Women tour India, Lanka next month

The Bangladesh women's cricket team will tour India and Sri Lanka next month. The five matches will prepare the players ahead of the World Cup qualifiers that will begin here from November 14.

The Salma Khatun-led squad of 18 will take on Saurashtra women's team in two one-day games on October 6 and 8 after they arrive on October 4.

Afterwards, they will fly off to Colombo and take on the Sri Lanka national side in three one-dayers on October 11, 13 and 14.

Mamata Maben, the former India international, is the team's coach while Dipu Rai Chowdhury will travel with the team as manager and technical director.

Few issues to be resolved

Stiff competition in the middle-order, the No 3 quandary and spin bowling form, among other issues, would be discussed primarily when the selectors meet today to finalise the 14-man Tigers' limited-overs teams that will take on West Indies next month.

The Tigers face Darren Sammy's men in a Twenty20 international on October 11 at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium before the ODI series begins at the same venue two days later.

Despite being on the back of a 3-2 series defeat at the hands of Zimbabwe, the squad would see few changes with chief selector Akram Khan confirming the tough fight for a place in the middle-order.

"We have a few players for the No 6 and 7 spot. There's a lot of competition there and I think we'll have to really discuss before coming to a conclusion," said chief selector Akram Khan who confirmed that they will submit the team by Friday.

Naeem Islam, Alok Kapali and Nasir Hossain are all up for the position that will come after Shakib Al Hasan and skipper Mushfigur Rahim. Nasir is leading the pack as of now as he played against Zimbabwe and struck a half-century on debut. But Akram has said that performances during the BCB Cup will be taken into account, giving hope to Naeem and Kapali, who played decent knocks individually.

'We will look at performances as it was

the sort of tournament that helped players like Imrul Kayes come back into form. I think it was a good opportunity for everyone to show where they are at the moment," said Akram.

He also said that while there were trials for the No 3 spot during the season opening one-day tournament with Mohammad Ashraful and Kapali tried at the spot, it is too early to make a call.

"I am only focused on the [squad of] fourteen. I will have to talk to the captain and coach before we make decisions on the playing eleven. We did try Ashraful at three during the BCB Cup but nothing is sure yet," he said.

In the spin department, Abdur Razzak could be given a fair run during the limited overs matches, though Elias Sunny's name is creeping up in conversations mainly due to the left-arm spinner's recent performance.

It wouldn't be surprising if Sunny is in the Twenty20 side as a bowling addition is the only option that the selectors can have in the format which the Tigers are really not experienced in.

Bangladesh haven't played a Twenty20 game for more than a year and on top of that, the format hasn't been played in the country even domestically since the 2009-10 season. It virtually rules out selecting specialists for this version of cricket.

"We don't have many extraordinary Twenty20 players so we will base the team on one-day players. It will mostly be a similar team with a few additions for the ODIs," opined the former national captain.

Nasir too falls short

Similar to Naeem Islam from Day Two, Nasir Hossain too missed a century on the third day of the practice four-dayer at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium.

But his unbeaten 93 guided BCB Red to 285, a first-innings lead of just four runs, carrying on from their overnight 215-7. In their second innings, BCB Green stumbled their way to 174 for six at the close of play yesterday as they took an overall lead of 170 runs.

Unlike Naeem, Nasir was stranded

in the nineties. The 20-year-old allrounder, who began the day on 40 off 47 balls, guided the tail in an assured display. His 53 runs on the day had a six off Elias Sunny and a boundary apart from the eight he hit the earlier evening, but his ability to pick the singles in the final two balls was helpful for the Red's cause. Abdur Razzak helped add 57 for the eighth wicket while Shafiul Islam and Nazmul Hossain hung around for an hour. But the latter couldn't stay to help Nasir score the century as Nazmul gave Tanvir Haider a

simple catch off Elias Sunny. The left-arm spinner took three wickets, similar to Shahadat Hossain

who didn't add to his three. Green's reply began poorly as Junaed Siddiqui was hit on the elbow by Rubel in the second over, the lefthander wincing in pain. Sahagir Hossain and captain Shahriar Nafees added 70 for the first wicket before the wicketkeeper fell to Mahmudullah Riyad for 26. First innings hero Naeem made only eight before he became Razzak's first victim and in the next over, Nafees missed a half-century as he fell for 46 off 87 balls; the left-hander struck eight boundaries during his two
