In the absence of those,

we won't take part in the election."

The opposition will also foil attempts to hold parliamentary polls participated by only Awami League and Ershad's Jatiya Party, she added. "Such an election won't be accepted by anyone at home or abroad."

all SC judges, family members entitled to medicare at govt's expense


