

Oman may deport 500 Bangladeshis

Around 500 Bangladeshi workers arrested on Wednesday night in Oman might be deported home soon for their irregular status, Bangladesh embassy officials said yesterday.

They are among over 1,300 expatriate workers arrested in different parts of the Gulf state.

The crackdown on illegal workers might be part of Oman's move to discipline the sector, an embassy official told The Daily Star, requesting anonymity.

"We had no official communication with the authorities yet as it has been the weekend. We can learn details after the offices resume operation on Saturday [today]," he said. Like in some other Middle Eastern states, the recent

Trial of war criminals would be symbolic

Syed Ashraf told US envoy in 2009

LGRD Minister Syed Ashraful Islam had said the trials for war crimes in 1971 would be "symbolic" and involve only a handful of people, according to a leaked US diplomatic dispatch.

Ashraf, also the ruling Awami League general secretary, told this to the then US ambassador James F Moriarty on June 18,

"He [Ashraf] predicted the process of gathering evidence and taking the cases to trial would be a 'long process' that likely would take more than five years. Those convicted would likely receive lenient sentences," Moriarty wrote in the cable.

Acknowledging the trials could strain national unity, Ashraf said they were necessary to bring closure to a topic that continued to bitterly divide the country, reads SEE PAGE 19 COL 5

Top Qaeda leader killed in Yemen

US-born cleric Anwar al-Awlaqi, a prominent al-Qaeda chief described by US officials as "the most significant risk" to the United States, was killed yesterday in what analysts called a "significant blow."

A senior US official confirmed Awlaqi's death after an announcement by the

Yemeni defence ministry. "I can confirm... he's dead," the senior administration

official said, without providing further details.

In Sanaa, the defence ministry said Awlaqi was killed yesterday morning but did not elaborate on the circumstances of his death.


Tribal sources told AFP that Awlaqi, who was on a US wanted list, was killed in an air strike on two vehicles in Marib province, an al-Qaeda stronghold in eastern Yemen, early in the day.

Several other suspected al-Qaeda operatives were also reported killed.

One tribal source said that the plane that launched the sir strike was likely to have been American.
