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PM for export diversification

Hands export trophies to 45 businessmen

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday called on the business community to diversify export items and explore new markets for the country.

"Do not depend on a few products or markets.... Standards of the products must be maintained," Hasina said while addressing an export awards ceremony at Osmani Memorial Auditorium in the capital.

She stressed the need for exporting quality products to brighten the image of the country.

The prime minister later handed the National Export Trophy for 2009-10 to 45 exporters for their extraordinary performance.

Bangladesh has much potential in the export sector and businessmen have the ability to diversify the export basket with a view to finding new markets, Hasina said in her speech as the chief guest.

She asked exporters to expand the market for jute and jute goods, ships, pharmaceuticals, leather and leather goods, agricultural products and information and communications technology items.

Jute is the highest export item after readymade garments, the prime minister noted.

14 YEARS OF CHT ACCORD

Indigenous people want full implementation

Indigenous leader Jyotirindra Bodhipriya Larma, also popular as Santu Larma, yesterday warned of a stronger movement from January if their demands, especially the implementation of the Chittagong Hill Tracts Peace Accord 1997, are not met.

The government has breached its promise to the indigenous people by not taking any initiative to implement the treaty, he said in a press conference organised by Parbatya



He threatened of an even tougher movement by the end of March if the demands are not fulfilled by then.

Britain faces biggest-ever strike over pension

Two million public sector workers in Britain went on strike yesterday over changes to their pensions in the biggest walkout for decades, closing thousands of schools and disrupting transport.

Three-quarters of schools were estimated closed during the 24-hour strike, hospitals were operating with skeleton staff and local authorities were paralysed.

Striking workers picketed public sector buildings in central London and more than 1,000 demonstrations were expected to take place across Britain in scenes reminiscent of the 1970s.

Fears of long delays at London's Heathrow airport failed to materialise yesterday morning as two-thirds of immigration officials turned up for work.

The strike is the biggest test so far of Prime Minister David Cameron's Conservative-Liberal Democrat coalition government, which sparked the unions' fury by making public sector workers pay more into their pensions and work longer.

Anger rose further on Tuesday when finance minister George Osborne targeted the pay of teachers, nurses and soldiers and revealed plans to cut an extra 300,000 public sector jobs as he slashed Britain's

growth forecasts.

On Wednesday, Osborne said the strike would only harm the economy, and called for unions to return to the negotiating table.

"The strike is not going to achieve anything, it's not going to change anything," the Chancellor of the Exchequer told BBC TV.

But Brendan Barber, general secretary of the Trades Union Congress (TUC), said the public sector was "under attack" from the government and the strike was fully justified.

"There comes a time when people really have to stand up and make a stand," he told ITV.
