"To think that we are better than other teams because of what we have achieved would be arrogant," he Jefferson Farfan, while insists.

"We are going to start these qualifiers better than we have done in the past, with more time to work and with many in 2006. everyone in the squad knowing each other well, but in no way are we favourites."

Of the rest, Paraguay will be out to the Vino Tinto at altitude in Quito. maintain their fantastic recent record in qualifying under a new coach in Francisco 'Chiqui' Arce, who repre-2002 World Cups.

Argentine Gerardo Martino semi-finals for the first time. stepped down after leading his adopted nation to the final of the Copa America despite not winning a single game in open play in Argentina.

Chile remain one of the most attractive footballing sides on the international stage, although Claudio Borghi's side must begin their campaign without star man Alexis Sanchez of Barcelona due to injury.

All the other nations have reason to believe that they can qualify too, with Colombia -- led by prolific striker Radamel Falcao -- hoping for a fresh start under new coach Leonel Alvarez

Peru finished bottom in qualifying

They will get the chance to avenge a defeat to Venezuela at the Copa America when they host

Traditionally a footballing backwater, Venezuela have improved rapidly in recent years, and Cesar sented his country in the 1998 and Farias' team captured the imagination of a nation as they reached the Copa

Venezuela's strength in depth was proven by Farias' decision to name two separate squads for his side's opening two games.

Only nine players are included in both squads as Venezuela first face Ecuador at altitude and then Argentina at home.

And then there is Bolivia, perceived to be the weakest side, but with one big ally: the altitude of La Paz.

There Bolivia play their home games 3,650 metres above sea level, and their 6-1 win over Argentina in 2010 qualifying proved just how big an advantage that can be.

That means that even the poorestperforming side at the Copa America can dream of reaching the finals, even if away from home their lack of quality is likely to be exposed.

uncertain with a thigh strain. Arsenal defender Bacary Sagna had already been forced to withdraw with a broken leg he suffered in

Sunday's Premier League defeat by Spurs. Cisse, who has scored

nine goals and has 40 caps for France, has not played for the national side since their disastrous 2010 World Cup campaign.

# Carroll

Former England captain Alan Shearer is confident that £35 million Liverpool striker Andy Carroll has the ability to forge a successful career for club and country.

Shearer told several newspapers on Tuesday that the 22-year-old former Newcastle centre-forward would overcome a slow start to his Anfield career and establish himself in the

England team. Carroll has struggled to live up to his price tag since joining Liverpool from the Magpies in January, scoring only once this season in the league while facing criticism over his lifestyle from England manager Fabio Capello.

But Shearer is adamant that Carroll is on the right path to success and believes he will benefit at Liverpool from the guidance of Kenny Dalglish.

"Andy is a young and inexperienced lad with a lot of pressure on him but he will come good," added Shearer, who played under Dalglish at Blackburn during the mid-1990s.

"Yes, there will be times when people question him but he's at the right club. At Anfield, he's got a great manager who understands the trials and tribulations of being a young footballer.

"When I moved to Blackburn, I had great guidance there and that was Kenny. Kenny will protect him and look after him as he did me at Blackburn. He did that in a fantastic way.

"Once he settles down, starts to play well and score, you will see the fearsome centre forward that we saw at Newcastle and you'll see the reason why Kenny paid £35 million for him.

"Andy is talented. He is a nightmare for defenders to play against if given the right service and if he is fit enough."

Shearer said he expected Carroll to cement a partnership with Wayne Rooney in the England set-up.

# Rodwell gets reprieve

Everton midfielder Jack Rodwell has successfully appealed against the red card issued to him in last weekend's Merseyside derby with Liverpool, the FA confirmed on Tuesday.

Rodwell was controversially sent off by referee Martin Atkinson after a 23rd minute challenge on Liverpool's Uruguayan striker Luis Suarez despite winning the ball cleanly.

Rodwell's match tilted the game in Liverpool's favour, with the Reds going on to win 2-0 at Goodison.

The three-match suspension against Rodwell has been scrapped in light of the successful appeal, an FA statement said.

# **Italy lose Criscito**

Zenit Saint Petersburg defender Domenico Criscito has been ruled out of Italy's two remaining Euro 2012 qualifiers with a groin strain, the

Italian football federation announced on Tuesday. Palermo defender Federico Balzaretti and Inter Milan striker Giampaolo Pazzini are also doubtful for the ties against Serbia and Northern Ireland because of injury.

Italy have already booked their spot for the tournament in Poland and Ukraine next year as Group C winners but both their opponents are still in contention for second place and a spot in the play-offs.

Italy travel to Belgrade on Friday and host Northern Ireland at Pescara next Tuesday.

# **Afellay sidelined**

Barcelona's Dutch international Ibrahim Afellay will be sidelined for about six months after he underwent surgery to repair a torn ligament in his left knee, the Spanish club said Tuesday.

The 25-year-old, who signed with Barcelona from PSV Eindhoven in December, picked up the injury during a training session on September 22. He underwent the 50-minute operation at a Barcelona hospital on Monday.

"During the first two months he will undergo physiotherapy and work on mobility. The third and fourth month is a very active phase, mainly in the gym," one of the doctors who operated on the player, Ricard Pruna, was quoted by the club's

website as saying. "In the fifth and sixth month he will do exercises adapted to the pitch," he added.

Afellay had only just got back into Pep Guardiola's line-up after missing the start of the season with a hamstring injury.

He has played just a substitute's role this sea-
