





# Film Archive, its alumnus recall Tareque, Mishuk and Akhtaruzzaman

Nearly a month and a half after the shocking deaths of filmmaker Tareque Masud and journalist-cinematographer Mishul Munier, film activists and enthusiasts continue to hold memorial programmes

in their honour Bangladesh Film Archive (BFA) and Bangladesh Film Archive Alumni Association (BFAAA) held a memori programme on September 27 at the Poet Sufia Kamal Auditorium of National Museum. The programme started with the

screening of Masud's short film "Naroshundar". A discussion was held after the screening. Among others, filmmakers Masihuddin Shaker, Morshedul Islam and Manzare Hasin Murad: former director general of BTV, Syed Salahuddin Zaki, and film researcher Manish Rafique (who was in the same vehicle with Tareque and Mishuk during the accident) spoke at

Secretary to the Ministry of Information, Hedayetullah Al Mamun, was the chief guest. Director general of BFA, Kamrun Nahar, presided over the session

Apart from recalling the late film personalities, film activists also discussed on the need for an up to date film archive.

Recalling the horror of the accident, Manish Rafique said that the trauma is still haunting him. "It was only a matter of few seconds and I just remembered my mother's face. Then a distant voice [of Catherine Masud) that was calling 'Tareque' woke me up and I saw Tareque bhai and Mishuk bhai lying motionless on the road," said Rafique.

Masihuddin Shaker termed Masud and Akhtaruzzman as more than just filmmal ers. "They did not just think about filmmaking, they wanted to change the

society as well," said Shaker, who made "Shurjo Dighal Bari" along with Sheikh Nevamat Ali.

Referring to Akhtaruzzaman's achievement, Morshedul Islam said, "He made only a few films but he made them with sincerity and utmost dedication."

In her speech, Begum Kamrunnahar assured that she and her organisation would work to uphold the contributions of the three personalities.

After the discussion, Akhtaruzzaman's National Award winning film "Poka Makorer Ghar Bashati" was screened. Based on a novel by Selina Hossain, the film received eight national awards in the year 1996.

### Behind the scenes Shooting of **Second Hand**

Hasna Hena in Pubail where the drama "Second Hand" is being shot is teeming with its cast and crew. As one enters the set, one comes across actor-director Zahid Hasan busy putting on his makeup. Hasan asks cinematographer Anwar Hossain Bulu if his attire is suitable for the scene. On Bulu's suggestion, Hasan changes his clothes. Then he takes his crew to the bazaar near Pubail College entrance, where the first scene is

to be shot. The second scene will be shot inside Hasna Hena, a beautiful shooting spot stretched over a large piece of land. Far north of Hasna Hena are three houses with tin roofs, one of which has been set up as the residence of Kajol, Hasan's character in the drama. A sofa has been placed on the veranda, with monitors and cameras on one side and production crew holding reflectors and booms on the other. Actress Maya Ghosh is sitting on the sofa, with Hasan standing at the entrance of the house. Before the shoot the two rehearse the scene a couple of times. An emotional scene is shot where a joyful mother meets her son who has returned home after a long time. First a long shot, then a close one. After the scene, a couple of chairs

are set up under a Bokul tree for a session of adda. As the adda gets under way, Hasan gives a rundown on the story of the TV play, written by Shafiqur Rahman Shantanu. While he plays the role of Kajol, the cast also features Sarika, Mita Noor, Majnur Mizan and Maya Ghosh. Sarika plays the role of Nilu. Asked why the drama is named "Second Hand", Hasan explains that the protagonist Kajol is in the habit of buying everything that has been used once. At one point Kajol marries Nilu, who he mistakenly regards as "second hand" (previously married) as well. The misunderstand-

ing takes the story forward. The adda wraps up and the crew prepares for the next scene, to be shot near a lake outside the shooting spot. Sarika will walk on its banks and run into Hasan. In the scorching heat, the scene is shot quickly.

Another session of adda heats up

Later, Hasan amplifies on his recent work, Shushmoy Shumon's drama "Benefit of Doubt" and "Second Hand" which will be aired as an Eid-ul-Adha special on ntv. ## A naturist painter, inspired by Sultan

Bimanesh's solo exhibition at Bengal Gallery

Bengal Gallery of Fine Arts in Dhanmondi, Dhaka is hosting a solo art exhibition, titled "Rural Nature", featuring the works of Bimanesh Chandra Biswas.

Most of Biswas' artworks on display are watercolours, and capture the simplicity of rural Bengal in all its diversity. Biswas prefers landscapes. His tones are warm and he uses


subtle colours. Bold hues are almost absent in his watercol ours. Apart from serene landscapes, his subjects include, modest villagers, thatched huts, ponds, rainbow, farmers toiling in the fields, abundance of green, monsoon days and

Nature and villagers' chores

are two recurring themes in his watercolours. Observing at the works on display, it becomes clear that the painter has attempted to strike a balance between proportion and composition. However, for the most part this attempt did not seem to work well. Biswas' drawings also appear a tad immature at times, as he could not portray human figures and other features precisely.

Biswas, who is an art teacher, finds inspiration in nature. That inspiration is evident in his paintings that delineate the splendour of the Bengal landscape. His works are realistic with a touch of impressionism and postimpressionism. He applies flat
