Bayern Munich's Brazilian defender Breno, arrested and taken into custody Saturday on suspicion of causing a fire that destroyed his house, is unlikely to flee the country, his psychiatrist insisted Monday.

Prosecutors arrested Breno and judged him a risk of flight or obstruction of justice, district attorney Thomas Steinkraus-Koch told SID sports news agency at the weekend but Professor Florian Holsbauer said he believed Breno did not need to be kept under lock and key.

"I do not want to say that the prosecutor has got it wrong - but I do not believe the fear (there is a risk) of aggravating the facts or of flight," said Profes-

Breno unlikely to flee

Max-Planck Psychiatry Institute and an expert on depression, added he had found Breno to be "a kindly person, open to others" and he could "not imagine he set fire to his own house or is capable of aggravating the act."The professor added that he had the impression Breno was, however, somewhat detached from his immediate environment and was "isolated.

"And now he is sat in prison," he noted.

Steinkraus-Koch maintains there is "a precise suspicion" of attempted arson against the 21-year-old player, whose luxury villa in the Munich suburbs went up in flames on Monday evening.

Breno, who joined Bayern from Sao Paulo in 2008, had been briefly hospitalised for smoke inhalation after the blaze

at his house, which is reported to have started in a guest room in the basement.

The property in the suburb of Gruenwald was completely gutted, but Breno's wife Renata, their son and two children from Renata's previous relationship were not at home at the time.

The cost of the damage ran to millions of euros.

Professor Holsbauer said that psychological issues had to be addressed with sportsmen as with anyone else.

"Professional football is not just a question of injured muscles or knees but one also has to deal with the psyche, the injuries in the brain," he opined.

German media had revealed Friday that Breno -- full name Vinicius Rodrigues Borges -- had consulted a doctor at the Institute at his employers' behest and Bayern confirmed as much.

Trio bids to ignite flame

Champions Barcelona will be bidding to get their Champions League title defence back on track Wednesday as Arse-

nal and AC Milan also look to keep the dream alive in the second round of elite European matches.

But English giants Chelsea, who have already got their campaign off to a winning start, are set for possibly their toughest group assignment when they meet Spanish side Valencia at the Mestalla.

Barcelona were held 2-2 by 2010 champions AC Milan at the Nou Camp in their Group H opener, but despite riding high after a 5-0 hammering of Atletico Madrid in La Liga in which Lionel Messi scored a hattrick, coach Pep Guardiola warned against complacency as the Catalans travel to Minsk to take on Belarus champions FC Bate Borisov.

Chelsea, who defeated Swansea 4-1 at the weekend, are unbeaten in their last six visits to Spain going back to 2005 and have won both previous trips to Valencia 2-1.

Milan get Ibra boost

AC Milan have received a boost ahead of their Champions League clash against Czechs Viktoria Plzen as star forward Zlatan Ibrahimovic returned to

full training on Monday. The big Swede had spent two weeks on the sidelines with a groin problem since being ruled out of their opening European encounter against Barcelona, which ended in a 2-2 draw.

Without Ibrahimovic's return, Milan would be in a state of crisis.

Brazilian forwards Alexandre Pato and Robinho are both injured while attacking midfielder Kevin-Prince Boateng, whom coach Massimiliano Allegri favours in a role behind the front two, is also unavailable.

When Pato was injured a week ago against Udinese he was replaced by teenage forward Stefan El Shaarawy, an Italian youth international who has an Egyptian father. The 18-year-old scored Milan's equaliser in

the 1-1 draw against Udinese and then started in the 1-0 victory over Cesena on Saturday. Veteran forward Filippo Inzaghi is also

working his way back from a cruciate knee ligament injury and has made two brief substitute appearances in the last two games. However, neither of those two were

included in Milan's 25-man Champions League squad. It meant that without Ibrahimovic, the

club would only be able to call on Antonio Cassano and 18-year-old Simone Andrea Ganz, who has yet to play for the first team and having come through the club's youth system was only on the Champions League B-list anyway.

Cassano at least has had a run of five games as a starter since the beginning of the season and has played twice for Italy as well, meaning the oft maligned forward has gradually recovered his best form and indeed physical shape.

At the beginning of the season there was a lot of speculation linking the then overweight Cassano with a move away from Milan, but Allegri insisted the club always intended keeping him.

"Cassano is doing very well. People spoke a lot about him in the summer because it seemed as if he would be leaving," said Allegri.

"However, we're very happy that he

stayed because it was never our intention to sell him. "We're taking care of him and he's repay-

ing us." However, with a dearth of attacking options, it will be a relief to Allegri to at least

stitute should the need arise. Although with mid-table Milan travelling to league leaders Juventus at the weekend,


